Business Meeting

On Wednesday, January 27 we'll have a covered-dish dinner at 6:30, followed by our annual business meeting at 7:00.

Update from the Sanctuary Carpet and Paint Committee

During December, our carpet installer (Dan's Carpet and Laminates) removed the old sanctuary carpet and installed our new one.

Also during December, our paint contractor (Brian McConnell) painted the assembly room and the two vestibules. (The sanctuary was painted during November.)

The trustees tell me that the painting bill will be approximately \$3,000 higher than originally estimated. This is because the walls were in worse condition than expected and required extensive prep work. We encourage everyone to consider increasing the amount they've pledged for the painting project.

The contractors did a fine job and the committee members are pleased with the results. We've heard many favorable comments from church members, and we hope that the congregation is happy with the sanctuary's new appearance.

Trustees Notes

• The pipe organ was tuned and serviced by John Muller and his assistant of Muller Pipe Organ Company. The cost was \$225. Several defects were noted, and John and his assistant will return for repairs.



• The Gable Elevator company did a regular service inspection and found that the reserve battery is bad. (The reserve battery provides power to lower the elevator to the nearest exit in the event of a power failure.) They will have to return to replace it.

• The gas company made two visits to the "old" parsonage after our renters smelled gas. They couldn't locate a leak, so the gas company shut off the gas to the boiler as a precaution. Following that, Don Patrick made at least five visits, and made minor repairs and adjustments to the boiler at a cost of \$189.17.

• All five pianos were tuned by Richard Dacks, and he made some minor repairs to the piano in the fellowship hall. The cost was \$400. These were the only piano tunings during 2009, since the summer was not too hot, and in the fall we were waiting for the sanctuary painting to be completed as that required moving the sanctuary piano.

• Due to concern over whether compact florescent bulbs would be available in the large size we need, we ordered spare bulbs for the two large lights in the sanctuary and the one large light in the assembly room. We ordered four 750 watt, clear glass, mogul (large) base bulbs from Loeb Electric. The cost was \$145.35. Loeb Electric believes that when incandescent bulbs are phased out, a substitute will not be available. The light over the choir and the light over the gathering place each take a 300 watt clear glass bulb, and no substitute is available at this point.

• Upon the arrival of the paint crew and the subcontractor, Jake Ball (an architect whose crew did all the prep work on the walls), we were informed that the slow but steady water damage to the plaster would soon ruin the new paint job in several areas. We called in Midstate Contractors of Marion, and they did the following:

- On the sanctuary's east side, Midstate installed new flashing under the cap stone and on the back side of the parapet wall.
- On the assembly room's north wall, they installed new flashing under the cap stone and on the back side of the parapet wall over the three windows.
- They found and replaced several broken slates on the roofs of the sanctuary and assembly room behind the steeple.
- They found that the large metal "pans" where these roofs meet the steeple were cracked or split, perhaps from ice dropping from the steeple. These were sealed with a filler-like mat material using asphalt.
- They repaired broken and shifted slate around the rear chimney (used by the gas furnaces) on the west wall of the sanctuary.
- At the "old" parsonage, they replaced a broken and rusted downspout that had leaked water into the basement.

The cost by Midstate was \$3,938.00. Funds for this cost were a gift from the Carolyn White Schneeberger estate. There is no guarantee on a building this old—with all the various roof angles and brick walls that get soaked in the rain—that all leaks were stopped, but it was an all-out effort to at least try to do so.

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Dear FBC family:

With sadness I report that long time member Shirley Parker died on January 18. Although she had been confined to the Arbors in recent years, Shirley kept up with the life of the church. She welcomed a group of us during the Christmas season

for caroling in her room. As was her usual habit she shared a song from her youth with the group. To accommodate Shirley's extended family a memorial service will be held at First Baptist on March 20 at 1:00.

On February 12 the men of the church will reach out beyond our congregation. We have signed on to be greeters and servers at the Second Friday meal at Andrews House. At our Saturday breakfast we had been having ongoing discussions about where we could serve as a group. With our varied schedules the 2nd Friday meal seemed like an excellent choice. Having volunteered there for the past few months I know what a wonderful opportunity this will be for our men's group. Our men's breakfast on the second Saturday of every month is one of the things I look forward to every month. We meet at Buehlers at 8:00. Our discussions run the gamut from faith to football

to family life and anything else the members bring to the table. When appropriate we sometimes even venture into the intersection of faith and politics.

February 14 will be the date for this years Sandy Heizer music festival at the Trinity Baptist Church in Marion.

The event will kick off at 6:00. Festival PR person, Brenda Donegan, suggests, "This would be an excellent place to take your honey for Valentine's Day." We don't send a choir ourselves, but a few of our

people try to attend. If you would like further details let me know.

As stories continue to come out of Haiti we are reminded that the people of Haiti are our brothers and sisters. The Board of Deacons voted to send a \$500.00 contribution from the Benevolence Fund to the Red Cross for immediate relief. The deacons also plan to recommend that our February benevolence offering be designated to the ABCUSA One Great Hour of Sharing for use by our missionaries in Haiti. For the present there does not seem to be a need to raise funds to send small work parties to Haiti. Consider all the requests for aid to Haiti that you will no doubt receive prayerfully and critically.

Shirley Parker

Shirley L. Parker, 90, a long-time member of First Baptist, died on Monday, January 18.

Shirley was born in Natick, Mass. She first came to Ohio to attend Miami University, where she was tapped for Cwen, Mortar Board, the



YWCA Board, and served in student government. She graduated from Miami in 1943. Shirley attended Yale Divinity School from 1943 to 1944 before she married Robert Fichter.



While in New Haven, she helped found an inter-racial-inter-faith nursery school under the auspices of the National Council of Christians and Jews.

Shirley moved to Delaware with her family in 1949, where she held various volunteer positions within the community and at Ohio Wesleyan. She was President and a charter member of the Delaware League of Women Voters, as well as a member of the Women's International League of Peace and Freedom, the Delaware County Political Action Council, and the Downtown Improvement Committee. At Ohio Wesleyan, Shirley was an advisor to Mortar Board and the YWCA. She also served as Merrick Lecture hostess and assistant coordinator of University Convocations.

Shirley served as pastor to the Waldo Methodist Church from 1955 to 1956 and later at the Radnor Congregational Church and the Old Stone Presbyterian Church. In the 1960s, Shirley did graduate work at Ohio Wesleyan and Ohio State. She also taught English and worked as a guidance counselor at Willis Junior High School, and taught religious education in the Delaware Public Schools.

She earned a master's in library science from George Peabody College in 1971, after which she moved to Athens to take a position at the Ohio University library. Upon her retirement in the early 1980s, Shirley returned to Delaware where she has been a member of the First Baptist Church.

Shirley's passions included history — especially Civil War and family history, reciting poetry, cooking, baseball, singing and sharing her interests and ideas with others. She was actively engaged in human rights and politics throughout her life. Shirley is survived by three children, Andrew (Margaret) Fichter of Philadelphia, Allison (Phil O'Brien) Fichter of Canton, Ga., Joseph (Laurie) Fichter of Putney, Vt.; seven grandchildren, Andrea O'Brien, Jonathan Fichter, James O'Brien, Daniel Fichter, Julia Tadlock, Wilder Fichter, Gage Fichter; as well as many friends and extended family members.

A memorial service will be held at 1:00 on March 20 here at First Baptist.

Andrews House Kitchen Cupboard


The 2009 Kitchen Cupboard raised \$9,000 for Andrews House. This topped last year's event and will be used to continue the good work Andrews House does for our community.

began responding immediately. Nearly \$40,000 has been sent so far for relief efforts underway in Port-au-Prince and the surrounding area. Church World Service is already providing desperately-needed hygiene kits, tarps and blankets in the affected areas. The Haitian Baptist Convention has mobilized pastors to minister to their Haitian brothers and sisters even as they themselves learn how their own families and communities have been affected by the earthquake. I would plea with each ABC/Ohio congregation to step up and respond in whatever way you can. Financial gifts are most needed now."


Shrove Tuesday



Dear FBC family:

On May 4, 2010 all of us who live in the Delaware City Schools district will be asked to vote on a Substitute Emergency Levy. As I have attended meetings of the Education Council of our school district I have received an education about levy language. The emergency language is found

in state law. The only emergency we would face would be if the levy is defeated. It provides 24% of the operating revenue for the district. Baptists have traditionally been supporters of public education. Excellent public schools provide an incentive for people to consider moving to a particular community.

When Kathy and I were thinking about coming to Delaware the schools were a strong consideration. At the time we were living in a community in another state that routinely voted down levies. The high school was falling down. The overall educational rate of the county was next to last in the state. It seems that few people in the community understood the relationship between paying for schools and the quality of life in the community. Although there has been one exception since we arrived in Delaware we were told that Delaware had never voted down a school levy.

We were very pleased with the education that our son received in the Delaware City Schools. I continue to be impressed with how the other children in our church

> are doing in the public schools. I want the children who come after my own to have the same opportunities to succeed. I hope you will vote yes on the Substitute Emergency Levy on May 4.

In the aftermath of the historic vote taken by congress on Sunday we have been inundated with wild

statements about the meaning of the healthcare reform act. As you try to process the changes yourself I hope you will look for some objective reporting about the issue. It seems pretty clear to me that we have not entered into Utopia or Armageddon. I trust that you will continue to resist hate speech on either side of this issue. Our nation has proven to be amazingly resilient in the past. Perhaps we should pray to recover the idea of community needs as opposed to only evaluating how any actions affects us personally.

Holy Week will present several opportunities for worship. Our Maundy Thursday Service will be held at 7:00. The community Good Friday service will begin at 11:00 with the Stations of the Cross walk through the community. At 12:00 we will gather at St. Mary's Catholic Church for the community Good Friday Service. Our Easter morning worship service will be at 10:45. Invite a friend or family member to any or all of these worship opportunities.




Jim Van Brimmer

James R. Van Brimmer, 86, died March 6, 2010 after a two-year battle with a rare cancer.

Jim was a long-time member of First Baptist and he served the church in many ways, including as moderator,

Sunday school superintendent, and chairman of the deacons. He served several years as president of the



American Baptist Men of Ohio.

Jim repaired pipe organs whenever asked and ingeniously refurbished several player pianos.

Jim was born in Delaware on Aug. 8, 1923 to Elmer and Mary (Richards) Van Brimmer. He graduated from Willis High School and served with the 1596th Army Air Force Unit, 2nd Ferrying Group, "Crescent Caravan" of the Air Transport Command during WWII. After the war, he had a crop dusting company with two service friends. In 1988, he retired as regional quality control manager for Ranco Controls after 40 years, having been hired the day the plant opened in Delaware.

Though humble, Jim had seemingly unlimited energy for the causes he chose. He served on the organizational committee for the United Way, creating its first budget; he was instrumental in creating the chaplaincy program at Grady Memorial Hospital, and in funding and finding the first chaplain; he kept the records for the Alpha Industries Board; and he helped organize and promote Andrews House services. Jim's survivors include his wife of 59½ years, Bertha Sparks Van Brimmer; daughters, Karen (Steve) Stoner of Delaware and Susie (Jeff) Leonard of Port Royal, Pa.; son, Rick (Sandy) of Columbus; grandchildren, Stefanie Heizer, Micah Stoner, Casey Leonard, Ryan Leonard and Tonya Claar; three great-grandchildren; two nieces; and one nephew.

He was preceded in death by his parents; and three sisters, Ellen Treiber, Dorothy Houtman and Elizabeth Tracy.

The family received friends on March 12 at the Rodman Neeper Funeral Home, and a memorial service was held on Saturday, March 13 at First Baptist, led by the Rev. Tim Chesser.

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Dear FBC Family:

In some old time movies the passing of time would be presented as pages of a calendar turning over in the wind. As we prepare to celebrate Sam's graduation from Ohio Wesleyan in a couple of weeks

it seems that wind has been a strong one. Kathy and I are very proud of Sam and grateful for the support you have offered him. Elsewhere in this newsletter you will find an invitation to the next big event in Sam's life.

As we wind down the Sunday school year I am thankful for all the work that goes into Christian Education at FBC. Many of my colleagues tell me that it is almost impossible to have a traditional Sunday school program anymore. Year after

year we continue to prove that it is possible. It requires committed teachers and willing students. We have been blessed with an abundance of both.

Please be in prayer for our denominational family. At our last Marion association clergy luncheon Jane Gibbons, our Minister of Congregational Development, shared news about changes in ABC/Ohio staffing. A committee is at work that will probably recommend the elimination of one or two professional staff positions. We currently have an executive minister and four Ministers of Congregational

Development, what we used to call Area Ministers. This is a direct result of decreasing contributions to the United **Mission Budget.** While our congregation is not one of the churches which have decreased its contribution we are still affected by the changes. accomplish individually. Unfortunately we have seen a increase of those American Baptists who are unwilling to support regional and national efforts unless we are in complete theological agreement. Some of those folks have used their giving as a weapon. We all end up paying the price for what seems to me to be the malcontents misguided actions. On the home front I would like to encourage you to vote on May 4. Some people just don't get very motivated to go to the polls for primary elections. However, we are also being asked to approve a school levy. Support for our public schools is too important to leave to someone else. Think about all the children in our church who are a part of Delaware City Schools. Vote yes for the renewal of the Emergency Levy.

Invite a friend to church. They may not be ready to say yes, yet, but you never know until you ask.





A Letter from the Kelseys

The following letter is from Jim and Debbie Kelsey, who are ABC missionaries in Italy. Debbie spoke to a group at our church last summer, and Jim will be preaching here on July 11. Before going to Italy, Jim was pastor of the Park Avenue Baptist Church in Mansfield.

Where Does a Person's Value Lie?

Assets such as machines, trucks, and office equipment have value to employers because they are useful; they help the employer further their business aims and, therefore, make a profit. Employers see value in employees when those employees are useful, when they enable the business owners to produce something or provide some service for which others will pay.

As countries debate the issue of immigration these days, they talk about ways to motivate and assist immigrants in becoming well-integrated, productive members of society. They talk about language acquisition, education, and

adopting cultural norms. The idea is that the more integrated an immigrant becomes, the more productive, and therefore valuable, they will be to an employer. This is often true—but not always.



Kitty Calavita, in her book *Immi*-

grants at the Margins—Law, Race, and Exclusion in Southern Europe, argues that in Southern Europe the opposite is often true. She writes:

Immigrants are useful as 'Others' who are willing to work, or are compelled to work, under conditions and for wages that locals now largely shun. The advantage of immigrants for these economies resides precisely in their Otherness (p. 12).

Much of the value of the immigrant worker to the employer lies in their **not being assimilated** into the culture. In this way, they are easier to exploit and victimize.

Laura is a Nigerian woman who attends one of our churches. She has been in Italy for 3 years and has been continuously employed, has all the necessary documents, and has faithfully paid all her taxes. She was laid off from her job and was collecting unemployment. (In Italy, an employer must continue to provide some benefits to laid-off workers and must hire back those laid-off workers first when business picks up again.) Laura was waiting to be called back to work.

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Her employer called her in and told her she needed to sign a document that would extend her permit to stay in Italy. Laura signed the document and went home with a copy. When she arrived home, her sister, who reads Italian much better that Laura does, told her that she had signed a resignation notice. Laura was tricked by her employer. Now she has no job and must find one immediately or will lose her permission to remain in Italy. An immigrant's permission to be in the country is tied to having a work contract. If you lose your job, you must leave the country. An immigrant's value is based entirely on his or her ability to be "useful" to an employer. They are purely an economic commodity, a means of production.

To make a long story short, Laura has no recourse. No one can do anything for her. Debbie and I tried; there is nothing to be done. It is precisely because she cannot read Italian well and she is not a part of a traditional Italian family and able to benefit from its connections in the community that she had value to that employer. He could never do this to an Italian. Thus, Laura had value to him precisely because of her "otherness." Immigrants have value here because they can be treated like office equipment instead of as human beings. And the immigrants know this.

Laura comes to worship each Sunday. She sings; she prays; she shares her hardships. The church is a place where she has value solely because she is a daughter of the Most



High God. Church is a place where she is reminded that she is made in God's image. Church is a place where she is recognized for who and what she really is.

For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fear-fully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; that I know very well (Psalm 139:13-14).

She is not primarily a "means of production."

Pray that Laura will find work, some way to feed and clothe herself. But most of all, pray that Laura will never forget who she really is, from where her value really comes.

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



Missionary Speaks at First Baptist


On July 11, our church welcomed the Reverend Dr. James Kelsey as our guest speaker. He told us about the missionary work that he and his wife Deb do in Italy.



Youth Spend Night at "Shack City"

On a bitterly cold November night, three FBC Youth (Adam Davidson, Ben Turner and Emily Bowman) and I attended "Shack City" held downtown Delaware on the corner of William Street and Sandusky.

Sponsored by Youth United and Habitat for Humanity, the event had more than 100 participants. We all stayed outside for 12 hours sleeping in nothing more than their sleeping bags and a cardboard box. The purpose of this year's event was to raise awareness of the amount of homeless in Central Ohio, as well as to raise funds to build the first "Habitat for Humanity Youth Spon-

sored home". Below is an hour by hour account (and some thoughts) of what took place that evening.

7:00 – arrival and set up of our new homes for the night.

8:00 – hot drinks and dinner arrive but not to stay hot for long as the brutal 24 degree temp chilled our food and fast!


During this cold we discussed how this is what most homeless people experience each night and that they do not even get a hot meal, never the less a cold one

9:00 – we were instructed on how to make a sleeping bag with a local quilting group, sleeping bags made will go to homeless people all around Central Ohio to help in the cold months ahead.

10:00 – we made our way to our boxes and did what we could to keep warm, the temperature at this time was well in the 20's and it was hard to focus on staying warm

11:00 – we could smell the smoke of a nearby fire, wishing we could get warm, too cold to want to get out of our sleeping bags.

From midnight to about 3:00 sleep was something that was hard to get. Five minutes here or there was about it. The sleeping bag was finally getting warmer, sometimes too hot. Too cold though to poke your head out, no middle ground at all, by this time, it was miserable. We

could not imagine doing this every night

4:00 – a few homeless people walked through downtown looking for a meal, given what we had, they were thankful for the support generosity, moved on to their next find.

5:00 – so many stars to see in the early morning sky...lots of time to think about how fortunate we truly are.

6:00 – time to get up and about, it hurt to put shoes on as our feet were so cold, some people don't even have shoes...

7:00 – time to go home, time to reflect just how lucky we are to have family, friends, a roof over our heads and warm food for each meal.

The young adults and I talked for hours about so many things; we really got to know each other a little better and were all glad we did what we did. I think I can speak for us all when I say going in to this night we were a little nervous and did not know what to expect. But afterwards were humbled by the experience and so proud of each other! We want to thank you for your donations, kind words and prayers for not only us but for the ones who do this each and every day.
