A MESSAGE FOR EVERYONE!!

We have a tradition in our church which has never failed. Whenever there is a need of any kind, once it has been explained, we rise up to meet it. Therefore we want to call your attention to a financial need your church is experiencing.

Last year was a good year for church finances. However, rising costs of living cut into our treasury, and, at the same time, revenues began to slack off

near the end of the year.

At the present time there is a list of bills due, and our treasurer reports she has a balance in the general fund of but \$75. Bills payable by the end of February are as follows:

M & M Pension & Insurance	\$403
Church School supplies	162
Duplicating supplies	36
Workmen's compensation	35
Flowers	11
Salaries (minister, choir director, organist, part overdue)	561
Phone & supplemental heat (house)	45

In addition, \$173 is needed for the building fund by the end of this month.

A little arithmetic reveals that we must average \$392 per Sunday the remainder of this month for the general fund, and \$58 for the building fund.

What then, in the face of these facts,

is our responsibility?

First of all, we need to remember that the rise in living costs effects your

church as well as yourself.

Second, we must remember that the income of the church is strictly on a voluntary basis. It is a matter between onrselves and our conscience, ourselves and God.

Third, we must keep faithful with our own individual plan of giving. If we permit rising costs to cut our level of giving, the church will be faced with an impossible situation in meeting its own responsibilities.

Fourth, we must ask ourselves, "Can I give a bit more this year?" If everyone will increase his gift just a little per week, the effect can be powerful. For example, last year 25 persons gave nothing of record to the church. If these members had given only a dollar per week, we would have received an additional \$1300 and our present critical situation would not have risen.

Fifth, we must ask if we really believe in the Christian Faith. We need to examine our level of commitment. We are all hit by rising living costs, but surely a dollar additional per week is not above our dedication. This is about the price of a pound of ground beef! Ask, "What can I give over and above my regular gift?"

We do not believe in high pressure financial drives. We know that if you are aware of our needs, you will respond.

tion as well as that of Jesus. There were no comments on my suggestion. I don't know if you tried it and liked it, didn't like it, were offended by it, planned to try it but forgot it in the rush of eggs, rabbits, and new clothes, or what have you! Anyway, I liked it and I'm tossing it out again. In other words, here is a partial rerun of last year's editorial message.

"I'm sure you will read the accounts of the resurrection of Jesus as they are given in the New Testament. Let me suggest something else - meditate on your own resurrection. I don't mean some experience that comes to you after death, but an experience that should be a part of your life. The power that raised Jesus from the dead is the same power by which Jesus healed and it is the same power that is available to us if we learn to use it! It is the Divine Potency that is inherent in every atom and which is most perfectly available and at work in our consciousness. Paul called it the Mind of Christ. It is also referred to as the Holy Spirit. Sometimes it is called the Word, or Divine Wisdom. But no matter how we name it, it is here, it is in you, and it can change your life and circumstances. This is the meaning of the "resurrecting power of God."

The light in the baptistry is burning so that anyone in the room can see the full figure of Jesus in Sallman's "The Presence" which hangs on the baptistry's rear wall. An altar stands in the center of the chancel and on it is a cross and two candlesticks. The cross represents Jesus' sacrifice of Himself for us and the candles remind us that He is the light of the world. The window on the south wall pictures Jesus knocking at the heart's door and in the east window Jesus sits talking with a Samaritan woman.

Our church could be called the House of Jesus.

Someone asked me if it bothers me to work alone in the church at night. It is an open church and I am a night person and I work late. No, it doesn't bother me at all. There is a presence here. The statue, the paintings, the windows, the altar all symbol ze the reality of the presence. And in that presence there can be no fear, just love and power.

The church exists to tell everyone that He is here . . . that this is the House of Jesus. (J.B.S.)

The Trustees wish to thank the adult class as well as all members for helping to conserve heat during the winter months. The adult class met in the Sunday School Room during the colder months and we did not heat the Fellowship Hall, saving many dollars on the gas bill. We would like all members to give us ideas about saving gas and electricity during the summer as well as winter.

The need for volunteer janitors is with us for the forseeable future. Any day of the week is fine so long as the pews are dusted on Saturday. If the whole church seems too big a project a good suggestion would be to go together with another family, one doing the new building and one the old.

Any one who would like to take a turn mowing the grass contact Peter White or do it if you feel it needs it. The church mower is in the shop but will be out shortly.

The trustees feel that these two areas will be kept on a volunteer basis for a long time due to our financial condition. We are still behind on organist and choir director salaries.

A major project was complete in the parsonage recently. It included a new sink with new cupboards and counter tops around it. The storage space was greatly increased with larger drawers. A new outlet was installed and the sink is equiped with a rinse spray. All new plumbing was necessary back to the water source and the hot water heater. It makes for a much more attractive kitchen including the new walltex paper of about two years ago. Plans to remodel the bathroom and do repair work to the eves have been shelved pending the parsonage decision this summer. The cost of the new sink is about 75% recoverable as the entire unit is just bolted to the wall. However, the other two projects would be permanent. Hence the decision to see which direction the church takes.

The new study-office was ready for use April 15. The trustees wish to thank the volunteers who worked so hard putting up the new wall that divides the former class room. The office was an outgrowth of projects contemplated at the parsonage. When we had estimates for redoing the old study in the parsonage and the fact that no major decision on the parsonage had been made, it was an easy and wise decision to move it to the church. Three walls are painted yellow and the fourth wall is paneled. All shelving, cabinets and furniture are now in natural wood. Only a few items are left to do such as drapes and another item or two of furniture. It is a very pleasant room and a nice adition to our church.

WHITES PRESENT GIFT TO THE CHURCH

A gift from Peter and Linda White this spring was the restoration of the rear walls of the church, these being the west walls, the rear of the sanctuary and the rear of the junior high and choir rooms. The work included sandblasting, pointing. of all bricks, and last a heavy silicone waterproofing was applied. Many broken and disintegrating brisks were replaced beneath the baptistry window where water had come through and peeled the paint below. The work is complete except painting the wood trim. A good view of it can be had from thealley and in the yard on the south side of the educational building. Imperial Maintenance of Delaware did the work. They have done many projects around town include ing St. Mary's, Troy Chapel, and the Christian Science church.

I knew what she was asking of me at that moment - to take her in my arms and be her mother. But I was afraid of making a fool of myself (she had always had an acid tongue). And I was in a hurry - I wanted to get away before the rush hour traffic got too bad, and there were old resentments between us which had never quite healed. So I said something non-committal and went away. A few days later we chatted briefly on the telephone.

A few weeks later she killed herself. I had not stabbed or shot her, nor administered the tablets which poisoned her. But I had let her starve before my eyes.

A REQUESTED RECIPE

Many of you recall with warm affection a dear friend, Vesta Drey. Ernestine Frost has responded to a number of requests by offering the following recipe for Vesta's Skillet Cookies:

- 2 tablesp, butter or margerine
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 4 teasp. salt
- 1 teasp. vanilla
- 1½ or 2 cups dates, chopped
- 1 2 cups nuts, chopped
- 3 cups Rice Krispies (more may be used)

Melt butter in skillet over low fire. Stir in eggs, sugar, salt, vanilla, dates, and cook slowly, stirring constantly, until mixture becomes thick, about 8 minutes. Add Rice Krispies and chopped nuts. Stir and cool until mixture can be handled. Turn out on waxed paper sprinkled with confectioner's suger and angel flak cocomut (latter is optional). Divide into two rolls. Chill in refrigerator and slice as desired. Do not bake.
