#### RULES FOR RENEWAL IN WORSHIP

As our Church Growth Task Force focuses, among other things, on renewal in worship, I found some helpful rules on a paper tucked away in an old Bible.

Worship begins as I close the door to my home. On my way I pray for my church, for the pastor, and for those who worship far and near.

Before I enter the House of God, I pause a moment and leave outside all things and thoughts unbecoming to the Heavenly Father - hates, grudges, frettings, worldly cares and sinful thoughts.

The moment I enter the sanctuary I cease all idle conversation. I come in silence, for great things rise out of quietness and minister to me and those about me.

As soon as I am seated, I bow my head in prayer. I pray for others, as well as myself. I pray for my church and its great cause. I ask God to be near me now.

I join in the singing of the hymns. I think about the words of the music and let their meaning and spirit go down to the roots of my soul.

As I lay my offerings on the plate, I say a prayer of thanks for my money and ask God's blessing on its use here and in the many lands of our Christian mission.

As I listen to the message from God's Word, I seek to apply the message to my life. I pray for the one who preaches.

When the worship time ends, in Christian friendliness, I speak to those I know and to those who are strangers to me.

I remember someone commenting, "Wouldn't it be a great witness for the Church on Sunday morning if those leaving the worship service looked as happy and pleased as they do an hour later leaving the restaurants in town."

Sometimes in a restaurant, our waitress has concluded her service to our table by some personal remarks and occasionally leaves the bill with a little "happy-face" drawn on it. But most food service bills just have a few words.printed on the back like - "It has been a pleasure." But we generally don't see them, do we? Why not? Because they are too impersonal. Yet we use the same tactics and expect them to communicate. Church newsletters inviting people to worship are mailed out. A piece of stationery is sent, inviting people to attend a warm, friendly church. But without the personal contact of people who care enough to send the very best themselves - little influence is exerted.

Have you noticed... God blesses churches that get outside themselves. In the same way, God blesses people who get outside themselves. Invite someone to worship with you at First Baptist each week of the New Year!



#### YEAR-END WRAP UP FROM THE TRUSTEES!!

Arch Trigg will be the Chairman of the Trustees for 1990. Please support him in any way you can.

- 1. The third major electrical project for 1989 was completed with the ceiling fans being rewired into conduit. The Fire Department reinspected and said we now conform to code. The bill has been received and payment
  - The bill has been received and payment has been made for all three electrical projects, i.e. the complete rewiring of the kitchen, the new lights along the north walk and the fans, for a total of \$1,206.00. These were our largest projects for the year.

The largest volunteer project for 1989 was the painting of the back hall which was done by Jim Stephenson.

- 2. The pipe organ was tuned and serviced, as per our annual contract with Gary Mason. This was done just before the church pipe organ tour in October. This year, the tour started at our church. Thank you, Mary Lou! If you missed this interesting experience in about seven downtown churches, join us next year.
- All 8 gas furnaces were serviced by Phil Richert.
- 4. A Thank You goes to the City of Delaware for finally putting our tax dollars to work and repairing and paving the alley behind the church. It is a big improvement!
- 5. The lawnmover was serviced for next summer.
- 6. The gutters and downspouts were cleaned out and a broken window in the bathroom was replaced at the old parsonage.
- 7. A Thank You goes to Will Fogel for filling the baptistry and tending the heaters for Radnor's recent service and also to Dave, Will and Pastor Gene for standing by as church hosts.
- 8. Three pianos were tuned by Clifford Rector.
- A water pipe broke during the cold snap and filled the furnace room with 4 inches of water. It was repaired by Phil Rickert.
- A new light was installed over the kitchen sink by electrician Mike Clark.
- 11. Both sweepers were taken to be overhauled. The Hoover upright has been returned. The Electrolux tank is still waiting for parts.

12. The Trustees assembled our wish list of jobs and projects for the New Year, all of which will depend on money being available. Anyone wishing to give to the repair fund, please see Dick Lee.

Projects that have been given a go ahead but are not completed are roof and gutter repairs by Larry Lathrop. The leak on the stairs in the new building only happens in zero weather and is due to ice and snow buildups.

Also, plaster repairs have been approved in the front bedroom of the old parsonage where the ceiling caved in.

Our prayers and thoughts are with you. Best wishes for the holiday season!





#### LET THE REDEEMED OF THE LORD SAY SO....

Our Deacon of the Month, Cynthia Bland, shared with the congregation in worship n Sunday, February 25, this good news about her spiritual journey within our First Baptist family. Because some were unable to be with us due to a bad winter storm, we wanted to include these remarks in our Good Newsletter and Cynthia has graciously consented to let us include them in this issue .....Editor

"Before leading the Responsive Reading, I'd like to share a few reflections with you. This is not a formal testimony and it's not printed in the bulletin, but I hope you won't mind listening for a couple of minutes as I tell you how God has blessed me in the last few weeks.

In January, when I began serving as a deacon, I felt willing but unworthy and ill-equipped. I didn't feel entirely right with God. Several aspects of my life felt out of control and there were barriers in my relationship with God that I myself had erected. On the evening of January 6, I arrived back in Ohio fter the long drive from North Carolina d served my first communion January 7, willingly but with a terrible sense that I was doing something almost blasphemous. The following Sunday, all of the church includ∉ng the deacons were . While this dedication was offiers, dedicated. meaningful, I still didn't feel worthy to be a spiritual leader in this church, though I wanted to do the job. At the end of the service that Sunday, I came forward at the invitation, feeling an irresistable call to rededicate my life to God so that I could serve God and this congregation effectively as a deacon.

Since then several things in my life have changed, not suddenly, but I believe that my rededication opened me to be healed in several ways. I've always struggled with pessimism but now I find myself engaged in positive thinking a good bit of the time. I'm thinking positively about things I didn't know could think positively about. Instead feeling transient, I feel a security, a rootedness, a sense of being in the right place at the right time in Delaware,

Ohio, at Ohio Wesleyan University and at First Baptist Church. This feeling of security comes as a most pleasant surprise. Instead of sleeping in as long as possible, I get up earlier than I have for a long time. My prayer life has deepened, the barriers I felt between me and God have been battered down. The peace of Christ is with me most of the time. I know that, being human, I will experience doubt from time-to-time, and dry spells in prayer, but the new positive thinking, the feeling of security, and the new drive to get up in the morning seem miraculous to me, and I want to thank God in your presence for this healing.

This month, standing before you, I have also been in the presence of God. I am most grateful to you for this opportunity. And I must tell you that, in spite of our recent problems, I believe the Holy Spirit is in our midst. Not only have I felt this during Sunday morning worship, but also in the Adult Too Sunday School Class, in the Tuesday evening Bible study, at a recent playing of the choir's Christmas contata performance on tape, in private conversations with several of you, and, very powerfully, at Pastor Stephenson's Memorial Service. I have sensed his spirit and his positive influence still at work here.

This month I have felt specially blessed. I want you to know that I'm glad to be part of this church, I pray for its healing and its growth, and especially, I love my church family.

The Choir Loft will accommodate more. So, if you've been thinking about joining, why not do it now?


After Choir rehearsal last Wednesday, the 21st, the Choir enjoyed listening to their Christmas Cantata on a tape made by Jim VanBrimmer.



#### **PASTORGRAPHS**

Beautiful Believer's Baptism will be a part of our Easter celebration of our resurrection faith. We shall again witness the symbolic act of burial and resurrection in an evening worship service in our sanctuary with the Radnor Baptist Church. Victor Fogle and Jarrod Trigg of our First Baptist family will be among those who confess their faith in this service of baptism.

Paul assumed the believers in Colossae had taken this step of public renunciation of self and affirmation to the resurrection life given by Jesus to those who put their trust in him for salvation. Paul doesen't say if you are baptized, but "when you were baptized you were buried with Christ, and in baptism bu were also raised with Christ through faith in the active power of God who raised him from death")Colossians 2:12). He repeats the symbolism during his discussion in chapter 3.

From both the symbolism and the context of the New Testament passages relating to baptism it is obvious that it was for believers who had been converted, and it was by immersion.

While there are many denominations among Christians, not all are obedient to all of Jesus' instructions. While baptism itself does not save, it is an act of obedience to the example of Jesus(Matt. 3:13ff) and his direct command(Matt. 28:19,20). Christians have to be obedient to this example and command. It becomes the privilege of Baptists to give a witness of burial and resurrection not only to unbelievers, but to those believers who have not been obedient to the symbol or command.

Lest Baptists take undue pride in their obedience to what God has commanded his followers, they should also notice the example of Chrisians in other communions, who by obedience other teachings of Jesus, might have something to teach Baptists.

#### JULIAN OF NORWICH

The following information about JULIAN is presented in the hope of persuading you to come to the performance. The play, JULIAN, conveys a vivid sense of what it was like to live in England during Julian's lifetime, c. 1342 - c. 1416. In this period, three outbreaks of the Black Plague killed off about half of the population; England was continually at war with France; the Peasants' Revolt of 1381 almost overthrew the government; and corruption ran rampant through the Church.

For most of Julian's life. she was an anchoress, a recluse, living in a small dwelling adjoining the Church of Saints Julian and Edward in Norwick. She chose this way of life in order to devote herself to prayer and contemplation, but she also functioned as a spiritual advisor for the local community. Today she is highly regarded as a writer, a mystic, and a theologian.

She is the earliest women writer in English that we know by name. The subject of her book, Revelations of Divine Love, is the series of visions of Christ which she experienced at the age of thirty when she believed she was on the point of death from a sudden illness. says in both versions of her book (the "Short text" and the "Long Text" which she spent 20 years writing) that her visions were not just for her, but that God wanted her to share them with the world. As a theologian, she is best known for two concepts: first, despite che effects of sin and the terrible things that happen in this world, God will find a way to "make all things well"; second, just as surely as God can be seen as our father, so God can be seen as our mother.

The play makes Julian's unusual way of life seem natural and appealing, and through its depiction of Julian's life and teachings, it conveys a strong sense of God's love. I hope to see you there!!




#### AN OPPORTUNITY FOR LEADERSHIP TRAINING



#### **PASTORGRAPHS**

The Evangelism Committee of our Church Growth Task Force is presently focusing on a proper definition.

Well, What is Evangelism?

I recall the reply of William T. Hall: It is the sob of God. It is the anguished cry of Jesus as He weeps over a doomed city. Evangelism is the heart-wringing plea of Moses, "Oh, this people have sinned...yet now, if you will forgive their sin...If not blot me, I pray you, out of the book which You have written." It is the cry of John Knox, "Give me Scotland or I die." It is the declaration of John Wesley, "The world is my parish." It is the sob of a parent in the night, weeping over a prodigal child. It is the passion of a great preacher and of a great Christian. It is the secret of a great church.

Howard Bell reminds us that God never told the world to go to church. He told the Church to go to the world. If we do not go, they will not come.

Herb Miller, writing in <u>Fishing On The Asphalt</u>, suggest that many churches are blocked from growth because their leaders. work from three false assumptions: They think people are tired of being asked to attend church. Not so! The average unchurched person is not offended by worship invitations, provided they are given in a positive, friendly manner. By far the largest percentage of Americans have not received a personal invitation to attend church in years. (2) think people will come to church without being contacted personally. They seldom do. Letters do not get them. Personal contact does. (3) They think the average church members are not capable of making effective contacts. They are. The exact wording they use doesn't matter as much using some kind of words. concerned, caring voice of a non abrasive church member has more impact than ten billboards or a telegram.

We remember that Jesus did not hoard the qualities of divinity -- love, hope, peace. He gave them away. Through His Body, the Church, He still gives them away. This is called evangelism.

A Baptist Church organized last October in the Soviet Union, already has about 400 members and between 800 and 1,000 worshipers on Sunday mornings. ## Report from the Pastor Search Committee

Attached to this newsletter are the growth goals and objectives as developed by the Growth Task Force (see story on page 2).

#### MINISTRY OF EVANGELISM

- I. Goal: Define evangelism as an individual and corporate responsibility to witness.
  - A. Develop a working definition of evangelism for use in church outreach and witness, by September 1990. MUST priority.
  - B. Prepare a structured and systematic way to instill said definition within the church membership, by December 1990. OUGHT TO priority.
- If. Goal: Understand evangelism is continuous and pervades all areas of life.
  - A. By December 1990, develop methods of reminding each other of our commitment to Christ's kingdom, when we are dispersed in the community, implementing them as appropriate during 1991. OUGHT TO priority.
- III. Goal: Identification and follow-up of visitors will be continued and expanded.
  - A. Develop a system basic follow-up for identifying visiting prospective members and monitoring each. This system should be in place by June 1991.

    MUST priority.
- IV. Goal: Develop programs in evangelism and outreach specific to all age groups.
  - A. Develop programs for, and monitor progress of, each church group, providing prayer support, encouragement and resources when needed, coordinating the evangelism efforts of the whole church for the edification of the fellowship. MUST priority.
  - B. Develop a strategy of corporate witness for First Baptist Church, Delaware by June 1991. MUST priority.
- V. Goal: Provide congregational education to define types of witness and outreach.
  - A. Create an evangelism committee for the church, headed by the Board of Christian Education member in charge of missions, by March 1991.

    MUST priority.
  - B. The evangelism committee will institute, at least quarterly, workshops covering various types of missions and evangelism, providing church members the opportunity to learn new techniques and methods of witness for home and abroad, by June 1991. WANT TO priority.
- VI. Goal: Organize active participation in witness to the community.
  - A. Provide inspiration, encouragement, and training for participants.
    MUST priority.
  - B. Identify, develop, and cultivate those areas of evangelism to which our church is most responsive. MUST priority.

#### MINISTRY OF CARE

- I. Goal: Members become more aware of and responsive to the needs of those within our fellowship.
  - A. Review and evaluate the telephone calling chain by September 1990. MUST priority.
  - B. Review and evaluate the deacon watch-care program by January 1991. MUST priority.
- II. Goal: Members become more aware of and responsive to the needs of others beyond our fellowship.
  - A. Establish a liaison between church and community service agencies.

    OUGHT TO priority.
- III. Goal: Members unite in caring for the needs of others.
  - A. Share caring opportunities with the appropriate group within the church.

    MUST priority.
  - B. Form a laity support group. OUGHT TO priority.

#### MINISTRY OF WORSHIP

- I. Goal: Worship be Bible-based and inclusive of all expressions of God, Son and Holy Spirit.
  - A. Evaluate to confirm and insure continuance of goal. MUST priority.

- I. B. Research convictions and attitudes of the members regarding theological content of the church's teaching, preaching, and witness. OUGHT TO priority.
  - C. Encourage the use of inclusive language in worship services. OUGHT TO priority.
- II. Goal: Worship services provide a welcoming atmosphere as people gather.
  - A. Develop a strategy for welcoming new persons, by January 1, 1991.
    MUST priority.
  - B. Develop a strategy to prevent neglect of established members, by January 1, 1991. MUST priority.
- III. Goal: Develop a worship service that will include all God's gifted people.
  - A. Develop an inventory of persons with special gifts, by March 1, 1991.

    MUST priority.
- IV. Goal: Inspire and motivate spiritual growth and individual commitment.
  - A. Explore opportunities for new and varied growth experiences, through 1990 and 1991. OUGHT TO priority.
    - B. Explore ways to enhance the prayer life of the church during 1990 and 1991. MUST priority.
- V. Goal: Provide an experience that can be extended beyond the sanctuary.
  - A. Identify areas of the present and potential ministries that are an outgrowth of our worship experience, by March 1991. MUST priority.
  - B. Encourage one another through prayer throughout 1990 and 1991.
    MUST priority.
- VI. Goal: Extablish a worship planning and coordinating group to facilitate continuity in worship.
  - A. Initiate a worship planning and coordinating group by January 1, 1991.

    MUST priority.

#### MINISTRY OF EDUCATION

- I. Goal: Demonstrate the value and importance of Christian education.
  - A. Expand our promotion and advertisement of educational opportunities at First Baptist Church, by September 1991. OUGHT TO priority.
  - B. Develop a plan for increased creativity in individual or group study and endeavor, by September 1991. WANT TO priority.
- II. Goal: Promote our present Sunday School classes and achieve broader service to all age groups within the church.
  - A. Promote opportunities for young adults to have educational and social experiences together, by January 1991. MUST priority.
- III. Goal: Utilize present resources of the established groups within the church, i.e. American Baptist Women, Baptist Youth Fellowship, American Baptist Men, music ministry, Bible Study groups.
  - A. Investigate and suggest established educational programs evailable through American Baptist and other resources appropriate to First Baptist Church groups, by September 1991. OUGHT TO priority.

#### MINISTRY OF SERVICE

- I. Goal: Pursue our programs in world mission and special interest missionaries.
  - A. Aim for one or more special objectives each year, to be determined prior to September 1 each year, and to be incorporated in program planning.

    OUGHT TO priority.
  - B. Establish mission education as a priority concern for the church school and for the congregation in Sunday worship. MUST priority.
- II. Goal: Educate ourselves as to opportunities in our town, and act on one specific need.
  - A. Publicize and promote support for selected programs. OUGHT TO priority.
  - B. Make church facilities available for service or character-building organizations in the community. OUGHT TO priority.
  - C. Establish a way to discover and to communicate to the church opportunties to aid in established programs in human services. MUST priority.

#### MINISTRY OF ADMINISTRATION

- I. Goal: 1) Support the ministries of the church so they can function as planned.
  - 2) Develop a system of communication and follow-up which would assure that the ministries' objectives are accomplished.
  - A. Establish a statistical record-keeping system, by January 1, 1991. MUST priority.
  - B. Develop a tracking system to monitor progress on growth objectives, by January 1, 1991. MUST priority.
