What a blessing it was to hear the organ on Christmas Eve, a sound that has not been heard in our church for about five months, and it lifted us! In the coming year, we look also to the repair of the church tower, which hasn't received comprehensive maintenance since it was built in 1898.

Many churches these days are not building towers or steeples as they did in the past. When the ones that are still left are gone, it will be a loss of an architectural design that points to the sky and reminds us, like the music, that we have been lifted up. Tall things have always raised the spirits of the faithful by pointing to heaven itself.

I am reminded of the 121st Psalm:

"I lift up my eyes to the mountains—
where does my help come from?

My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth."

The tallest mountain in the world is a little more than 29,000 feet. That seems impressive, until the realization



that it is less than six miles high, which if it was laid down from its base to its peak, would stretch only from somewhere on the east side of Delaware to somewhere on the west side.

Human achievements are even more earthbound; skyscrapers, which, like spires and towers cause us to look up, can reach around 2,500 feet (the tallest is now 2,700), although most are in the 1,000 to 1,500 foot range. The world record in the high jump is a mere 8 feet, which *is* actually amazing if you are standing next to it when someone does it.

When we extend our gaze upward, and look away from the earth below, it is possible to stretch our imaginations to the stars, and to acknowledge our earthly home as the beginning place of a journey that leads to the heights, from which God reaches down to bless us with the hope of eternal life, and to give meaning to earth's own grandeur, and to the human

feats that are otherwise not as impressive as they at first appear.

The language of being high and lifted up comes from the Book of Isaiah, and I thought I would leave off with a reference that catches the spirit of what I am trying to say;

"For this is what the high and exalted One says—

he who lives forever, whose name is holy:

I live in a high and holy place, but also with the one who is contrite and lowly in spirit, to revive the spirit of the lowly and to revive the heart of the contrite." Isaiah 57:15

Throughout this new year, as we see the work on the tower completed, may our eyes and hearts be directed to the skies, and may our spirits be lifted up by God's eternal promises.

Tower Repair Project

At our quarterly business meeting on October 23rd, the fellowship approved moving forward with the Tower Repair Project. This will include replacing any missing or damaged slates on the upper tower roof and repairing the roof overhang. The slate over the lower portion of the roof will be replaced along with gutters and some painting.

The cost of the project is estimated at \$49,550. This expense will exhaust our Memorials and Capital Improvements Funds. Our goal is to replenish the Capital Improvements Fund within five years. We are seeking gifts, donations, and memorial contributions to offset the cost of the project. As of Dec. 8th, we have received \$4,770 for the project. Your pledges and donations are appreciated.
