I hope everyone has had a wonderful Christmas celebration, time with family and away from the ordinary routines of school and work. And I hope the new year will be filled with blessings.

Although one cannot predict the future, I expect, if the Lord wills, to add a person to my family this year when in September my son gets married. Who knows what else might happen? But the new year is a time to look back as well as forward.

Throughout the fall we have begun a focus on prayer that will continue throughout the spring of 2019. The Lenten study will be centered around the topic of prayer, and there will be other activities designed to help us be more intentional about praying for one another and our community and the world.

While the specifics of this emphasis are not yet fully developed, the beginning of the year provides an opportunity to reflect on what has happened so far. In my experience the months of January and February are somewhat slow in the life of a church. Lent this year begins in March and Easter is late, so there is some time to think and pray.

In addition to the devotions provided by ABC missionaries and the day of prayer in October, we have introduced a new way to minister to each other, the Prayer Chest, which allows each person



the chance to pray for one specific person for a week at a time.

Take the chance to think about what this has meant to you. It involves not only praying for other members of the church family but also the knowledge that someone else may be praying for you. It is possible that each of us might become more aware of being a part of the family in Christ. Might it help us become more aware of God's presence? Perhaps there will be some other insight discovered by participating in this activity and reflecting upon it?

Three of the most important scriptures in the Bible are as follows; "Love your neighbor as yourself," (Leviticus 19:18) "Judge not, lest you be judged," (Matthew 7:1), and, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." (Mathew 7:12). All three of these texts tower over the entire biblical message and are consistent with its presentation of God as revealed on the cross of Jesus. And all three of these texts are about relationships.

Prayer is about relationships too, which links these texts to the Year for Prayer. Both are about how to

enhance the sense of Christian Fellowship and participation in the larger human family. So perhaps we might think of 2019 as "The Year to Focus on Relationships." We may focus on relationships with family, church family, friends, and the larger community, and the world. Concentrate on being more loving, less judgmental, and more aware of the Golden Rule. We have begun by praying for each other. Who can tell what might happen?

When the Year for Prayer began back in September, the emphasis was practical opportunities for participation in prayer activities. My hope is that you have found some of them meaningful. There were 60 days of devotions contributed by American Baptist missionaries whom we support through missions giving. In October there was a Day of Prayer offering to each an opportunity to spend some time alone in the sanctuary in thoughtful reflection and prayer. And since the first Sunday of Advent the Prayer Chest has been open, with the chance to pray for someone new each week.

As a part of the year-long focus, it has always been my intention to explore prayer as a spiritual activity; to become better informed in order to facilitate more meaningful experiences of prayer. The annual Lenten study seems like an excellent opportunity for that pursuit. Lent begins on March 6 this year. The study will take place on the next five Sundays; March, 10, 17, 24, 31, and April 5.

To be clear, five one-hour sessions is not enough to cover everything that is associated with the prayer discipline, but it is enough for a good and helpful effort. Some of the topics will include contemplation, prayer as intercession, prayer as petition, and corporate prayer. The goal is to help, to make more accessible an enhanced experience of



relationship with God, a more transformational spiritual life.

I am in over my head. In some ways a Bible study is easier because I know more about the Bible than I do prayer, and feel like a novice. That does not mean that I always interpret the Bible correctly, only that I feel more confident leading a Bible study than a prayer study. I have much to learn. My hope is that we can journey together, to learn from one another as well as from some of the experts from whom our sessions will take their inspiration.

There is not a study guide for this experience, but I will be working from two well-known books by authors on the subject of the spiritual disciplines. One fo them is Richard Foster, who is the author of The Celebration of Discipline. I will be working from his book Prayer: Finding the Heart's True Home. The other is Dallas Willard from his book, The Insights found in these works will be helpful as we go.

In the meantime February intervenes. It is winter, and as we experienced last week, it can be severe. It is the time of the year when it feels right to stay inside where it is warm and safe and dry. But let me take this opportunity to make an affirmation.

In 2018, through the faithfulness of your giving, we came only six dollars short of making operational income and expenses meet. And that does not begin to tell the story of the missions and service giving in our city and around the world. Thank you all for being such a faithful and generous congregation.

Practicing Prayer

February is the shortest and drabbiest month of the year. It has the Super Bowl in it, and Groundhog Day, Valentine's Day, and President's Day to help make it a little cheerier. It also has in it the beginning of spring training in baseball, just to provide the encouragement of summer coming.

Winter has been going on long enough that most are ready for it to end.

As March draws near, so does Lent. I have always thought of Lent in its relation to Mardi Gras, the time of fasting and repentance after the excesses of Fat Tuesday. It is good also to remember that the proper order is to associate its sacrifices with what comes after, the joyous celebration of Easter.

At First Baptist, we are anticipating the Lenten study, which is called Practicing Prayer, and is in coordination with the Year For Prayer. This title not only refers to the ways of praying, the practices themselves, but also to the notion that, like almost anything else, the more one practices, the better one gets.

The study will be on Sunday evenings at 6:30 P.M., and will begin on March 10 with an introduction to the various types and expressions of prayer that Christians have found helpful down through the centuries. On

March 17th the study will be focused on petition and intercession, two of the most common forms.

I am excited to have some help this year. On March 24, Dr. Francesca Nuzzolese. Associate Professor of Pastoral Care and Counseling at MTSO, will teach us about centering prayer. And on March 31, Mike Reynolds will present journaling prayer. Finally, on April 7th, the study will conclude with a look at ways of incorporating prayer into worship. Everyone is invited to participate as much as is possible. There is no study guide and if a meeting is missed, one can attend the others without having to catch up on anything.

Also, be aware of the mission emphasis is March, America for Christ, which supports the work of the American Baptist Home Mission Society. Not only does this offering support the strengthening of local churches and ministry to refugees, it is the American Baptist way of commissioning chaplains for work in the military and in other settings. Recently, the ABHMS

has become the mother of the American Baptist Personnel Service, which is the mechanism many churches use to search for and find pastors when the need arises. Prayerfully consider your contribution. Our goal is \$700.

I am thankful for our church family. I pray for continued growth in faith and in love, and that God would help us to reach out into our community in the ministry and service of the gospel.

Mission/Outreach News

February's Mission Focus was Turning Point. Turning Point is a Marion-based nonprofit organization that serves domestic-violence victims in six counties. Turning Point is opening the first shelter in Delaware County, the 13,000 square foot shelter at 500 N. Liberty St. which was the former Children's Home of Delaware. The cost of renovating the facility was \$3.2 million which was raised by the organization's capital campaign, which began in 2016. Kathy King is the Director and one of four full-time employees.

The shelter can house up to 41 people. Most of the rooms have 2 sets of bunkbeds and one room is ADA-compliant. There are group living areas with a kitchen, living room, and dining room. There are also recreation and study areas for children as well as an outside play area. The facility is locked down and the entry is monitored by aides with 23 outside cameras. The shelter opened on Monday, February 18th.



From April 21 until June 9 when Pentecost is observed, we are in the time of Easter. The term "Easter," of course, simply refers to the rising of

the sun in the east every morning, which serves as a visual representation of the raising of Jesus. Every day is a little Easter, which is not



merely a one-day celebration, but is to be observed daily.

It is the time of Resurrection, to focus our minds away from the tragedies of human life and orient them to the victories of life in God. Aided by the changing of the seasons as summer comes, we are able to be strengthened in the faith that life is meaningful, and in the victories of goodness and righteousness, love and friendship, peace and hope.

We are not naive in faith; we have been around long enough to experience tragedy and loss. It is in part because we have these experiences that our faith in the Resurrection of Jesus is so powerful.

In the spirit of the Easter season, we look forward to our church's May traditions;

Mother's Day on May 12th, Youth Sunday on May 19th, and the changing over to the summer schedule on May 26th. It is also a good time to

announce that one of the ABC missionaries we support directly, Jeni Pedzinski, will be home for a brief time early in the fall. We have scheduled a time to share with her on

Sunday Evening September 29. Details about this meeting will be forthcoming. I will be out of town for my son Evan's wedding in Colorado, but I hope you will all plan that far ahead, to give time and support to her for the work she does in Thailand.

With regards to the Year for Prayer, we have been enriched by the Lenten Study. Though we barely scratched the surface, we learned that prayer involves "asking," in some way, for our own benefit, and for others too. We practiced the discipline of writing prayers and were led by Mike Revnolds in an exercise of centering prayer. In the last session on Palm Sunday, we looked at prayer in worship and discovered that the worship at First Baptist is filled with prayer. I hope that

because of this study and the year-long emphasis you will be helped in an ongoing way as you seek to enhance your own prayer experience.

With this in mind, it is planned to keep the Prayer Chest ministry going indefinitely, so keep drawing names from the box. There will also be occasional "open sanctuary" times when the church will be open for any who wish to come and spend some time praying in the sanctuary. The first such time is upon us, and is the National Day of Prayer. Thursday May 2, 9 am - 12 pm, and also Saturday May 4 from 8 am - 12 pm. There will be no formality, just a time to come and pray.

It is Easter faith that gives the hope for the future and meaning to all that we do. This season is meant to be a time of joyous reflection about life's victories. May God bless your Easter season.

Vespers is an evening service that is also known as Evening Prayers. In the more liturgical traditions it has long been a daily part of the life of the church. It consists of litanies and the singing of Psalms, and coincides with the lighting of candles, which has both a practical and symbolic purpose; the light enables one to see as the sun goes down at the end of the day, and also signifies the coming of the Light of the World.

There are a number of prayers, one of thanksgiving for having come to the end of another day, one of confession of sin, and one for the coming of the next day, as well as intercession. Evening Prayer is new to me, as I imagine it might be for some of you, but we are going to try it this summer. The first service will be on Sunday, July 7th at 6 pm, and there will also be services on three other Sundays; July 21st, August 4th, and August 18th.

I am not familiar with formal liturgies and so am working to adapt the service for a Baptist congregation, so don't pass up this opportunity out of concern that it may be stuffy or too "high church." There will be quiet music, scripture readings, a couple of hymns, some brief litanies, and a time for prayer



concerns, silent reflection, and prayer.

For the past year, First Baptist has observed an emphasis on prayer. In the fall there was a Season of Prayer for missions, A Day of Prayer involving a vigil in the sanctuary, and the beginning of the Prayer Chest ministry. During Lent there was a five-week study of prayer, which only barely scratched the surface.

One reason for summer vespers is to continue the emphasis. Another reason is because of the quiet, reflective nature of these services, at a time when the world seems particularly chaotic, and when the state of things for religion in our culture is restless. Evening Prayer seems also to fit with the relaxed nature of the summer season.

To be honest, there are other reasons. For my entire time of ministry, as well as my whole life, for that matter, the churches I have been a part of, and the denominational homes I have known, have been in decline. People who study these types of things say it is a general trend affecting all religious groups across the board, at least in North America and Europe. Many things have been tried to reverse the trend, but none have worked. After a while it becomes burdensome, no matter how shiny a face is put on it.

Prayer is the proper response, and my hope is that this year, in this summer of evening services, will give us an opportunity to pray for our church, and our denomination, as well as all the other churches and denominations. My hope is that through quiet and faithful prayer our faith will be strengthened, our anxiety eased, and our love rejuvenated.

I hope to see you at one of the Evening Prayer services this summer.

Mission/Outreach News

The Mission/Outreach Group met on Sunday, June 23rd. Our last meeting was in April. The Mission Focus for June was "Tools of Hope" on Father's Day to honor fathers by giving money to Church World Service to help those in need, and the One Great Hour of Sharing offering to help those in the U.S. and in other countries with disaster relief and development needs. Pam Faulk has given short informational Mission Moments to tell us how the money we give is used. Our church will be participating in the Delaware Family Festival (Block Party) on July 13th from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Winter Street. We will be hosting the lawn games and some coloring activities, making pinwheels, and puzzles. Donations of homemade or store bought cookies are appreciated. Our church will donate \$200.00 to help fund the event which is a day for families to come and eat and have fun for no cost.

We received a letter from Kathy Hoff who is the PIN Nutrition Services Manager. The letter said that during the months of February and August, PIN doesn't always have enough food to be given to those in need. Kathy was asking that we prayerfully consider changing our food drive for PIN to the month of August. Many in our congregation bring food items on a regular basis and place it in the basket in the welcome center. Peter White delivers the items when it gets full. Is it August already? I am still recovering from Christmas (I'm joking). I know that I often comment about the passage of time, but I am constantly amazed by it. The winter seemed to linger forever, and we all waited for it to be over and summer to come, and now school is ready to begin; fall is right around the corner. I am not sure about the cosmic complications it might cause, but I wouldn't mind if the Earth's rotations slowed a bit.

As time goes by, I become more convinced of a general lack of spiritual health. I guess that should always be obvious. I don't mean to be pessimistic, but as our society has become more industrialized and computerized, people have become more isolated from one another and more polarized and hurt by the divisions among us. The renewal of the mind and the transformation of the heart are difficult in such a setting, maybe in any setting.



That renewal and transformation are what this last year's prayer emphasis has been about. We are still praying; not only for ourselves but for others; not only for our church, but for the Church; not only for our nation, but all the nations.

So as we look together toward fall, be aware of the Prayer Chest ministry, of the times for Open Sanctuary and the possibility of another prayer vigil, and with a view to continuing this emphasis in some form. Give attention to your relationship with God. Let that attention be our faith response to the times.

In reality, our era is not really much different from previous eras. What has changed is the way we feel about them. What is changed is that we don't have any hindsight to tell us how things turn out. We should not be surprised if it seems there is more

anxiety and less hopefulness about the future, more fear and less confidence, than in the past.

Even so, the Earth just keeps spinning. Let us press on toward health, nurturing a relationship with God through Christ, making it our goal to be thankful rather than afraid, hopeful rather than despairing, confident in Our Redeemer, and faithful in all we do.

October Special Days

We all know about Columbus Day and Halloween, two of October's holidays. There are other special days in October that you may not know as much about. World Communion Sunday is October 6. Crop Hunger walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by local congregations or groups to raise funds to end hunger at home and around the world. World Food Day is celebrated every year around the world on October 16 in honor of the date of the founding of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations in 1945. The day is celebrated widely by many other organizations concerned with food security, including the World Food Programme and the International Fund for Agricultural Development. In 1948 the U.N. General Assembly declared October 24, the anniversary of the Charter of the U.N., as United Nations Day, devoted to making known to the people of the world the aims and achievements of the U.N. and to gaining their support for its work. In 1971 the U.N. General Assembly adopted a resolution declaring that United Nations Day shall be an international observance or holiday by all U.N. member nations. National Make a Difference Day is an annual community service event which is held on the fourth Saturday in

October (October 26 this year). This was created in 1992 by USA WEEKEND magazine and joined by Points of Light. Together they have sponsored the largest national day of community service for more than twenty years. Volunteers and organizations have taken up the banner to help their communities in ways that best fit their needs. Reformation Day is a Protestant Christian religious holiday celebrated on October 31, alongside Halloween. October 31, 1517 was the day Martin Luther nailed his "Ninetyfive Theses" on the door of the All Saints' Church in Wittenberg. Reformation Sunday is celebrated on the last Sunday in October and commemorates the Protestant Reformation and Martin Luther.

Good News Letter

Last year when I traveled to Colorado to visit my son, I came home by way of Montana, where I stopped to see the place of "Custer's Last Stand," the Little Bighorn River. I learned a great deal about the battle and the circumstances that surrounded it.

The leader of the Lakota Sioux was a man who has become a well-known historical figure; his name was Sitting Bull. He was a religious leader. He and his people faced rapid change, which they could neither understand nor control, and understandably, they resisted.

Sitting Bull had a vision for his people that had two main facets. He believed the "white people" would all go away, and that the Buffalo would return. His vision involved the recovery of a treasured past. He is rightly seen as a noble figure, and who can blame him for the resistance he led. As of yet, neither of his predictions has happened.

The same kind of thing appears in the Bible, especially in the part we call the Old Testament. The people of Israel had been conquered, and they were also forced to confront rapid change, which they could neither understand nor control. And they too were



led by religious leaders, some of whom envisioned the recovery of a treasured past which was sacred to them, involving the restoration of the Davidic monarchy and the rebuilding of the Jerusalem temple. Although both predictions came true temporarily, neither lasted. After the Babylonians, came the Persians, then the Greeks. and then, after a brief time of independence, the Romans; and all these years later both of the envisioned recoveries remain unfulfilled.

Today, we also face rapid change. I advise against attempting to comfort ourselves by hoping for the recovery of the past. It is better to look to the future, bringing what is best from our religious heritage into the changes we face, with hopefulness that the changes *can* be positive, to be sought rather than feared.

Last Sunday (October 20) the text came from Jeremiah, one of Israel's prophets, who wrote,

"I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God and they will be my people." This is the great promise we anticipate; that through God's teaching, having been etched into the inner places of the soul, our lives will come to be characterized by deep gratitude, sincere hope, genuine love, and strong faith, accompanied by compassion and mercy for all the people who share with us this everchanging journey.
