Dear FBC family:

As most of you are aware I have begun something new this year. For most of my time at First Baptist I have been a lectionary preacher. Each year beginning in Advent I start anew on a three year journey through the scriptures. The advantage to this approach is that

you go through the scriptures during that three years. Each year places stress on a different gospel as well as a variety of other readings. During Advent I realized that as I faced my fourth time through the lectionary with you I needed a

change.

As some of you heard on the second Sunday in January, which was the first time I preached in 2011, playing Angry Birds on my IPAD broke a dam of resistance and presented a new way forward. The idea that playing a video game could aid in creative thought was new to me. However, I read about it in the New York Times, so how could it not be correct.

Baptists consider ourselves people of the Bible, but sometimes we just don't know much about the Bible. I decided to start with creation and preach on the big stories and themes of the scriptures. I believe the stories are the source for the themes. We are calling this experi-

ment a journey through the Bible. As is true of any journey we will not stop at every location. If I happen to miss a stop that you really wanted to visit please let me know. Sometimes it is ok to turn back to catch something important. I will try to let you know the next stop on the way each Sunday and you can help by reading ahead.

A friend once shared with me that he used to publish the title of his next week's sermon in the Sunday bulletin. One of his members told him that some of the members used to think there were three sermons in a given week. The three were what they thought he would say, what he actually said, and

what people heard. Let me know what you are hearing. My hope is that this journey will lead us into a deeper, firmer relationship with God. In an age of increasing Biblical illiteracy we need to become even more literate.

As you will see elsewhere in this newsletter we are also emphasizing some of our local mission efforts this year. While still supporting ABCUSA work around the world, we want to be more hands on in our community. I hope you will join us in this effort. First up: A stop at Andrews House for the men of the church to serve at the 2nd Friday meal on February 11. We will gather there at 5:30.

Invite someone you know to join us on the journey this year.


America for Christ

A Message from the Financial Secretary

First, a big thank you for your faithfulness in 2010! First Baptist pledged \$99,674.00 and we gave 96% of our pledges overall. Giving in all areas



Deacon's Benevolence Fund and special offerings. We ended the year with healthy balances in all of our accounts and look forward to continued growth. Larry Faulk, finance committee chair, reported the details at our annual business meeting on January 26, 2011.

Second, I would like to remind everyone that any giving that is not pledged or designated goes to the general fund. If you wish to contribute to Unified Missions or Capital Improvements (listed as Special Projects on your envelopes) you must make a pledge indicating your wishes or designate them on the front of your envelope when you give. The budget for 2011 totals \$116,683.00 with \$101,683 for general fund expenses and \$15,000 for missions. Of the \$15,000 for missions: \$2400.00 is for direct missionary support for the Kelsey's, \$4600 in other designated mission support including special ABC-USA offerings, the remainder goes to unified mission supporting our regional and national staff people. We have current pledges of \$80,860 for the general fund and \$12,058 for missions in 2011. Pledges for 2011 currently total \$97,160.

Finally, our giving reflects the relationship and trust we have in God. It is my prayer that our continued giving shows not only a financial commitment to our church and its ministries but a healthy individual relationship with God. Paul admonishes us to "give with a joyful heart". May 2011 bring the joy of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and the peace that passes understanding for a renewed sense of Christ's presence in us and in our church.

The book of Habakkuk has a beautiful conclusion about life tumbling in. He writes: "Though the fig tree does not blossom, and no fruit is on the vines; though the produce of the olive fails and the fields yield no food; though the flock is cut off from the fold and there is no herd in

the stalls, yet will I rejoice in the Lord; I will exult in the God of my salvation. God, the Lord, is my strength; he makes my feet like the feet of a deer, and makes me tread upon the heights."





He took her to the police station where she was searched, fingerprinted, photographed, and placed in a holding cell.


After a couple of hours, a policeman approached the cell and opened the door. She was escorted back to the booking desk where the arresting officer was waiting with her personal effects.

For my column this month I am sharing with you Harold Van Broekhoven's report on the ABC Biennial. Harold has promised to be available for further conversation when he returns to Delaware at the end of the summer break.



Report on 2011 Biennial of the American Baptist Churches, USA

Your delegate: Harold Van Broekhoven

The Biennial Meetings of the American Baptist Churches in San Juan, Puerto Rico, were a success. I think that the Biennial stands out for two reasons.

First, in terms of the experience of this Biennial, it seems well to emphasize what in fact was its theme

— that is, "Celebrate! ¡Celebrad!" While there were relatively few delegates from the Continental US (perhaps 500-600) and therefore relatively few visitors to the Exhibit hall (an important part of the Biennial for participating organizations) the major meetings and worship times were packed with enthusiastic day visitors from the Puerto Rico churches and were characterized by dynamic worship and preaching. Perhaps what Biennial Meetings do best is this celebration of shared worship, work and word.

The Puerto Rican Biennial was also notable for one change from the normal schedule. Where normally

there would be a **Sunday Morning** Worship planned into the Biennial schedule, this year many Puerto Rican churches bussed delegates to their own worship services all over the San Juan area hosting the visitors for lunch after their own Spanishspeaking worship services. Therefore delegates and ABC staff folks fanned out across the metro-

politan San Juan area to experience first-hand the vibrant reality of Baptist Churches in Puerto Rico and the incredibly warm and generous hospitality of Puerto Rican Baptists.

Second, in terms of historical significance this Biennial will be noted for its vote to revise the Bylaws of the ABC and restructure the denomination. Our history has been one of balancing congregational, regional and societies' autonomy with interdependence and cooperation in **mission** of the various communities within the denomination. Since the 1970s the governance has tilted toward interdependence with a General Board serving as something of a national "legislature" (a board composed of representatives from National Boards and Regional Boards) and a General Secretary serving as something of a national

executive to implement national policies and priorities. In practical and financial terms, however,

the National Boards (Board of International Missions (BIM), **Board of National** Ministries (BNM) and the Ministers and Missionaries **Benefit Board** (MMBB) and **Regional Boards** have gained increasing autonomy and a greater proportion of the contributions to the ABC/USA. Moreover, the General Board has been very

expensive to operate and funds for the Office of General Secretary have become severely diminished.

The changes in the Bylaws of the ABC/USA voted through by delegates at this Biennial of 2011 in Puerto Rico recognize in legal terms what has been evolving in practical and financial terms. National Boards and Regional Boards and their executives have gained near total autonomy save for a provision in their respective Bylaws (and in the new Bylaws of the Denomination, to remain faithful to the "Covenant of Relationships" with other parts of the ABC/USA. The interdependence of these Boards and of local congregations and regions will continue to be realized through Biennial Meetings which, aside from corporate fellowship, worship





and inspiration, will serve as a newly defined "Mission Summit" in which Biennial Delegates will convene to set mission goals and priorities for the denomination. These general goals and priorities will then be formalized in a new institution, the "Mission Table," which will serve as a Think Tank, led by and resourced by the new **Board** of General Ministries, through the office of General Secretary. It will in turn submit recommendations for mission program to the National and Regional Boards, which are represented on the Mission Table, and report back to the subsequent Biennials what progress has been made on the proposals that came out of the Biennial/Mission Summit. The new Board of General Ministries, on which also serve representatives of National Societies and Regions, replaces the old General Board but unlike the former General Board (which will expire December 2011 as a result of the new bylaws) its function will be, "changed from legislative functions of General Board to primarily missional functions, with specific new references to Mission Summit, Mission Table and the Leadership Pool." There are modest changes in the Committee and changes in the way leaders are nominated and evaluated, but this seems to be the core of the

proposal. Where the old Bylaws focus on lines of authority and governmental structure, the new Bylaws envision only a covenantal partnering around shared mission goals dependent upon the good will and common vision of the various constituencies of the denomination.

As one observer shared with me, this seems to be a return to the old society model of the denomination prior to the 1970s and a recognition in the Bylaws of the ABC/ USA what has been for all intents and purposes the way things were operating in the old Bylaws. Whereas in the Pasadena Biennial of 2009 a certain measure of rancor and distrust of the process led to the failure to approve the revision, in the San Juan Biennial of 2011 there seemed to be a measure of good will and trust, in part because of the inclusion within the Bylaws of the various partnering National Societies specific constitutional commitments to remain within the "Covenant of Relationships" of the Denomination. Now there will be a time of reorganizing the actual boards and offices and staffs of the denomination to reflect the revised structure.

Perhaps this good will was influenced by the generally positive experience that delegates and other participants had in Puerto Rico. For our part, Deborah and I had extended conversations with leaders of the Puerto Rican Baptists. The Region is incredibly strong with lots of little churches dotting the island and perhaps a dozen very large and modern churches. The seminary on the Island produces more pastors than there are churches and the Region has high academic and spiritual standards for its ministers. Deb and I spent a day at the Regional Offices of the Puerto Rican Baptist in Catalina, a suburb of San Juan, talking with the Executive Minister, the Rev. Dr. Roberto Dieppa-Baez and Miriam Guttierez, a leading spiritual and intellectual anchor to the churches in Puerto Rico. After a vacation day

of kayaking and snorkeling in the coral reefs on the south of the island we shared a wonderful worship service with the second oldest Church (and oldest Church building on the Island) in Ponce, PR. We fell in love with the Island and its warm and hospitable and spiritually vital Baptists and came away thinking that we in America have a lot to learn from this remarkable church community.



Angel Food Ministries Shuts Down

Angel Food Ministries, which provided discount food in 45 states through churches (and locally through Andrews House), has ceased operations, blaming the economic downturn.

In 2009 the FBI searched the Angel Food offices in Georgia after a lawsuit was filed by several Angel Food board members. The lawsuit alleged that the founders, pastors Joe and Linda Wingo, enriched themselves by \$2.7 million and had charged personal expenses on Angel Food credit cards. The Wingos denied the allegations and an out-of-court settlement was reached.


Although the bad economy was the main factor in the closing, a former employee stated that the lawsuit hurt the organization's reputation and resulted in considerable legal expenses.

A group of former Angel Food employees in Georgia is seeking to start up a similar ministry under new leadership.
