We need to know more about missions. To do this, MISSIONS magazine, CRUSADER, your state paper, books like "Baptists Under the Cross," all help. Beyond information, we need inspiration, so that we give ourselves to mission work. If a church would be missionary minded, it is important that the beginning be in prayer. Prayer will lead to missionary volunteers from each church. Increased concern will lead to more giving. The Baptist World Mission depends upon each individual church member doing his part. Our united effort will mean "Victory through Christ."

Living Statistics


Can you think in terms of millions or billions? Most of us cannot. We are impressed when we hear that the expected baby boom for 1956 is 4,000,000 babies; that 19,000,000 children and young people are outside the sphere of any church; and that 1,000,000 young men and women enroll each year in military service. We are impressed, but we cannot quite fathom the magnitude of such - awæ-inspiring figures.

Statistics in themselves mean little except as they are translated into units of human personality. Jesus had compassion on the great crowds who sought Him. Yet His ministry to the multitudes was always in terms of individual worth. A certain baby, the new family next door, a particular high school graduate, a young draftee: these are living statistics that all of us can understand. They are the embodiment of the challenge of winning America for Christ.

We may respond to that challenge not only through personal witness but through our gifts to the America for Christ offering which will enable others to labor in places where we ourselves cannot be. The church extension pastor, the student counselor, the chaplain, the missionary can accomplish their mission to "win and teach them" only as they are undergirded by our prayers, cooperative efforts, and financial support through the America for Christ offering.

To any save the astronomer it matters little that millions of stars illuminate the evening sky. It is the lone star shining through the bedroom window which gives pleasure and hope through its twinkling radiance. We need not think in terms of thousands, millions, billions in order to win America for Christ. Win and teach them, one by one.

"... say ye that the Lord hath need of him; and straightway he will send him hither."

MARK 11:3

Certainly there can be no doubt about Jesus having surrendered Himself completely to the will of God and certainly there can be no doubt about the Lordship of Jesus. This season reminds us of His power and authority again and the certainty of our witness is to convince people of His-Lordship. In the verse cited above, Jesus is referring to Himself as "Lord." He is preparing to accept the popular acclaim that would soon be His rather than, as heretofore, to try to avoid popular notice.

Noteworthy, however, is the fact that the Lord, the Son of God, still has some needs. In this instance a small colt. The fact is our Saviour still has needs, and, above all, it is His need for our complete surrender to Him.

If Christ is our Lord, specifically our Lord, He has the right to make certain demands of His own followers. If Christ's mission is to succeed, it must first have all-out surrender of those who claim to be His followers. That surrender must maintain a palm-waving Hosanna, more or less sincere. That surrender must be shown in the daily, close walk with Him; in our concern for those who have not yielded to Him; and by our willingness to offer ourselves to His every need.






"God Is Searching for You"

While Ages Roll

As we traveled this summer we passed many churches: city churches with tall spires, white clapboard churches at country crossroads, large churches and small churches, new churches and old churches. Some were like old-world cathedrals and others had the calm simplicity of a New England meetinghouse. As we looked at these churches, what did we think about?

I was reminded of an experience in Bengal a number of years ago when I met with an Indian congregation. On entering the village I went through one of the homes into the courtyard. On one side were the living quarters of the family. On another, the storehouses for the grain and farm implements. On the third side were stalls in which the bullocks stood munching their hay. Spread out on the ground were mats and on them the congregation was sitting. Near the front was another mat, where I was asked to sit with the pastor as he conducted the service. There on that day under the blue Indian sky, sitting cross-legged on the ground I learned a great truth. The church is not the building, the padded pews, the stained glass windows, the surpliced choir or the rolling notes of the organ. The church of the living God consists of the men and women who in humble worship open their hearts to Him for His incomparable love. When it came my turn to speak I commented on this and said that I observed that they did not have a church building. When I finished the pastor said, "No, we do not have a church building. We would like to, but that really does not matter for the church is not what is around us or above us or underneath us. The church is what is in here." And with that, he pointed to his heart and the congregation nodded agreement. In that simple Indian setting lived the eternal church, the church which has outlasted every government that man has devised, every kind of building that his imagination has conceived and any form of creed and of worship.

Come Unto Me

Most of the holidays we observe had their origin with men. Washington's Brithday, Independence Day, Memorial Day and Flag Day, are connected with a great character, a great ideal, or some living principle.


While some people think that Labor Day was instituted to glorify and publicize labor unions or to magnify organized labor, this is not so.

The real principle of labor had its origin in God Himself. He was a working God. Jesus emphasized that fact when He said, "Hitherto my Father worketh and I work." Many of His parables describe the responsibilities of labor.

Sir Josiah Stamp, a British economist held a deep conviction that economics and Christianity should go hand in hand. In a book, on this theme, he wrote that of Jesus' sayings recorded in the gospels around forty percent have to do with the essentially economic activities. The prayer He gave His disciples when they said, "Lord, teach us to pray" gives evidence that to Jesus God's "lordship should be acknowledged . . . over every department of life, including economic institutions and practices."

Jesus also said, "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me, for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls."

And it is only when workers, employers, professional men and women come to Him and examine their daily work in the light of His teaching, that strife, tension and misunderstandings can be eliminated.

A Towering Reminder

Our new church was almost completed. I watched the workmen fit the tall, slender metal cross to the tower. It was nearly evening when they finished. The whole building seemed to breathe of the Spirit of God. And the cross, etched against the sunset, seemed to symbolize the purpose of the building. I was awakened from my reverie by the tug of the foreman on my sleeve. "Sir," he said, "that cross has to be grounded first thing in the morning—a metal cross like that, ungrounded, can be dangerous."


As I walked away, I knew the foreman spoke more truth than he knew. The cross of Christ must always be grounded! It must be grounded in the reality of human experience. It dare not remain an isolated theological concept. It must be a vital part of life itself.

Nineteen hundred years ago, the redemptive love of God was outpoured for all mankind on a cross. Yet, the cross is more than an historical event. It was Jesus who said, "Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross, and follow me." In the words of the old hymn we might ask,

Must Jesus bear the cross alone, and all the world go free? No, there's a cross for everyone and there's a cross for me.

Ground the cross! So long as one hungry pair of hands reaches for bread! So long as one faint cry tells of pain and suffering! So long as one soul lives in the twilight of superstition and ignorance! So long must we ground the cross! For, the Master hath said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these . . . ye have done it unto me."

Thy Word Is Life



There are other times when a man should talk to just as many people as he can, as Jesus did by the seaside.


He gave his friends a plan for life in this world and eternity, saying,

What Will He Find?


And the Lord said, Who then is that faithful and wise steward, whom his Lord shall make ruler over his household, to give them their portion of meat in due season? Blessed is that servant, whom his lord when he cometh shall find so doing.—Luke 12:42, 43

"I bequeath to my daughter Katherine my leather coat, leather waistcoat, black hat and cap; and to my daughter Anne my blue waistcoat, leather breeches and muslin neck cloth and to my daughter Mary my new drugget coat," states the will of Henry Furnis, who died in 1701. In those days when possessions were few, articles of clothing were objects of special bequest. Gunnar Swanson bequeathed "deerskins dressed" and "deerskins not dressed."

. The difficulties and dangers that pioneer preachers underwent were enormous. And the financial weakness of the early churches merits consideration. At that time the smallest gift was a boon. We read of a formal note of thanks for the gift of a small wooden settee, and an elder's debate over whether to buy tallow-dips by the box or the pound. A legacy of \$25 is spoken of as "a great benefaction."

Morgan Edwards, in his Materials Towards a History of American Baptists, says of Pennepak church, "The house was erected in 1707 on a lot of one acre, the gift of Rev. Samuel Jones, in the township of Lower Dublin, county of Philadelphia, eleven miles from the city. To said lot have been added three acres; one the gift of Mr. George Eaton; the other by purchase of the church, whereon are convenient stables, and a fine grove affording shade in summer and firewood in winter. Besides the above mentioned there are other legacies (1) hundred pounds the gift of Peter Duffield, (2) five pounds the gift of Mr. George Eaton, (3) twenty-five pounds the gift of sundry persons. With these helps the living is reputed worth 50 pounds a year to the present minister, Rev. Samuel Jones."

Since these days American Baptists have come a long way. In 1956 total receipts for the on-going work of convention agencies reached an all-time high of \$8,739,958, exceeding the goal by 9.2 percent, \$256,118 more than in 1955. But striking as is this gain, the need has out-paced it and while there is need American Baptists will not rest. The Convention, now in session in Philadelphia, is expected to approve the largest budget in its history.



THROUGHOUF the Christian world the mood of expectancy now prefaces the birth of its Lord and King. Let us rejoice, for Christ is born! For more than nineteen hundred years, the world has prepared, as now, to celebrate the most significant birth in all history.

This was the Child whom the prophets foretold, whom the angel Gabriel announced, whom the angelic host heralded, and to whom mankind has since bowed in homage as to no other. This birth cleft history in two, so that every date before and after now bears the label B.C. or A.D.

As we face Him, we face the miracle of miracles. The feeble mind of man stumbles over lesser miracles and fails to see that in Christmas it confronts the Himalayas of wonders.
