I have been to some of the meetings and have been gladdened to meet civic and church leaders from our city and

Among the things the churches are doing include joint worship and fellowship activities, usually taking place at The Vineyard Church on Troy Road. It has been decided to schedule four such events, one on each of the 5th Sunday evenings in 2017. The first will be on January 29th which is the day this newsletter is available and will be late for those receiving it by mail, but even so, it is good to know about. There will be a potluck meal followed by a worship service. The purpose of these gatherings is to get to know people well enough to become friends across denominational, ideological, and racial lines. Some of you may be interested in taking part, you are welcome. Others may not and that is okay. I want to keep you wellinformed. There is no pressure. We can all pray that relationships in Delaware and in our country improve over time.

There is much to do. As always be prayerful. We grieve our loss with the hope of resurrection in our hearts. I hope the New Year finds you well and in a place of spiritual growth and peace.

His personal interests included genealogy, travel, classic movies, and computers. He enjoyed gardening and working outdoors. He most enjoyed being with his family.

He is survived by his mother, Sophia; brothers Rev.Ted Stephenson and Dr. Robert Stephenson, and their families.

Jim's life was celebrated in a private family service on Sat., Jan. 21 at FBC. He is dearly missed.

2016 Financial Review

The FBC 2016 Financial Report was presented at our Annual Business Meeting. I would like to share some of the details and observations. We completed 2016 by spending less in all areas of our Church Operating Expenses than our budget anticipated. We funded about 90% of our budget for the General Fund. The church continues to spend slightly more than it takes in but this is not of immediate concern. We achieved over 96% of our Outreach Missions goals.

Our Educational Endowment fund thrives as a stable investment. Your continued contributions to our Capital Improvements fund provides the resources necessary to maintain our facilities and replace aging appliances.

During 2016 we were able to replace the furnaces that heat our office, choir robe room, and fellowship hall as well as remove an old unused chimney that had deteriorated. We have currently contracted work to change the roof over the Gathering Place in hopes that we can eliminate further water damage on the north wall.

Your thoughtful memorial gifts provide a nest egg of funds available to extend programs and enhance our facilities.

While we are currently experiencing an income shortfall in our general fund, we are encouraged by your commitment to fund our Outreach and Missions goals as well as make contributions to our Capital Improvements fund and memorials. This balance of giving allows our FBC fellowship to worship, study, and serve within our church, our community, and beyond.

March will begin with the baptism of Aidan Ferguson, who has expressed his desire to profess faith in Jesus Christ. What better way to begin the season of Lent?

On the same day at 5:30, we will meet for a pizza dinner to kick off the Lenten Bible Study, an examination of the, "I Am," sayings in the Gospel of John. After the meal on the 5th the Bible study will begin at 6:30 which will be the start time throughout the month of March.

The focal text for the first meeting is John 8:58, in which Jesus says, "I tell you the truth, before Abraham was, I Am," a statement provocative enough that his audience began to stone him. It certainly is an interesting thing to say and offers reflections about God's nature, about the doctrine of the Incarnation, and about our relationship with God.

Over the next three Sundays attention will be given to the other seven sayings:

"I am the Bread of Life," in John 6:35 and 48:

"I am the Light of the World," in 8:12 and 9:5;

"I am the Door," in 10:9

"I am the Good Shepherd," in 10:11

"I am the Resurrection and the Life," in 11:25;

"I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life," in 14:6 and

"I am the True Vine," in 15:1.

As Passion and Easter draw near, I hope each person will have the

opportunity to deepen their understanding of biblical faith. I look forward to seeing everyone there.



Remember that the missions emphasis for the month of March is the "America for Christ" Offering, the American Baptist offering for Home Missions which supports ministries around the country. Our goal is \$700. I am sure of your prayerful support.

Lent is a time of sacrifice and dedication as we re-examine our own faith commitments in view of Christ's sacrifice on our behalf. It is a time of prayerful reflection about God's grace that has been abundantly given to each of us and that when received in faith produces an assurance of forgiveness as well as a sense of purpose and fulfillment as we await the completion of our salvation. We have the opportunity to be inspired by new faith, informed by the study of the scriptures and challenged by opportunities to serve and give as we seek an enriched experience of Christ's passion, and of Easter.

General Fund Shortfall

As we begin the new year and I begin a new responsibility as your treasurer, I would like to keep you informed financially. While we regularly receive contributions to missions, capital improvements, memorials, and our general offerings, we are experiencing a shortfall in our general operating funds.

During the first 7 weeks of the new year, our general fund expenses were \$3,100 more than our income. This represents an average deficit of about \$450 per week. The only "large" non monthly bill was the property tax bill. There have been no other unusual expenses and with the mild winter thus far, I do not anticipate any high utility bills soon.

We will continue to review our expenses and be conservative with purchases. Your prayerful financial response is appreciated.

More locally, this month we will begin collecting items to give the teachers at Conger Elementary School in appreciation for their work, as well as supporting the work at the Common Ground Free Store with the Easter offering.

I am thankful as well for the wonderful worship services and the bible study that we have shared, and for the work that is being done on the building and for all the ministries both here in town and around the world that we actively support. I am thankful for the enthusiasm and effort each one of you gives to the life of our church in service to Jesus Christ.

My hope for all of us is that the message of Easter will break through all the distractions and concerns and give us peace and joy. The message of Easter is that God is working, life is winning, and hope prevails. May the

barriers that divide people be overcome and the burden be lightened as we celebrate this victory of life over death.

General Fund Deficit

Offerings for the first eleven weeks of 2017 have continued to fall short of budget projections.

Our expenses for Jan, Feb, and the first half of March have been \$3,500 more than our offerings to the general fund. This is a shortfall of about \$300 per week. Our bills are paid up and we have a balance in the checking account that allows us to remain current with our obligations. However, our expenses continue to be well below budget, and our reserves continue to decline. While this is not a crisis yet, it is a concern.

Our long term financial health depends on our commitment to FBC. Encouraging others to join in our fellowship and share in our worship, education, and service is key to our future.

Deficit Continues, But Improves

Our first quarter financial report indicates that while the deficit in our General Fund continues, we did not end the quarter as badly as expected. We spent \$2431 more than we received for general operations, which is a little over \$800 per month or about \$200 per week.

We continue to monitor expenses (which are well below budget). Contributions to missions, memorials, and capital improvements continue to meet expectations. Thank you.

Trustees Notes

The major project on the outside of the north wall of the church has been completed by Quality Masonary of Marion.

The parapet wall was taken down level to the roof and the eaves were extended out over the wall to keep it dry. The new eaves match the rest of the 1898 style of the church. The existing eaves on the north side were repaired and painted.

New heavy duty "half round" gutters and downspouts were installed. The upper part of the wall was tuckpointed and water repellent was applied. This work will keep the wall dry and will stop the water damage which has been an ongoing

problem for decades, ruining plaster and paint inside. The total cost was almost \$40,000.

The local Ball Painting
Company has been chosen to
repair and paint the bad areas
inside. This work would not
have been possible without the
memorial gifts and donations
to the capital improvements
fund over the years.

You are here - in Nicaragua, where women are given training and tools to cultivate home gardens to provide nutritious food for their families.



The recent shooting in Washington D.C. at the Republican baseball team practice has been associated with the extreme partisan rhetoric that has characterized much political and cultural dialogue over the last few decades. My heartfelt prayers go out to all those who were injured. The extreme speech is a concern to me. Since some of the angry voices are religious, and Christian, it is good to speak about this "crisis of rhetoric."

My attention is drawn to St. Paul's Letter to the Ephesians in which he writes, "I tell you this, and insist on it in the Lord, that you must no longer live as the Gentiles do, in the futility of their thinking." (4:17) He goes on to describe what is meant and in that description we find these words, "Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouth, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen . . . Get rid of all bitterness, rage, and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ, God forgave you." (4:29-30, 32)

No one can prove that the overcharged rhetoric caused the shooting. Nonetheless one can see how the nature of a conversation, if not restrained, can easily lead to a toxic environment, one that is destructive, characterized by



malice instead of love, and in which violence may more easily result.

For a long time I have been saddened by this situation, seeing Christians on both sides of our cultural divide treat one another without respect. Some in Washington have expressed the desire to "dial back the rhetoric." I am not sure that it will happen, but I am for it.

At the very least, I am confident that we can do better. I think we all want to do better. I think we desire kindness and compassion rather than bitterness, anger, and rage. Thus, in addition to being concerned and saddened, I am also very hopeful.

One source of hope comes in the form of the Delaware Family Festival. I have mentioned it before and I need to advertise for it because it is in July. It is on July 15, as a matter of fact, from 11 am to 3 pm on Winter St. Everyone who can and wants to come is invited to help with the lawn games, donate bottled

water, or just come and join the fun.

But I am not just working it in, I also want to say that this one small event and others like it give me hope because they are specifically motivated by the desire to build up community and not tear it down. I am hopeful because whenever an event like this is proposed, there is an excitement to participate that reveals an instinct to make things better. Follow that instinct; it is consistent with the scripture and the Spirit of Christ.

Hope you are having a wonderful summer.

According to the Google dictionary, "providence," refers to the protective care of God and the timely preparation for future eventualities. It is the idea that God has ordered our lives for our benefit. I remember a particular experience that I have considered to be providential.

It takes a little explaining. When I lived and served in Illinois, I was befriended and helped and in a way mentored by a retired pastor named Gary Nelsen. In the Great Rivers Region (GRR), unlike the ABC/OH, there are no local associations. Instead there are five "areas." Each area has about 50 churches and is served by an area minister. The church in Staunton where I served was in Area 5, which consisted of all the churches in the State of Missouri and in Illinois the churches in the St. Louis metro-east.

Around the year 2000, the Area 5 minister retired, and before a new area minister was called, the decision was made to move some of the churches in the metro-east into areas in Illinois because of the burden of covering all of Missouri, clearly the geographically largest area in the region. Our church was moved into Area 2, which is the area around Springfield, Illinois, to our north.

Area 2 was the only area that had a part-time position entitled, "pastor to pastors." The position was filled by Gary Nelsen, who called me and took me out to



lunch only a few months after our church had been reassigned. That is how we met. Down through the years he helped me through difficult times and even after his position was eliminated, he prayed for me and continued to provide support, even after I came here to Ohio.

This decision was not political, but administrative, done for practical reasons. I am sure that when the GRR board met to make this decision, they did not think about the relationships that would result. When I told the church that we were being assigned to Area 2, I did it only as FYI, just to keep them informed, and that is the way they took it.

When Gary first called, I did not even realize why he was calling, nor did I realize the connection between the administrative decision and his outreach to me. Most of the time little organizational decisions are not that meaningful.

The reason I met the person who helped me most was a very mundane and practical

administrative decision that created a connection I have always considered providential. That is the way God sometimes works among us.

As we move from summer to fall, get ready to resume Sunday School, participate in the Crop Walk, host ABC missionaries Emerson and Ivy Wu in October, and continue in other ministries that are a part of our life together, let us remember that God works in mysterious ways, that sometimes even the least important happenings work to a larger purpose.

As the summer is drawing to a close, we begin to think about fall events and activities. In Delaware, the Horse Parade is right around the corner, along with the county fair and the Little Brown Jug. The new students at MTSO and OWU have arrived and all the schools are back in session. Once again, school buses fill the

I encourage everyone to come and be a part of the entire program even if the earlier hour is not a normal Sunday routine. Details about the program will be forthcoming as plans are put together. Afterward a potluck lunch is planned.

I have been thinking about favorite hymns lately. Among the hymns that I did not grow up singing, but later learned was in the hymnal all along, is called. "Abide with Me," the words written by Henry Lyte in 1847. In the last decade or so it has become a part of my "hymnal within a hymnal." It fits the autumn season, which is also on my mind, as I look out the window at the color of the leaves as they change.

"Abide with me, fast falls the eventide

The darkness deepens; Lord with me abide.

When other helpers fail, and comforts flee,

Help of the helpless, O abide with me."

The title of the song comes from Luke 24:29 when the two disciples who met Jesus on the road to Emmaus on that Easter evening invited him to dinner saying, "Stay with us." The words serve as a prayer for the end of the day,

"Swift to its close ebbs our life's little day

Earth's joys grow dim, its glows pass away

Change and decay in all around I see

O Thou who changes not, abide with me."

As autumn descends, and the days grow shorter and colder and winter approaches, I think over the past year and anticipate the

year to come, reflecting on the past looking forward to what is next. I guess I am in the autumn of life. It feels like the time has passed quickly. Many things have changed along the way.

Only a few decades ago I would not have entered this reflection into a computer and sent it in by email. Even now I am behind on the technology of the times. Only a few years ago I would not have dreamed of being in Ohio when I wrote it.

But there is still a long way to go. This hymn, which is a prayer, gives me hope that through all of life's changes, God remains present with me and with us. God's grace does not waver in the passage of time. And so I offer it as an autumn devotion:

"I need Thy presence every passing hour What but Thy grace can spoil the tempter's power Who, like Thyself, my guide and stay can be? Through cloud and sunshine, Lord, abide with me.

I fear no foe, with Thee at hand to bless;

Ills have no weight, and tears no bitterness

Where is death's sting? Where grave thy victory?

I triumph still, if Thou abide with me."

In our hymnal there is a 5th verse with which I am not familiar, but it caps off this little devotion as a prayer for the evening, for autumn:

"Hold Thou Thy cross before my closing eyes; Shine through the gloom and point me to the skies Heaven's morning breaks, and earth's vain shadows flee In life, in death, O Lord, abide with me."

Advent refers to the moment before something happens, the time right before the kickoff at a football game or the first pitch in a baseball game. It is the moment after the lights go down but before the curtain comes up. It is a time of expectation when everyone stops what they are doing in order to pay close attention to whatever is about to happen. Once the game begins or the music starts, there can be a sense of ease; spectators can be distracted by other things, but with Advent comes full attention.

In the Christian faith we observe Advent as the time just before the celebration of Christ's birth. It serves not only as a way to celebrate the meaning of Christmas in its season, but also to prepare our hearts to see God's presence in the world, in our lives, to point to Christ's return at the end of the age.

Advent is hopeful because, by God's mercy, we are led to apprehend the presence of God in the birth of a child rather than the advances of a conqueror with an army or a judge on a judgment seat or in some other way. We are encouraged to nurture faith, love, compassion, peace, and joy. The birth of Jesus focuses our attention of God's mercy and love, which is given to us through the Incarnation, Forgiveness, and Resurrection.

Though every season of the year is a time to repent, to seek to grow faith and love; it is especially

at Advent that we can stop what we are doing to pay close attention to these things. I found the following prayer, attributed to St. Francis of Assisi, to be helpful even though I am sure it is not an Advent prayer, but it applies to this season because of its unselfishness and humility. Perhaps some of you may also find it helpful:

"Lord, make me an instrument of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is dark, light; where there is sadness, joy.

O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life." I pray that all of you will have a holy and blessed season of Advent and a wonderful Christmas.
