Our Shrove Tuesday event included a sausage and pancake supper followed by a fine Talent Show.


Ash Wednesday worship Feb. 20 was held in the Assembly Room with about 40 present and sharing in the lively discussion.

God is everywhere!







REPORT ON FINANCES

As of August 18, we have completed 33 weeks of the budget year, with 19 weeks remaining. At this point, support for the church operating budget is \$2069 short. The weekly offering must average \$620 throughout the year to meet the budget, but have actually averaged \$557. In the past 9 weeks since my last report, the average has declined \$2.

If this trend continues without an offsetting reduction in expenses, we would end the year \$3251 in debt.

In order to meet the budget without reducing expenses (there are no easy or

painless reductions possible), offerings must average \$728 per week for the remainder of the year. This means and average increase of about \$3.50 for each giving unit.

The circumstances call for concern, but we are certainly not without hope.

On the mission support side, we are doing much better than last year, although giving is still under the promised level. The weekly average is \$56 (up \$2 from my last report) against a planned average of \$68. In order to reach our promised support goal, offerings must average \$89, which is an increase of about 70c for each giving unit.

COMMUNITY ADVENT SERVICE


