# The Case of the Missing Hyphen

Why should Joe, who was university trained and heading for a promising and financially rewarding business career, have chosen to accept the position in the public relations office at a relatively small, not overly significant, church related college?

His decision was predicated on his burning conviction that higher education must be undergirded by Christian principles if the sacredness of human personality is to be preserved and the eternal purposes of God are not to be completely overshadowed by the limited immediate and earthbound aims of men.

More than once I heard Joe say: "If it hadn't been for my pastor and the church where I grew up I certainly wouldn't be here now. As a matter of fact, I doubt if I would even be a Christian."

How grateful we are for the pastor who, together with his congregation, influenced the entire course of Joe's life. Who was this pastor? Where did he come from? Some little church, quite insignificant in terms of human measurements, had sent him into the ministry.

Leadership for the church's outreach at home and overseas depends in large measure on each church taking seriously the

charge to send laborers into the harvest.

Last summer, for want of a hyphen, a U. S. Atlas rocket and \$18,000,000 were lost. The hyphen was missing from a computer equation. The error led to the destruction at Cape Canaveral of a Venus space probe launch vehicle and its scientific package.

· The word left unspoken, or lack of a planned program in local churches to send able young people into the ministry, may be compared with the missing hyphen which resulted in the loss of an Atlas rocket, except that the resulting loss may be

more tragic.

Paul asks: "... how can men preach unless they are sent?" When did your church last send someone into the min-

istry? Don't let your church be the "missing hyphen."

# Youth in Need

Seldom in all history have youth stood in such acute need of faith, hope and love. With the crisis of our times, a lack of personal relationships with meaning, the lure of our materialistic culture, and the complexities of modern living, it is difficult for contemporary youth to discover a life challenge and purpose. Youth are in need today!

Faith, hope and love are simply "words" to many. For others they are only hollow symbols devoid of true meaning because youth have not experienced them personally. In our complex society youth are thirsty for meaningful relationships with God in Christ as well as both youth and adults. Only as you and I personify faith, hope and love can such words convey meaning to others.

The cover symbols of the cross, anchor and heart are not the only symbols vying for the attention of youth today. Other symbols such as the dollar, the hammer and sickle, job security and retirement benefits, the automobile, sex, clothing and other status symbols of our world compete equally for the commitment of youth. Teenagers are in need of symbols with which they can identify and to which they can give their lives. Unfortunately, any symbol can become a god. Even in the Old Testament times the Hebrew people had this same problem of more than one god and more than one symbol which they worshipped.

At the center of every Christian's life should be the cross of Christ. It should be central in our lives as more than just a "symbol." Personal faith and experience in the Christian life provides for our understanding of love and hope. As "members one of another" both youth and adults can aid one another to discover meaning, value and purpose through the cross as youth stand in need of a faith and hope for the future motivated by love.

# What I Think of the Other Person

What I think of myself has just about everything to do with what I think of the other person. If I like myself too much, I probably will like him less. If I think too little of myself, my regard for the other man will not mean much.

The Beatitudes as they are found in Matthew 5:3-12, suggest what one ought to think about myself. These are wholesome ideas. They make a man honest with himself. They put the man in the position to be a good brother to someone else. When one thinks of himself as a son of God and yet is not proud but humble, he then becomes one whose brotherly feelings are true. As a spiritual discipline, substitute the words, "I am" for "Blessed are" in each Beatitude. For example, read "I am merciful" and "I am pure in heart," and consider what it means to be a "blessed one."

Turn this set of Beatitudes around the other way and see how these virtues appear when they are seen in the other man. We want friends who are poor in spirit, in other words, who are not self-righteous. It is good to have friends who hunger and thirst after a right relationship with God, and that means also a right relationship with their fellow man. The gentle virtues lead to brotherhood and the virtues that we sometimes think are the brave and mighty virtues often lead to broken relationships.

The last Beatitude makes more brothers than any other. People who are persecuted because of their relationship to God draw close to each other. People who are so far from God that they never suffer any of the pain of the cross will never know true brotherhood. The Beatitudes, lived carefully on Brotherhood Sunday and every day suggest the way to brotherhood among races and among all people.

# Deliverance

"Who will deliver me from this body of death?" (Rom. 7:24) surges forth from the depths of Paul's being and speaks to the depths of every man, for who has not known bondage?


Who has not known the anxieties, doubts and hesitancies of all insecure and uncertain men? Who does not share the bondage of a threatened humanity, today from nuclear testing, yesterday from screeching missiles, and tomorrow from . . .? Who is free from sin?

The most disturbing thing is that the battle lines between evil and good, what is and what ought to be, the ways of men and the will of God, run right through the life of every person. It was this Paul felt. It is this faltering in that which one approves; this spending of self in that which one does not approve; this seeming failure in spite of all that gnaws at the soul of every sensitive Christian.

"Who will deliver?" asked Paul. But he answered his own question. "Thanks be to God." He it is who, in Christ, sets "free from the law of sin and death." Free, then, by the grace of God from the shackles and shadows of the past, a person is free to live and witness steadfastly to his Deliverer in our tortured day. He it is in whom the Christian hopes, who holds the time of men in his hands. Delivered from fruitless anxiety about the still-veiled future, the Christian is free to live in loving obedience in the midst of the demands of his days.

The Psalmist, too, cried out for deliverance and he added, "Teach me to do thy will."

# Christ Makes Repentance Possible



## "A Future Beyond Calculation"

America is a nation of colleges. Our country owes the founding of many of these colleges to her churches. The churches continue to undergird the colleges, especially the Christian ones, and to encourage their young people to attend them.

For many years now Baptists have set aside a definite Sunday to be known as Baptist Education Day. In West Virginia, this Sunday is more commonly known as A-B Sunday. What we call this Sunday is not important, but what we do because of it, is important!

In 1953, President Dwight D. Eisenhower said of the small liberal arts colleges in America: "Already they have contributed much to the American way. Their potential contributions to the country's future are beyond calculation. ." We feel this describes Alderson-Broaddus—her future is "beyond calculation!"

Building on the important traditions of the past, and believing that the Christian college has a mission in today's world to both the academic and the Christian community, A-B is moving into the future with boldness and with faith. Already the faculty and trustees have offered a new program which will make possible an enrollment of 1100 students, most of whom will be in classes on campus, while others are engaged in off-campus experiences, either overseas among other cultures, or in service projects in industry, the arts, and professions.

In order to achieve this program of academic depth and enrichment the College will go on a year-round quarter plan in September 1964, will increase its faculty, reorganize the entire curriculum, and build additional facilities.

Alderson-Broaddus sees in this program "a future beyond calculation" because it will give breadth to the individual's preparation to live, work, and witness in the world of his generation. It will involve the church, the community, industry, and the professions, along with the College, in the education of young people. This new program is dedicated to the service of the students who enroll at A-B and to the churches from which they come but, most of all, to this nation and to a world in which the Christian college gives her witness.

She was a lovely young teenager with dark, beautifully-kept hair. She greeted everyone with a smile and with joy in her low, musical voice. Lorraine gave everyone a "lift" of spirit as she walked with courage through a day's activities. She was

blind. But that never daunted this girl.

All her school years were spent in a resident state school for the blind, located across the street from the First Baptist Church. Lorraine and dozens of her school mates attended Sunday Church School, morning worship, and weekday religious education classes in that church. Church members took the young people on outings, to concerts and to plays. When it was their turn, the boys and girls at the school were hosts at an athletic meet in their gymn, or at a splash party in the school pool, or they put on elaborate plays in the auditorium for their friends and the community.

Lorraine had exceptional talent in music. She put in many practice hours on piano and organ. She was invited to present an organ concert at the church and for it she practiced in the


huge sanctuary day after day.

On Sunday mornings, two third-graders would "call" for Lorraine in the high school class upstairs and take her to their department where she not only accompanied all their songs but taught the boys and girls some songs herself. They loved her. When the music moments of their schedule were ended, two other children escorted their beloved friend back to her class.

Lorraine graduated from her school. Her home community upstate saw to it that she had a good position playing an organ there.

# Thy Will Be Done


At least once a day we pray, "Thy will be done" but what are we doing to implement our prayers? Do we consider that we have done our duty once we have prayed that God's will may be done on earth? What many of us seem to mean is that we won't stand in God's way.

In the garden of Gethsemane Jesus sought God through prayer. His own example illustrated what it meant to pray, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." It was in the words, "Nevertheless, not as I will but as Thou wilt," that Jesus evidenced His great faith in God and His willingness to make any sacrifice that was necessary for God's will to be done on earth. He placed himself in God's hands. He told His Father of His own desires but acknowledged that God's will should prevail.

Each time we seek God through the Lord's prayer are we prepared to make whatever sacrifice is necessary to implement our prayer? Are we placing ourselves in God's hands?

Absolute trust in God-in His love and concern for us-will enable us to be true servants of God. Only by acknowledging that all we are and have belongs to God, can we mean what we say when we pray, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven."



To sow this vital seed is the Church's most pressing task. The harvest will be in terms of immortal souls saved.



Some time before William Axling's passing, he was in conversation with a colleague about earlier days as a missionary in Japan. He was reminiscing about former trials and triumphs through more than forty years of service. All manner of hardship had been the lot of himself and Mrs. Axling. They had lost all worldly possessions several times. They had been imprisoned and separated from each other. Sometimes sickness hindered their work. Sin and evil caused great resistance to their attempts to preach the claims of Christ:

In what more simple but human way could God communicate His desire to be one with us than to be born into the world as we are born into the world?


His beloved Son was called "Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." But, He was also called "Emmanuel"—meaning God with us. Being born *into* the world was risky for Jesus, the Son of God. Yet, how else could He have best demonstrated to each one of us that He could and would be with us?

Jesus experienced every level of life that you and I experience. Jesus hungered, wept, thirsted, sorrowed, became tired, was lonely, was tempted, suffered and died. These and other experiences were His—similar to many of our own experiences.—And He is God with us.



"Jesus is riding down Main Street!"

If this were heard today, who would drop everything and rush out to see the Lord?

In Jerusalem so long ago, on that day of the Triumphal Entry, not every inhabitant of the great city went out to spread palms and garments in the way. There were so many preparations to be made for the Passover! And, undoubtedly he would come again at a more convenient time.

Our occupations might include a TV spectacular, a dessert to finish, a party in progress, shopping, an automobile ride, a lively dialogue with friends—he will come again.


But in Jerusalem it was the last chance. Unless, of course, you could count the Crucifixion as an opportunity to see him. Surely, it was the last chance for the people to rally behind him until the authorities would not have dared to touch him. For many it was the last chance for healing and the last chance to have a first-hand acquaintance with the Son of God.

We are sophisticated and know the answers; we are not morbid enough to be concerned with the last chances!

And yet—suppose that Christ could be found on our Main Street today. Would some of us run to see him? Would we sacrifice our best coats for him? Would we risk being laughed at? Would we look around carefully to see who was watching before we risked a weak, "Hosanna!"?

This Palm Sunday may be our best chance (if not our last) to gain a vision of the King of Kings. Good Friday will come soon, but today is a day for gladness and for rejoicing.

What is the analysis of this water? To hear Jesus is a commission to be honest with Him. The approval of this water is the drinking of it.


It is more than a religious act to drink deeply. It is a way of life. Each one is aware of other streams and currents that will not be stayed. Each one drinks from some fountain.

Man seeks to understand these deep currents: the enigmas of "who is my neighbor," of death, of material things. Man climbs to new levels of understanding of mathematics, chemistry, electronics, society and art. Each new discovery suggests the idea of a stream of pure water. Yet, purity is so very elusive.

The analysis of this water is found in the Gospels. It has, except for Jesus, an unattainable purity. Yet, this water is so very available.

There are two characteristics in the water Jesus offers. First, the beginning Christian can quench his thirst. Second, this water supplies an ever challenging vision for the mature worker. A vision that commissions him to love his neighbor, not to select him. Therein is unequalled energy. When a life is watered with this water, that living soul must spend himself amid two expressions—without which, there is no honesty with Jesus. A personal freedom must be expressed and a determination to make one's life a sacrifice for his generation must be revealed, because he is athirst for nothing else.






