

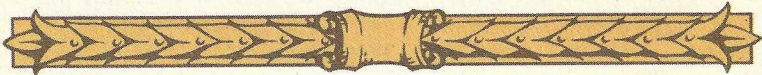

Must Win Burmans

If the Burmans are to be won for Christ, we must have educated men willing to give their lives, not to making money, but to re-making men. Educated men are the men of influence and the majority of our pastors and preachers do not have the education to command the respect of even high school pupils. However, those boys of high school training who do respond to the call to the ministry have real consecration and self-dedication to serve Christ and their fellow men. Two years in the Teacher's Training College will give them a chance at jobs that will pay two, three or four times as much salary as they can hope to get as pastors. We must supersede this evaluation of education in monetary terms and set forth the need of training for Christ's work.

We are very proud of our service to various racial groups in the Burman Seminary, but it is a pride that should be tempered with concern. Of the twenty boys in school this year only

six are Burmans. We have Sgaw Karens, Pwo Karens, Chins, Taungthus, Lahus and Indians, are very glad to have them, but we need more Burmans. The Burmans are the dominant people in Burma—not only in numbers, but in influence and position. Until the Burmans are won for Christ, Burma will not be won for Christ.—*Cecile and Cecil Hobbs.*

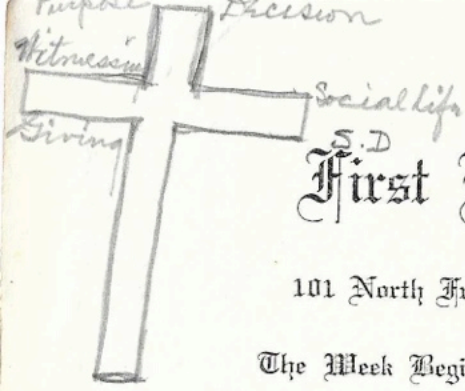

Grateful for White Cross Gifts

Today is Race Relations Sunday and an appropriate time to consider Baptist work among the Negroes. One of our most successful projects is the Gleiss Memorial Christian Center for Negroes in Detroit, presided over by Mrs. Mattie Anderson.

The Center opened the fall season with a Registration Party for all boys and girls. This year it was decided to have membership cards for the Center and to charge nominal fees, ranging from 5¢ for kindergartners to 25¢ for adults. The children are very proud of their new membership cards. The Mothers' Club, aside from its regular work, is sewing for the Red Cross, and the two English classes have an unusually large attendance this year.

During the past summer a Daily Vacation Bible School was conducted with an enrollment of 253. "Everything we needed was supplied by the White Cross," writes Mrs. Anderson. "I really do not see how we could carry

on the work of the Center if it were not for that fine group of Christian women. May God ever bless them. In September we gave to mothers 284 baby garments, three dozen cans of food, and 196 used garments, all of which came through the White Cross."

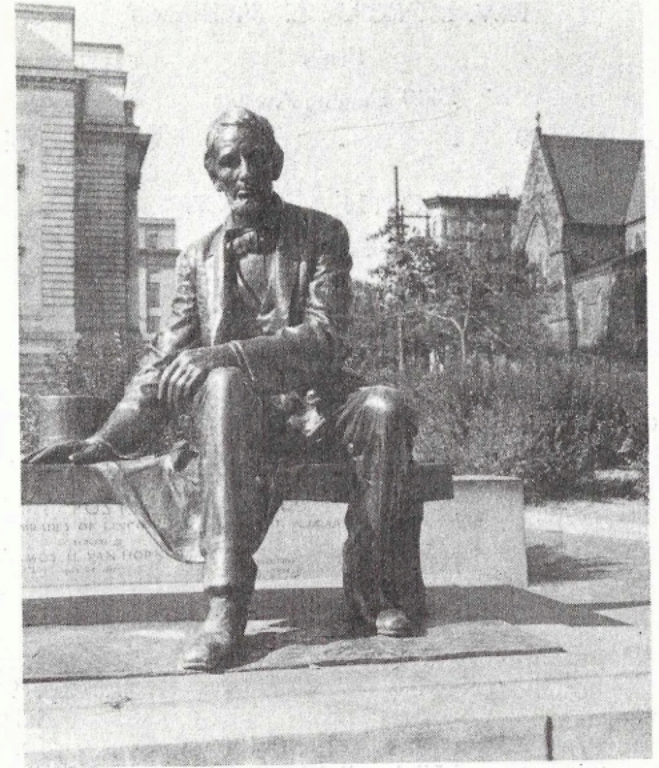
A Square Deal for the Nisei

A plea has come to us from Miss Goldie Nicholson, missionary of the Woman's Home Society in Sacramento, California, for fair treatment of loyal Japanese in this country. Miss Nicholson's work brings her into contact with many of the Nisei (people born in this country of Japanese parentage), who, she says, are among our finest citizens. "Japanese young people in the United States find themselves in a very difficult situation at the present time due to international tension and to the careless prejudice of many of their fellow American citizens," she writes. "May I ask each one of you to put all prejudice aside?"

Saved from Slavery to Become a Missionary

Many years ago, a little nine-year-old girl of the lower Congo was taken to a slave market. A Baptist missionary, Rev. Peter Frederickson, ransomed her and took her to a mission station to be educated. There she was discovered by another Baptist missionary, Joseph Clark, who brought her home to live with his family and care for his children. Later, Mr. Clark took her to America, where she entered Spelman College (then Spelman Seminary), in Atlanta, Georgia. After graduation she decided that she wanted to return to the Congo as a missionary to her own people.

For many years, Maggie Rattray (that was the name that had been given to the little girl from the Congo) served as a national worker under the Woman's American Baptist Foreign Mission Society in Tondo, Belgian Congo. She did such outstanding work

that on May 20, 1926, she received a decoration from the King of Belgium—the first native of the Belgian Congo to be so honored.

Miss Rattray has recently retired from active service, but she still teaches and helps in the evangelistic work at Tondo. Her home is built near one of the main paths, and many go to her with their problems and receive help.

Mexican Center Opens Clinic

The little boy and girl pictured on the cover attend the kindergarten in our Mexican Christian Center at Phoenix, Arizona. Here Mexican people of all ages come for recreation, inspiration, and instruction of many kinds. This Center has recently opened a clinic service with two doctors in attendance. It is meeting a very real need among some of the people of the community—particularly those not eligible for county medical service. It is also serving as a contact agency, by directing people to the proper places for treatment, and helping to see that they get it.

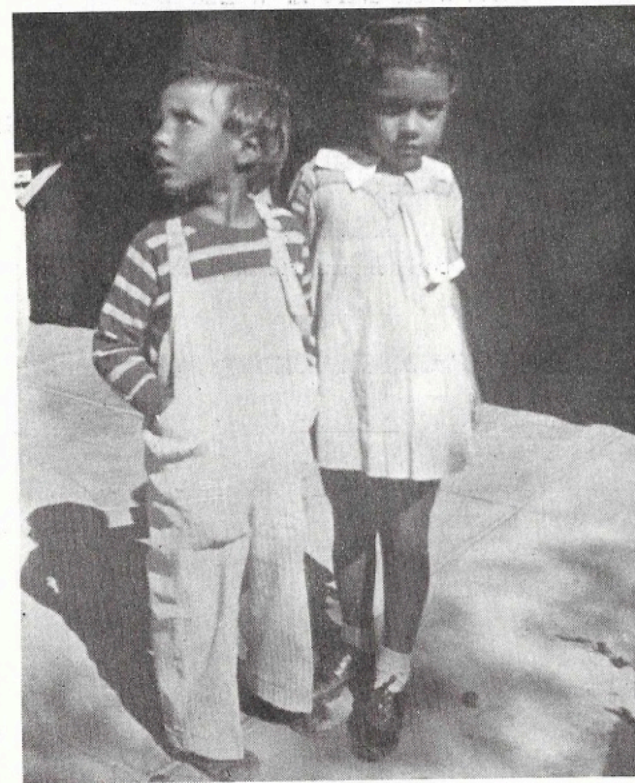
The Christian Center ministers to the spirit as well as the body. While the patients are waiting for the doctor, the Mexican pastor tells them of the Great Physician.

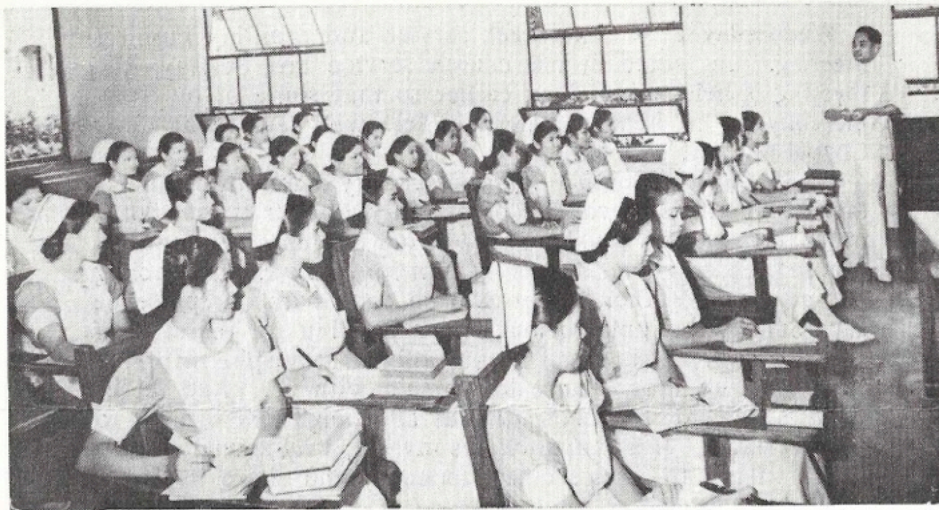
The World Day of Prayer is Friday this week. Watch for announcement in the daily paper.

Word from the War Zones

On January 24, the following message was received by our Foreign Society from the Philippines: "All safe. Notify parents. Baby girl arrived Jan. 12. (signed) Waters." Dr. Waters heads our fine Baptist hospital in Iloilo, where our Central Philippine College is also located. Rev. and Mrs. Paul Collyer, who had been studying at the Language School in Baguio, sent word that their house had been damaged by bombs but that they were safe.

From Japan, transmitted through the Swiss Legation in Tokyo, came a cable, "Missionaries safe. Send greetings." The cable was dated January 3, and signed by Dr. Gressitt.

It has been learned that Stephen Goddard and Kenneth Hobart of Swatow succeeded in reaching Kityang in Free China. Our six women missionaries in Swatow were reported to have been taken into custody by the Japanese, but a later message said they were being given restricted liberty. A recently appointed nurse of the Foreign Society, Miss Seater-Margaret Drever,

and a new appointee of the Woman's Foreign Society, Miss Ann R. McConnell, who is also a nurse, have reached their destinations in West China.

Rev. Carl Capen of South China, the Uffords from East China, and the Fishers of Japan have all arrived safely in this country within recent months.

The World Emergency Fund

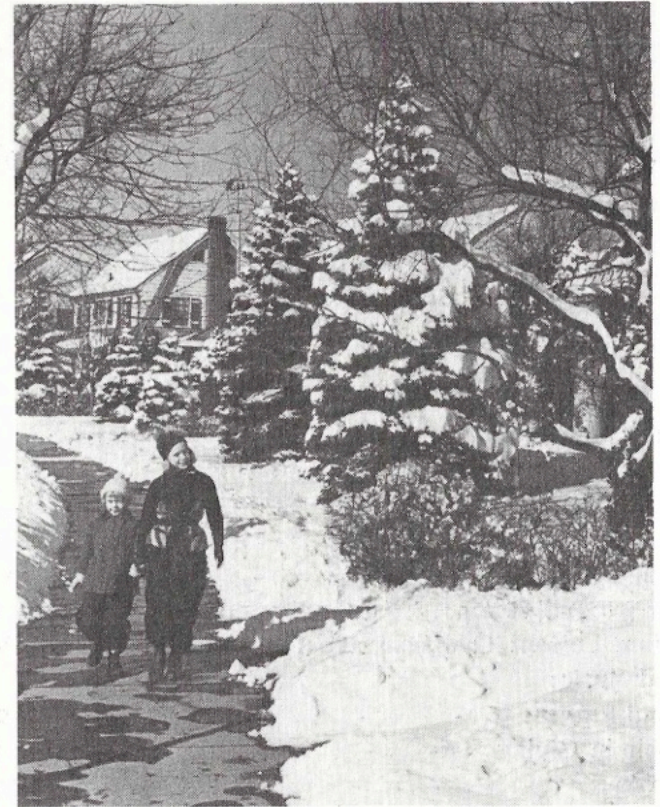

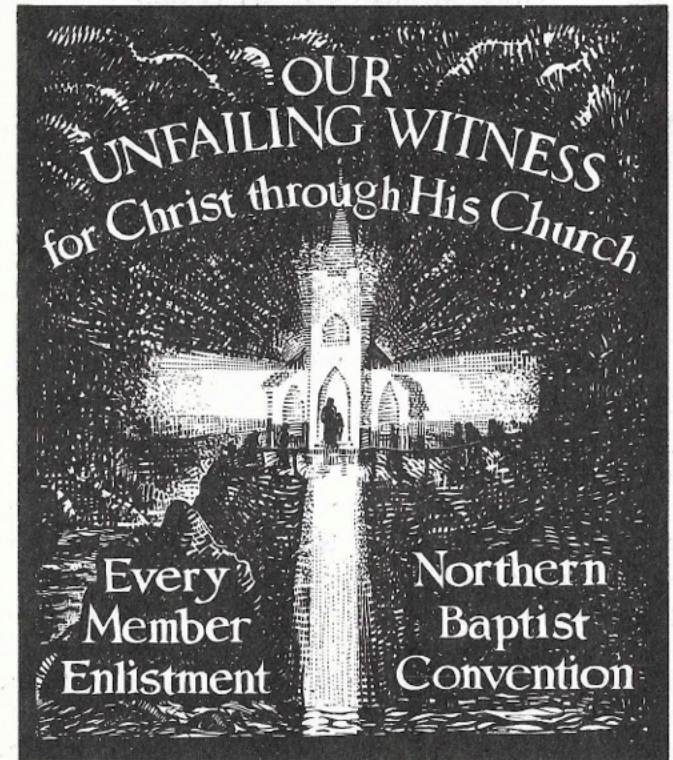
A Center in "The Bush"

The South Chicago Neighborhood House is a Baptist Christian Center in the heart of the steel mill district, in an area known as "The Bush." On three sides it is bounded by the Carnegie Illinois Steel property and on the fourth by railroad yards. In this small area of 13 blocks, there are over 7,000 people, most of whom are Polish, Mexican, or Slavic.

The beautiful old church pictured on the cover was the scene of Patrick Henry's famous speech ending with the immortal words, "But as for me, give me liberty or give me death."

Henry, although not a Baptist himself, had a strong fellow feeling for the liberty-loving Baptists, many of whom were subjected to persecution by the Established Church of Virginia. On several occasions he protested against their imprisonment for no other crime than that of claiming the right to worship in their own way.

George Washington, James Madison, and Thomas Jefferson were other famous Virginians who befriended the persecuted Baptists. Jefferson said of them, "By the intolerable sufferings and indefatigable labors of the Baptists, they have cherished and diffused their own love of religious liberty throughout the whole colony."

Birthday Service in Jucuapa

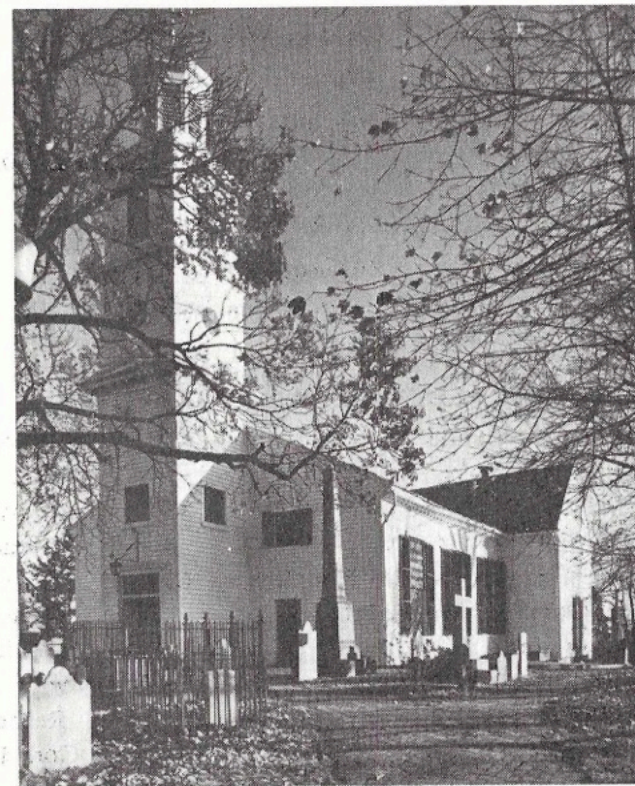
An interesting custom observed in the churches of El Salvador is that of giving birthday offerings to the church and reconsecrating to God the person who is having the birthday.

For the "Barbed Wire Legion"

If you made a gift to our Northern Baptist World Emergency Fund, you will be interested to know that some of your money is going to help prisoners of war.

Our World Relief Committee contributes to the work of the American Bible Society in distributing scriptures to prisoners, and also makes an appropriation to the War Prisoners' Aid Committee of the Y. M. C. A.

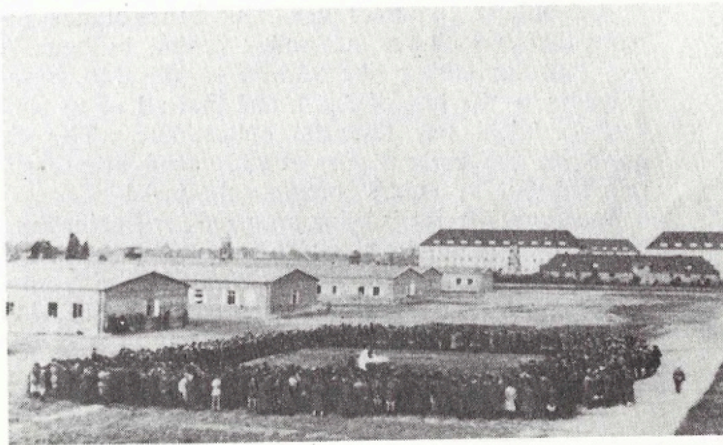
One of the best ways of keeping up a prisoner's morale is by keeping his hands busy, and so the Y. M. C. A. furnishes materials and instruction in handicrafts. Some prisoners study new trades even though already the masters of others. It helps to keep them occupied and their chances of finding work may be greater when the war is over.

Action, too, is one of the indispensable safeguards of health—both mental and physical. Governments at war cannot provide and direct physical recreation programs. They do, however, recognize their importance and have invited the Y. M. C. A. to render this needed service.

The "Y" has also helped to establish prison camp schools, where the better educated prisoners serve as instructors. In cooperation with the Chaplaincy Committee of the World Council of Churches they supply chaplains from neutral countries whenever possible to do so.

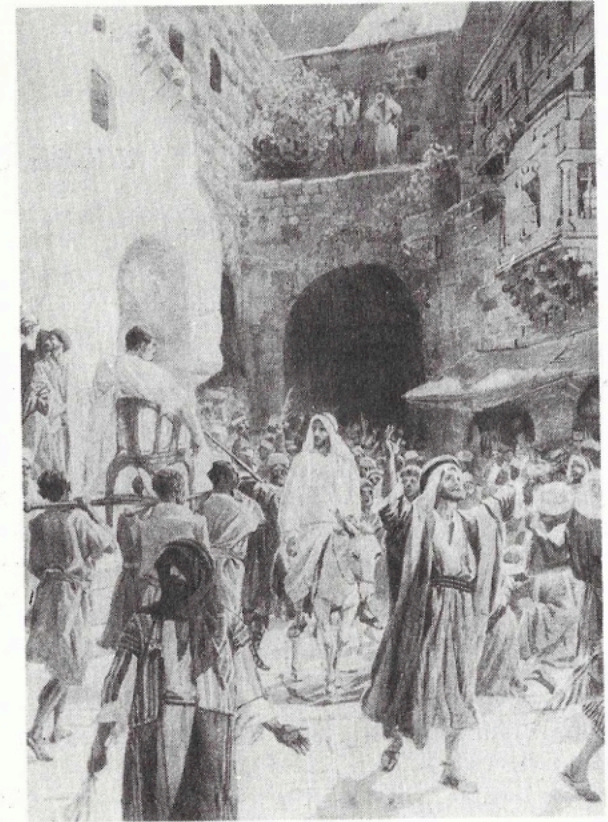
Fresh fields for such service will be opened, now that both American and Japanese soldiers will be added to the five million or more prisoners already in war camps. Every government involved has provided appropriate assurance for the continuance of this worth-while, humanitarian work.

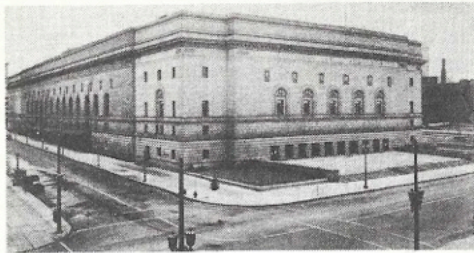

We feel that the Christians deserve much credit for this, as they are taking a most active part in the work."

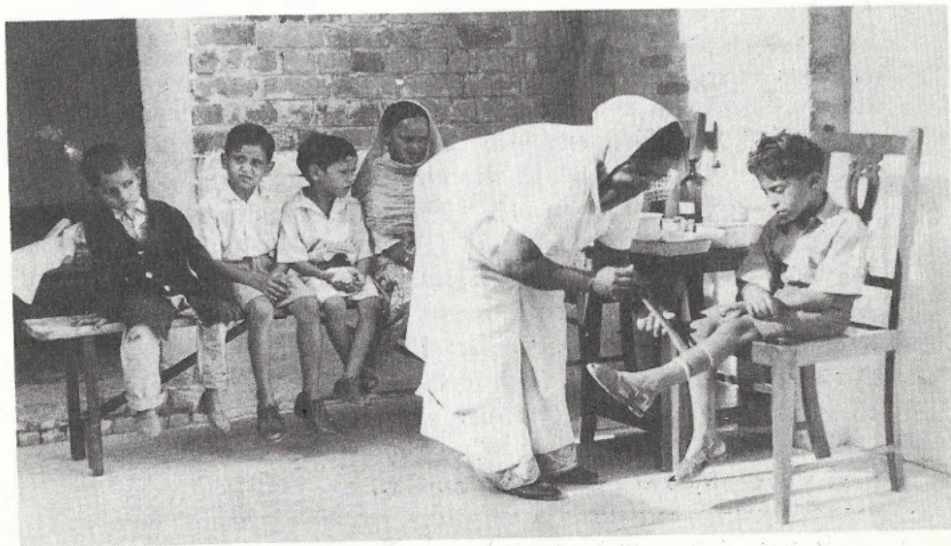

Indian Villagers Eager to Learn

"Village Christian families who live on an average income of ten cents a day are not easily persuaded to support a pastor," says Rev. A. T. Fishman of our Telugu Mission in Nellore, South India, "and city families who by comparison are well-to-do are not always willing to sacrifice their luxuries."

"It is encouraging, therefore," he adds, "to see our high school staff in Nellore supporting a village worker and taking a keen interest in his activities. Recently we conducted a service in Kagatur where a Christian family spent two summer months teaching adults to read and where a Christian woman is now being supported as teacher, largely by non-Christian people. When we passed out the mimeographed "Order of Service" to those who could read a little, it was good to see their interest and hear their responses, feeble and stumbling though they were. When the offering was called for, fully two-thirds of the children, who were mostly non-Christians, responded with coppers or tiny handfuls of grain."

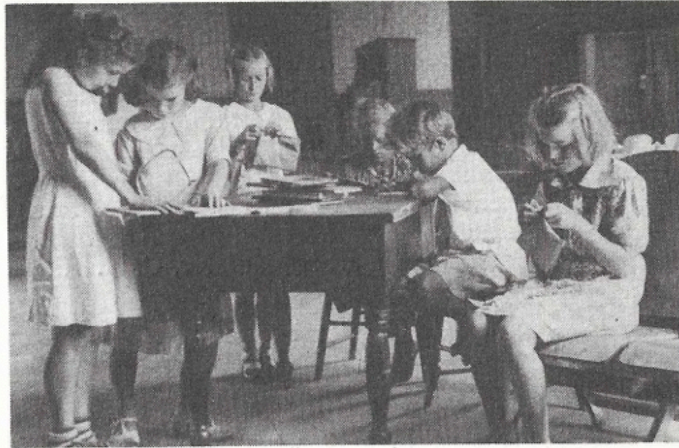
Annual meeting highlights. From financial and other standpoints we have just closed one of the most successful years in the past decade. Mrs. Richards, our Financial Secretary, reported receipt of moneys totalling \$2063.26 which includes \$76 from bulletin sponsors; \$144 from the Ohio Baptist Convention; \$3.74 from initial offering; \$138.35 in loose offerings; \$1237.32 in envelopes; \$360 in rent and \$103.85 from miscellaneous sources including \$49.89 from tax stamp returns. It pays to save your sales tax stamps and turn them in through our church. Missionary and benevolence receipts also are decidedly in advance of former years; \$354.00 to missions, which is \$4 above our quota; \$46.37 to Emergency Fund; \$30.50 in gifts to Delaware Council of Religious Education; \$15 to Carolyn Gleich through Whatever Class; and \$28.60 given through the Fellowship offerings at Communion services, making a total of \$474.47.

All bills paid and a balance in the treasury was the note of good news as Mr. Via closed his report as treasurer. After sixteen years of faithful service in this office, Mr. Via insisted that somebody else be elected to take the responsibilities of church treasurer. Mr. Via has carried a heavy load of work as a Christian layman in seeing our church through depression years; and a motion was passed instructing the church clerk to incorporate a special paragraph of recognition in the church minutes for Mr. Via's service. He will continue to serve as a deacon and as a trustee. Mr. Howard Coonrad, an experienced business man and accountant was elected church treasurer for the coming year.

Other elections include Mr. Bird Frost, whose term as deacon has expired, elected to the board of trustees for a five year term. This board now consists of W. F. Via '43, Chester Patterson '44, Harold Byerly '45, C. H. Richards '46 and Bird Frost '47. Mr. L. F. Gabriel was elected to the board of deacons, his term expiring in '47. The other members of this board are C. H. Richards '43, H. L. Byerly '44, Rufus Crane '45 and W. F. Via '46. The board of deaconesses includes Alice J. Whittier '43, Mrs. L. E. Smart '44, Mrs. Nellie Dick '43, Mrs. Lois Nash '44 and Mrs. Clara Eads '44, with Mrs. C. E. Dix honorary deaconess. Each of these three boards have the custom of choosing their chairman and secretary at their next meeting. Planning a Vacation School

In the summer of 1940, 3,704 Church Vacation Schools were conducted by Northern Baptists—3,157 in the United States and 547 on home or foreign territory.

The rapid spread of such projects has proved the soundness of the idea behind them. Children love these schools, and parents welcome them as splendid means of providing a safe, wholesome environment for their youngsters during the period when schools are closed. Sunday School teachers report that children who attend such schools invariably show more interest in the Sunday School and their Bible lessons next fall.

The Vacation Church School is also an excellent means of attracting new members into the Sunday School. Children who might not enter Sunday School during the busy fall and winter season will often come to the Church Vacation School during the leisurely summer period. They enjoy their associations there and later want to join the regular Sunday School. Often parents become interested in the church, because of their children's connection with the Church Vacation School.

A whole series of new materials and texts for Church Vacation Schools is

now in process of preparation by the American Baptist Publication Society and will be brought out from time to time during the next few years. Will Tell of Nicaraguan Work

One of the speakers at the Northern Baptist Convention, to be held in Cleveland this year from May 26-31, will be Mrs. Courtney Rudd Bixby.

Mrs. Bixby is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. A. B. Rudd, veteran Baptist missionaries to Latin America. Since 1939, she has been in charge of social and evangelistic work at the Evelyn Briggs Cranska Memorial Hospital in Managua, Nicaragua.

"Through the length and breadth of Nicaragua this Baptist hospital is known and loved," says Mrs. Bixby. There are two clinics, a pay one and a charity one. The first is attended by Dr. John S. Pixley, and the charity clinic by a Nicaraguan, Dr. Sanchez, who got his high school education at our Baptist school in Managua. Dr. Pixley is frequently called to distant points by wealthy people, for his ability

is widely acknowledged. He can't leave his work often, but goes when he can, for this means money for the hospital—money that enables him to take care of more poor people who cannot pay.

Dr. Pixley has volunteered for army service, and if he is accepted Dr. Sanchez and Mrs. Bixby will take charge of the hospital.

Mrs. Bixby says, "We are beginning to see real results in the life of the people; more mothers know the right way to feed and care for their babies, and the girls who train in our Baptist hospital go out and practise the cleanliness they have learned here—in their own homes and in their advice to women and girls. More and more, we are getting into the churches people who first heard the gospel in the clinic services; the message is being taken back into the hills by those who come down for treatment, and we get calls to open work here and there—a direct result of the evangelistic work done in our hospital."

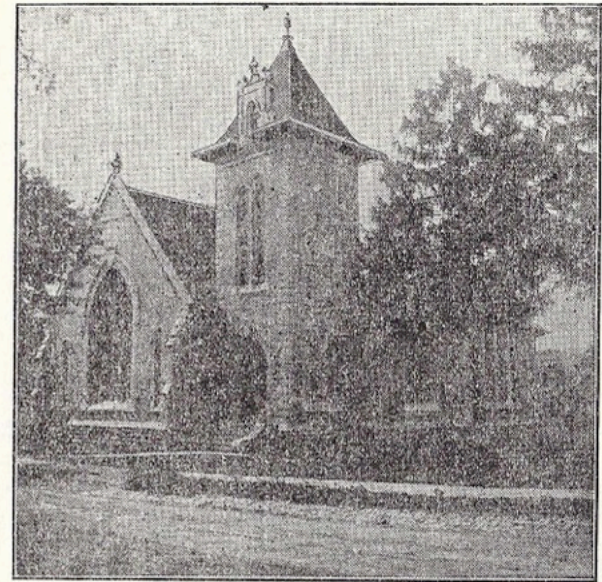

From "Indian Panorama"

A visitor tells of her trip to the mission station at First Mesa in Arizona. She says, "As we walked around on top of the mesa, it seemed to me a dizzy height. Inside one of the second-story houses we visited an older Indian woman who sat in her doorway moulding pottery. We admired the white walls in her simple home, and noted the prayer feathers hanging from the rafters, and *kachinas* or gods on the walls. We felt there the hungry, the unsatisfied longing of the human soul. Later we saw the shrines—piles of stones where many prayer feathers had been dropped. Such prayers and longings deepened our concern that these people might know God. Here and there children were playing. We held our breath as they ran up ladders, but the Hopi children are sure-footed. They spoke to us in smiles—but what little comfort they know! Generations ago, the Hopis fleeing from the hostile Navajos, built their little stone houses on the mesas. Seven Hopi villages now occupy the tops of these high rocks."

New Book of Missionary Information

Our Northern Baptist Book of Missionary Information will be issued for 1941 as usual, but under a modified plan. The book will not be arranged for daily reading in the sense of having dated articles, though it can still be used as originally planned if desired, for the number of articles will just about account for a month if one is read each day. On the other hand the book will not be designed for use in January exclusively but will be as much a February, March or April book as a January publication. The title will be *New Horizons*, suggestive of the rapidly changing outlook that confronts religion as well as every other phase of human activity. The pictures collected for this edition are considered about the best that have ever been available for such a publication.

These are days of great uncertainty in Japan but they will test how well the Christian work in that country has developed.

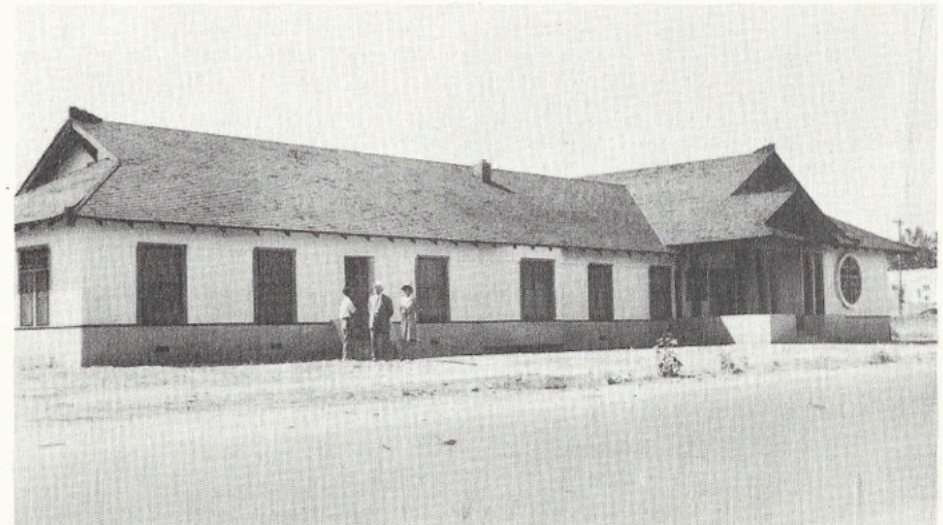
A Great Enterprise

President E. J. Millington says in his message to the people and ministers of the Northern Baptist Convention, "Our Baptist Church School Advance merits and should have the cooperation of every church in the Northern Convention. The problem of Christian education, looked at in the large, seems entirely insoluble, but considered in the light of the experience of each community, the solution becomes clearer and more feasible. In your community (for I think of myself as speaking to every individual member of our Convention), the majority of children of school age are not receiving any religious instruction. The task of correcting this condition lies close to your hand, and nobody can handle it but yourself. Therefore, I urge every member of every church to become familiar with the program of the Baptist Church School Advance, and to give his time, strength, and ability to its execution."

Cure for Leprosy

A happy mind is a great cure for leprosy as well as for other diseases. We try to make all our lepers happy. The men play football; the girls play badminton and volley ball and have lots of fun. Our lepers are well fed. Each leper gets a food allowance of Rs. 1 weekly and cooks his own. We have a big food shop and the lepers have fun making out their lists; no two lists are alike. Every leper bed is clean, and this year every leper girl has been warm at night. This is the first year we have had sufficient bedding. We have a great big thank you to give the White Cross in America. Their gifts have been generous and of great help in all our work.—*From the Annual Report, Jorhat, Assam.*

Convention Adopts Triple Program

Delegates to the Northern Baptist Convention at Cleveland were overjoyed to hear the good news that for the second successive year our Northern Baptist Unified Budget had been over-subscribed, and that we had gone over the top on our 1941-42 World Emergency Fund.

Heartened by this successful outcome, and more than ever conscious of Christian responsibilities in a world at war, the delegates voted unanimously to raise another World Emergency Fund of \$600,000 for 1942-43. The Unified Budget for the coming year was set at \$2,614,000 (\$114,000 more than last year), and it was decided to raise \$250,000 for the Church Extension Reserve Fund. The purpose of the last named project is to lay up now reserves of money which will be used after the war to establish new Baptist churches in growing communities.

It is hoped that the World Emergency Fund may be completed this year by December 6, the Sunday of Sacrifice. So pressing are the calls for relief that our response must be prompt as well as whole-hearted.

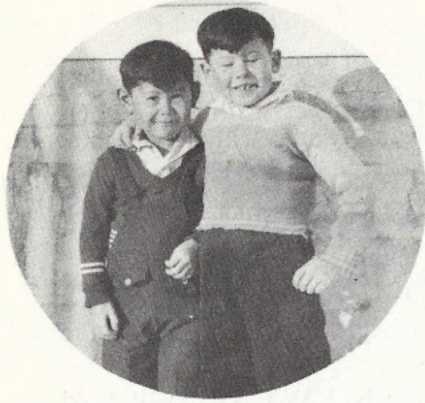

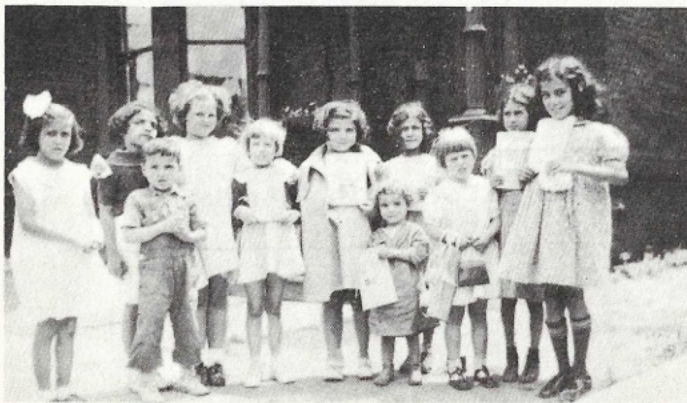

The work of Christian Friendliness volunteers in our churches plays a big part in breaking down race prejudice. One young woman volunteer in a Michigan church was responsible for starting an active program among Mexican migrants, who had been regarded with antagonism by their neighbors as creating a health hazard. The young woman and her husband made calls on the Mexicans and discovered some of their needs and difficulties. Subsequent talks with city officials have brought about better living conditions for the Mexicans, and the church is taking friendly interest.

A Letter from London

"I have received the draft for \$5,000 which you describe as a token gift from the World Relief Committee of the Northern Baptist Convention to our Union to help with the evacuation of children or other immediate needs of the Baptist Union of Great Britain and Ireland. . . .

"The sort of need that is urgent is that of ministers' families and other families in our Baptist churches who have been bombed out of their homes, have to find accommodation elsewhere, find storage for their furniture and pay for it, and if they have to live outside London have all the expense of traveling to and from their work. In such cases when we have been able to help, it has meant a very great deal.

"I am putting these five thousand dollars into our Emergency Fund to be utilized for purposes of relief in the best way possible, and later on I hope to be able to report to you on what has been done.

"I shall be very glad if you will convey to your Committee and the members of the Convention who are behind it an expression of our deep and abiding gratitude for their thought and kindness in the matter and this act of encouragement. Such deeds do more than any mere advocacy by words and speeches to draw Baptists of our countries closer together and lay the foundations of happy work in common tasks in days to come."

The Baptist School in the capital of El Salvador last year enrolled 285 pupils representing the following races and nationalities: Chinese, French, Italian, German, American, and Salvadorean. For the molding of human hearts, few tools are so powerful as books. For the achieving of "One World" there is but one Book that is supreme, The Bible. This statement stands on three pillars of established fact: First, the Bible is already the best-known book in the world. It has been in widespread and continuous use longer than any other book. It has crossed the barriers of language until it now speaks in all the principal tongues of men.

Second, the Bible qualifies as the world's Book because it has for centuries demonstrated its capacity to mold the world's life wherever it has been taken seriously.
