
Thanks Jr. High Class (Debbie, Jeff) for your song-writing efforts.

PASTORGRAPHS

More than once in recent days I have been reminded of what a varied and vital Christian fellowship we have in the First Baptist family.

Some of us would readily admit to being just ordinary people. Paul reminded the early church that not many of them were worldly wise, high and mighty or from high society when God called them into His Church. Like This Church today, it included a colorful combination of the has-beens, the not-yets, and never-will-bes.

But all of us ordinary people should not feel like failures when we don't produce the great spiritual accomplishments that others do. Sometimes I get discouraged and feel my work's in vain, but then the Holy Spirit revives my soul again. I feel God honors us by looking not at our limited achievements but at our willingness to do His will with the gifts we have been given.

It's like a parent cherishing a simple homemade gift from a child. She wrapped it carefully, tenderly - a dime, a nickle, and a penny and placed them in a soap wrapper and neatly closed its top. And then in her very best first-grade printing she wrote: WHAT IS IN THIS BOX IS FOR LOVE. And then she gave it to her grandmother - an after-Christmas gesture, an unexpected gift of the heart. To whom much is given, much is required; to whom less is given, less is required (LK 12:48b).

Our Lord is surely pleased when our giving to Him is spontaneous - perhaps unorthodox - without season, or reason, or strings attached, and when it is simple, overflowing, because ordinary folk love.

He wants us to do what we can, where we are, with what we've got. We can praise

the great accomplishments of our highly talented brothers and sisters. But by the grace of God, our lesser accomplishments may also be honored by the words, "Well done, good and faithful servant." Peter reminds us that we are God's own people chosen to declare the wonderful deeds of him who called us out of darkness into his marvelous light (1 Peter 2:9). Maybe this was the inspiration for the oldtime spiritual we ordinary folk love to sing: "If you cannot preach like Peter, and cannot pray like Paul, you can tell the love of Jesus, and say, 'He died for all.'"

Let's do more of that through these days of LENT.



CHURCH WOMEN UNITED HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of Church Women United was held on January 22nd with a potluck luncheon at William St. Church with eleven churches represented.

Nancy Rietz reported that Church World Service picked up 673 pounds of clothing from 10 churches, including 57 kits and 24 blankets.

Gerry Benz led devotions with the theme centered on "God loves a cheerful giver."

The Bazaar held for the nursing homes in December was a success (Beth Trigg collected items in our church). The money raised will be used to sponsor a picnic this summer for nursing home residents. Charlotte Gallant will be the chairperson. She could use help.

Nancy Prindle from Homemaker Home and ealth Aid spoke on the function of their organization in the community. She expressed concern for the people that she visits, and commented that most of the families are depressed and discouraged because they don't feel satisfaction in anything they do and have a "why bother" attitude.

She feels that there is a definite need for outreach in Delaware and is calling upon churches for help.

Church Women United has adopted the proposal of organizing a group for the purpose of meeting other women's and children's needs called "Woman to Woman." "Woman to Woman" is in the planning stages and is beginning by asking for a representative from each church to be a part of the group. They want to provide training for women interested in becoming part of this program.

It would mean providing a need such as taking a child to the doctor, helping with a household chore and most of all helping someone feel better about themselves and what they do.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT FOR THE FOURTH QUARTER OF 1987

Operating Expenses:

\$8,599 was contributed in this quarter, bringing the total for the year to \$30,400.00 (this does not include contributions of \$778.00 made by those attending our annual retreat at Judson Hills). This amount represents 94% of the 1987 operating budget.

Missions:

\$913.00 was contributed in this quarter. Contributions for the year totalled \$3,199.00. This amount represents 91% of the goals set for 1987.

Love Gift:

This is an over and above gift for special

projects. \$46.63 was contributed in this quarter. Contributions for the year came o \$169.93.

Funding Our Future:

\$36.00 was contributed in the fourth quarter. Contributions for the year came to \$467.00.

World Fellowship Offering:

This special offering generated contributions totalling \$253.45.

This special offering generated contributions totalling \$228.31.

- You will be expected to share your experiences with the church when you return.


Of course, anyone else may attend any conference if they wish to pay their own way.

HELP GIVEN TO NEEDY FAMILY

A family in Delaware County has been touched by an outpouring of love . . . the special gift of the First Baptist Men's Fellowship.

Five children - including one infant and one, an elementary school age child with a urinary bladder problem - created mountains of laundry. The mother wrote the following words (excerpt):


"... This year I had (surgery). I was layed up for quite some time (sic). This past year I have gone through some very hard time (sic). I had neglected my children to an extent, I at times wasn't even sure who I was. I had debated suicide several times and I was having a hard time trying to get anyone to understand what I was going through.

With the help of <u>(persons named)</u>, I am now on <u>(medication)</u> . . . I hope now I can give (child's name) the help she needs."

From the heart of a survivalist mother and from my very own heart - from which the referral to the Men's Fellowship came - all say to these exemplary men, thank you and God bless you all!

PASTORGRAPHS

Since 1984 our American Baptist family has been involved in a six-year emphasis - GROW BY CARING - the outgrowth of a national-level committee led by Richard Rusbuldt. He tells the story that one recent winter at our American Baptist Assembly in Green Lake, Wisc., as the weather worsened, a rim of ice pushed persistently outward from the shore. Then one night when the temperature dropped suddenly to 20 degrees below zero the entire lake surface became a sheet of ice trapping some ducks and freezing them fast.

However, some other ducks nearby saw their plight, came and huddled closely to them and refused to be disturbed until the ice was thawed by the heat of their bodies. Caring makes good things happen, even for ducks! And when caring Christians in Delaware focus faith and energy on the growth and ministry of the church, great things can happen to us!

Have you noticed how the adjectives
"loving and caring" are so frequently used
to support one another? God calls us
each one to be a caring person. Jesus
was a caring person while on earth.
1 Peter 5:7 "...for He cares about you"
reveals the caring nature of God. The
Holy Spirit is called the Comforter or
Counselor in John 16, one who cares.

When you received Christ in your life He gave you His Spirit so you can be remade in His likeness, part of which is to be a caring person.

In a sermon recently, I suggested that we might learn to love and care for one other soul brother or sister in our church family this year and allow them to care for us. And around our city, single, separated, divorced, and widowed women

may grow in loving and caring ways for other such women in our community. Our Diaconate, through a family watchcare ministry, will care for persons who have become less than active in worship and nurture. We want to learn what they are feeling and be of what help we can be. We do not want the lament of Psalm 142:4 to be true of us, "No one takes notice of me...no one cares for me."

The Russian Baptist office in Moscow telegrammed, "Praise the Lord! All Barclay books reached Baptist Union. Many thanks! May God bless you all."

Soviet Baptists are urging prayer for another B.W.A. project during 1988 when 100,000 Bibles will be sent to the Soviet Union.



All of which raises the interesting question, why did the disciples keep on preaching the resurrection if it was a myth, or fable concocted by them? Do people die for myths they know to be myths?

So at this Easter, let the life of the risen Lord be your life. He has a full-ness to impart that is available to any and all who put their trust in Him and open their hearts to receive from Him.

BOOK OF THE MONTH

KINGDOMS
IN
CONFLICT
C. COLSON

During the primary races of this election year, people are beginning to think more seriously about the relationship of church and state.

Chuck Colson's latest book, KINGDOMS IN CONFLICT explores this issue. He writes out

of a concern expressed in a variety of questions: To what extent can Christians affect public policy? Is there a responsible Christian political role? In a pluralistic society, is it right to seek to influence or impose Christian values? How are the rights of the non-religious protected? Is it possible to find common ground? What does the experience of history say to us today?

Colson understands government to be God ordained to restrain sin by setting boundaries on human behavior, to promote the protection of life and property and to preserve peace and order.

On the other hand, the church is the community that administers and encourages worship of God and meets the spiritual needs of God's people. Tension between church and state is inherent and inevitable...one cannot survive without the other; yet neither can do the work of the other.

Colson writes, "While human politics is based on the premise that society must be changed in order to change people, in the politics of the Kingdom, it is the people who must be changed in order to change society."

KINGDOMS IN CONFLICT is recommended reading for anyone who wants to make a difference in America.

RELIGION IN THE NEWS

It must be pure irony that finds television evangelist Jimmy Swaggart impaled on one of the sins of the flesh that he so righteously rants and raves about in others.

On the other hand, the world could be witnessing a Grand Sense of God's humor at work, a divine and most welcome deflation of an intolerable ego and an insufferable hypocrisy.

Yet again, Mr. Swaggart's confession to having sinned - apparently much the same kind of sin that removed Jim Baker from his ministry (Praise the Lord) - tempts one to look for patterns in these affairs. Is there a common thread? Are those who talk regularly and publicly to God more prone than most to get an occasional wrong number?

Perhaps the strain of being holier than others eventualy takes its awful toll, and a preacher much admired by his flock suddenly finds himself born again as John Smith in a motel register.

For one reason or another, Mr. Swaggert has succumbed to some weakness of the flesh hich is, as yet, only vaguely defined, but evidently of Swaggartian proportians. "I have never skirted or sidestepped uppleasantries," he told a remarkably understanding congregation one Sunday, as he sidestepped the current unpleasantry. He left them grappling with rumors of an encounter with a prostitute in a motel, of voyeurism, and reports of photographic evidence.

This is a preacher who did not get where he is today by sheer luck. Such are his skills in working the crowd that he emerged unscathed from a tear-soaked appearance before his congregation on a recent Sunday.

As confessions go, this breast-beating performance was an unmitigated triumph, and it is expected that the rehabilitation of Jimmy Swaggart will follow smoothly.

Mr. Swaggart has been told by church officials that he may not preach for one year because of his "moral failure" and that he must undergo two years of rehabilitation. He has promptly responded through his lawyer that he rejects this counsel and expects



As we observe Peace Sunday at First Baptist on Sunday, May 1, we pray for the peace that the world cannot give or take away, the peace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace.

There is hardly a word that exercises us more than the word "peace." Of course, in our long history we have always lived with war, injustice, and misery. But we never get used to it! The hope for peace has always remained with us.

We have invented weapons that can blow up our planet in a few hours. Peace has become the new name for survival. In the language of Isaiah, peace is not only a hope for the end of war, but includes justice.

Peace has often been misused as a defense of continued injustice; yet Peace for the oppressed is more unbearable than war. A Prince of Peace who is not at the same time a champion for justice is another dictator, a defender of the rich, and a new oppressor of the poor.

Perhaps the greatest task for our generation is to discover the interrelation and even interdependence of justice and peace. This will require that we do not play the one against the other; not fighting for justice while forgetting the need for peace and not defending peace while sacrificing justice.

The Prince of Peace showed us a way he would say THE WAY - which goes from solidarity to sacrifice and which holds on to both the humility of God and the nobility of man.

PASTORGRAPHS

Young people today face sexual decisions that older generations never contended with. More do's and don'ts, our youth need to know and understand the reasons behind the biblical prohibitions against sexual promiscuity.

Alarming statistics remind us that an adolescent becomes pregnant just about every 30 seconds...There will be over 1,000,000 teen pregnancies this year...The cost of supporting a 15 year old mother and her baby for one year is over \$18,000 ... Over 20 million Americans have incurable herpes...Over a million teens run away yearly and it is estimated that there may be over 500,000 child prostitutes in our nation.

Recently, ABC-TV's NIGHTLINE moderator, Ted Koppel, shared some interesting insights at Duke University: "We have actually convinced ourselves that slogans will save us. 'Shoot up if you must, but use a clean needle.' 'Enjoy sex whenever and with whomever you wish, but wear a condom.' The answer is NO!" Koppel went on to explain why the answer to drugs and free sex must be "NO": "Not because it isn't cool or smart or because you might end up in jail or dying in an AIDS ward, but because it's wrong."

Koppel claims that truth is "Not a polite tap on the shoulder" but a "howling reproach." He concluded, "What Moses brought down from Mt. Sinai were not the Ten Suggestions - but the Ten Commandments!"

Today, parents are encouraged to be the primary guides for their children's sexual development and education. And our young people are more likely to follow what their parents do, than what they say.

According to God's plan, children are to be led by loving example rather than pushed by dictatorial demands... The greatest gift parents can give their children to help them in their sexual development is the gift of themselves - not a book, not a tape, not a condom or a pill, but themselves.

Parents can't influence the sexual development of children if they don't spend time with them. Young people don't need sexual facts and information from their parents as much as they need a loving, intimate, caring relationship.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

After attending such a retreat, one couple wrote, "We needed the retreat as a couple and really gained from it in healing and bringing back the love that we felt we were losing."

In the midst of bankruptcy, one man said at the close of a Crisis Retreat, "I am looking forward to becoming a better Christian, husband, father, and most of all, being at peace with myself."

Yet another came who had attempted suicide twice, and found God and a new willingness to face an unknown future.

American Baptists also share food in Nebraska. Some of it is supplied with OGHS funds. In one home a woman, upon the death of her husband several years ago, was trying to raise seven children under unbelievable conditions and problems. She said, "Tell the food pantry people 'Thank You.' They don't know it but they virtually set this table all summer... we also had three extra mouths over school vacation. The standing joke around here is, 'Cheese again!' and we certainly are thankful to have it to joke about." Caring baptists provided at least one gift for each of the seven children at Christmas.

Our gifts to the 1988 OGHS love offering will provide more Crisis Retreats not just in Nebraska, but Iowa, Kansas, Wyoming, Colorado and other states. Let us give with the prayer and hope that SOMETHING WILL CHANGE because American Baptists CARE AND GIVE.

CHILDREN IN WORSHIP

As mentioned in a previous article, June 12th will be Children's Day. We are always looking for special worship aids designed for children in church. On Children's Day, we again want to incorporate our children into our plans for the service of worship.

Most children can be led to appreciate the worship services if their parents will help them to do so. This prescription is offered for what it's worth.

- Speak of going to the services of worship with the family as a privilege that comes to children when they are 4 years old.
- If possible, give the child a little relaxation such as a short outdoor walk between Sunday School and worship.
- Offer to take care of the child's Sunday School papers during the worship service.
- Sit with the child where he/she can see what is taking place at the front of the sanctuary.

- Suggest that the child stand when others stand; this rests his muscles which get tired staying still.
- Offer the child a song book and find the hymn that is being sung if the child seems interested in having the book open at the right places.
- Help the child to understand that it
 is alright for him/her to move about with
 in the area of the pew as long as he
 moves quietly and doesn't get against
 other people.
- Arrange for the child to have some money to put in the offering plate when it is passed.
- Make occasional opportunities for the pastor to speak with the child either before or after the services.
- Answer intelligently the questions the child asks about things in the sanctuary and about the different parts of the service.
- Attending the worship services with a child can increase his/her feeling of security, for there he/she can come to realize that his father and mother have a source of security outside themselves.
- Your child can sense the joy that comes when Christians worship God together and can be led to appreciate his/her parents wanting him to share this joy with them.

BOOK OF THE MONTH

WHY WAIT:

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE TEEN SEXUALITY CRISIS

by Josh McDowell

Parents, pastors, and teachers need to be equipped to address difficult issues of human sexuality.

They need to provide young people with practical answers that make sense spiritually, socially, psychologically and

physically. Josh McDowell's book entitled "Why Wait: What You Need to Know About the Teen Sexuality Crisis" was written with this in mind.

He observes, "Something has happened to the moral fiber of our nation. At every turn, today's society is telling our youth, 'If it feels good, do it...'

"This book is a rare opportunity for adults to see through the eyes of today's young people, with the hope you will gain insight d understanding of your teen's life, as well as learn effective ways to communicate positive reasons for waiting until marriage for sex."

The book contains full discussions of why teens have premarital sex as well as the physical, spiritual, emotional and relational reasons to wait until marriage for sexual relations. It is obvious that parents do not agree on how to advise their children in this area. Some will agree wholeheartedly with McDowell's discussions, while others will find some of his suggestions simplistic and legalistic.

The value of McDowell's approach is that it provides a broad range of reasons and suggestions for refraining from promiscuous sexual behavior, and parents and teens can discuss the merits of various approaches.



PASTORGRAPHS

I turned on my TV and there was Larry King Live interviewing his guest. As I watched and listened to the exchange of questions and answers, I was reminded that Jesus was regularly interviewed by the Pharisees and Saducees. His disciples also asked him many questions. Though we often think of our Lord speaking earnestly, he certainly was not solemn. Jesus had fun with his disciples, and did the unexpected at times. Imagine the twinkle in his eye as He said, "Do not be anxious about your life...what you shall eat or drink, nor about your bodies, what you shall put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?"

I believe that when Jesus said this, he was dealing with anxious disciples who had left their professions to follow him. James, John, & Peter had left their fishing and Matthew his local Internal Revenue Service. They were concerned about their livelihoods. Jesus teases them and uses the examples of the birds and flowers - reminding them that God even takes care of these. They do what God has called them to do without always grasping after routine...and God cares for their needs. I believe that the message that God would have us hear this summer is... "Have fun. Relax in God's grace and don't be so serious. Do something unexpected." If in our Bible reading we are into Romans (often heavy theology), balance it with something in the Psalms, which are full of praise. Lighten your reading for awhile. If in your prayer life, you're praying for those involved in the tragedies of this fallen world, take time to recall the fun times that God has provided. And in your family life, do they expect a certain routine from you? Try a surprise on the family. Be sensitive to special serendipities that occur and build on them to create fun times. Then around the office or plant, think of ways you can create some unexpected fun among your fellow employees. How can you move them out of their seriousness, their routines? Why not wear a crazy tie or sunglasses to work. Put a crazy cartoon on your door. Do something out of the ordinary - be God's agent for fun to others. I believe that Jesus was the master at enjoying life. Why else would He declare so boldly, "I have come that you may have life and have it in abundance: (John 10:10) To do more than exist we must have more than routine. Summer days and nights give us special opportunity to break free from past patterns. Whenever anyone should inquire of you, "What is the chief end of mankind?", be careful to reply, "To glorify God and ENJOY HIM FOREVER!" Let's make Summer 1988 a time of joyous celebration... of God and His creation!


we need to make a special effort in the spring to bring in clothing and make school kits and health kits for the pick up.

TRUSTEES REPORT

1. The church has acquired a set of hearing devices to be used by those of us who have difficulty in hearing. These were purchased in memory of Elsie Midden, a long-time member of First Baptist. The bulk of the funds came from her children. Also, a thank-you to the healing group for sharing their funds so that the entire project could be completed.



RECEIVER WITH EARPHONE

These devices work off of radio waves sent from a transmitter. This way a person can pick up a receiver in the vestibule and sit anywhere they choose.

The electronics man from Columbus stressed that those of us with soft voices must speak dir

rectly into the pulpit microphone so the PA system will pick it up.

A much longer arm on the pulpit mike has been installed to get the mike closer to the person speaking. Our loudspeakers and mikes will do o.k. if properly

adjusted and this is something that we must continually check.

Several people from outside our congregation have told us that our church has good natural accoustics for those with normal hearing and not to try to totally overcome that feature with a loudspeaker system.

Our new receivers will allow those of us with hearing difficulties to hear clearly, while preserving the natural accoustics in the sanctuary for everyone else.

- 2. A "thank you" goes to Dave Lovell for installing a "hidden" button for the Sunday School bells, so that we could maintain a clean, bare wall in the hallway following the new paint job.
- 3. The church used less gas this year than the monthly budget called for, so in August we paid \$92.05 instead of the monthly budget of \$247.00. The monthly budget next year will be just over \$300.00 to reflect an expected increase in rates.
- 4. Three pianos were tuned by Clifford Rector.

- 1. The carpet in the Sunday School room was steam cleaned. After drying, almost all the wrinkles shrunk out, but it will probably have to be stretched next summer. These are items such as woodwork, doors, fireplace mantels, stained-glass windows, etc. Their warehouses are elsewhere. The old parsonage will just be offices and a computer center.
