Baked Sauerkraut

I brought a baked sauerkraut to the Christmas Luncheon and many requested the recipe, so here it is:

5 slices thick-sliced bacon
3/4 cup firmly packed light
or dark brown sugar
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) margarine
or butter
1 can (about 27 oz.) sauerkraut
1 can (about 20 oz.) tomatoes
or stewed tomatoes

Fry bacon crisp, drain and crumble.

Mix brown sugar, margarine (or butter) and crumbled bacon to make a topping.

Place drained sauerkraut and (undrained, diced) tomatoes in a 13 x 9-inch baking dish; mix well. Sprinkle sugar mixture on top. Bake, uncovered in a preheated 350-degree oven for 1 hour. Makes 8 servings. (It's good with pork.)

We are transitioning now to a look at the General Epistles beginning with James (we are skipping Hebrews because it is the focus of the Lenten study). Any of you who are not regular participants in Sunday School, join us.

And thanks to all who took part in all the Christmas activities that made the celebration of the birth of Christ wonderful this year. Let us also draw together as we anticipate the Passion and Easter.

"In the past, God spoke to our forefathers through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days, God has spoken to us by his Son . . ."

There is no better time than the season of Lent to focus on these words and those in Hebrews that follow. I hope that all of you are planning to meet with us on all five Sundays in March. I have already written about this study in the previous newsletter, so it is not necessary to go over it all again now.

But I would like for us to ask what we can learn about ourselves, and about the world, and about God, when we say that God has spoken to us through a Son. The reference is clearly to Jesus, of course, a person of history who lived 2,000 years ago and was executed by the Romans. Even today,



that question still makes sense and is relevant to our situation.

We live in the age of automobiles and computers and rocket ships, of digital technology that can make cinematic representations seem more real than life itself (it is called CGI, which stands for Computer Generated Images, which can sometimes distract from otherwise adequate images by making them seem more real than reality). What do we learn about life from believing that God is revealed in Jesus that we can't learn from science and technology with its biological and chemical understanding of life?

By way of a preliminary answer, let me say that we learn that God is merciful

and forgiving, that God is by nature a self-sacrificing. loving person, whose grace gives meaning to all the experiences of life. If I were speaking instead of writing, I would say "that is a mouthful." And there is more to say. The purpose of the Lenten season is to spend six weeks pondering God's sacrifice, so that our lives might better reflect that meaning, better reflect God's nature in a world desperately in need once again, for God to speak.

I look forward to seeing all of you on Sunday nights.

season.



Thanks for thinking of us and the prayers. We are fine in Taiwan (Republic of China, NOT People's Republic of China). Taiwan's population has 23.78 million (2018). There have recorded 267 confirmed cases as of today (3/27/2020) on China's Coronavirus outbreak. Taiwan government did and are doing a good job on controlling the spreading. Most of the confirmed cases are those who travel to and from foreign countries. People can still go to work and school. Yet, most people try to avoid the crowd and limit the social activities. There were couple times when we took the big city bus in the daytime, we were the only two passengers on the bus. There's one funny news happened yesterday - One man flew from Hong Kong to Taiwan. He paid about US\$100 for the air ticket. (About half price of the regular ones.) He was the only passenger for the entire airplane. After he landed, he was interviewed with tons of "wows".

Actually, it's so interesting that anyone, from anywhere, nearly, can "attend church" with almost any church in the world right now because so many churches have responded similarly by putting resources and videos and live feeds online.

I do pray that you will escape this terrible virus, and that the church will not suffer any loss. The death toll around the world is absolutely staggering. Just staggering.

As for me ... like so many around the world, I'm coping with the

particular effects of this situation on my own life and work, such as losing major donors for this year already, which means sadly informing a lot of really sweet and deserving students/families that we won't be able to help them. For some families it means their children won't be able to continue their education...not only because of the scholarship but because of how the virus is affecting their income, debts, etc.

Please pray especially for the director of NLCF. Her name is Bee. She's supposed to be "on vacation" this week and she's had no break at all because of various things going on. I feel terrible that - in this rare emergency situation - I've had to contact her to help deal with things. Usually it's my job to make sure no one bothers her ... but there was really no way around it this week. Makes me feel a bit like I'm not doing my job well.

Anyway - put into the context of the world's suffering, it's really not that big of a deal - but hard nonetheless.

I'm deeply grateful for the prayer of the church. May God help us rise to praise Him still.

Hi dear, thanks so much for checking in. The situation in Thailand is good. In my city, there have been no new cases for over three weeks. Prior to that, we only had 39 cases and one death. Nationally, there have been fewer than 3,000 cases and only about 40 deaths (1 death is a terrible loss, but in comparison to much of the world, 40 is very low). There are fewer and fewer new cases each day - sometimes less than 10. However, non-essential businesses are still closed and the economy is suffering. It is a sobering reality...so many people live normally on the edge of poverty. This has pushed them easily over the edge. We are doing our best to respond within our means.

Personally, I am doing well. Our office was closed for a few weeks, so I worked from home, but I've been back to work for two weeks now, since our office isn't a public place. Everyone wears their masks everywhere they go, in order to protect the greater public and curb the spread. I've been really sad to see how folks have protested measures like these and others in the U.S. I understand their thinking, but it still makes me sad that individual rights seem to take precedence over the protection of others. It's a hard situation.

May God continue to protect FBC and its loved ones and neighbors!

I want to thank everyone for your prayers during my time away last week. Please continue to pray for Jackie as she heals up, and for my dad and sister and her family as they adjust to the new circumstances. We are doing well. Thank you all.

The present civil strife makes me sad. Yet I am hopeful. In spite of the protests and the destruction, this feels different to me, like there is more agreement than in times past. I believe that we all want justice and peace. Meanwhile, a few reminders from scripture can help.

In Ephesians, Paul writes;

"Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you."

It has been said that compassion is the ability "to walk a mile in someone else's shoes." In the present circumstances it is a good suggestion to be very conscientious in the practice of compassion, by considering the ones whose actions we understand the least, and think about what it might be like to be in their circumstances.



Along the same line, keep in mind the words of Paul in Philippians 2, to "value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you look to the interests of the others."

There is also, as if we could forget, a viral pandemic that has limited our ability to gather together. We are now in the most difficult phase (at least to me) of the shutdown when the case numbers are coming down and partial re-openings are in progress and a decision about resuming our worship gatherings is almost upon us.

Presently, I don't have such a decision. I believe that it is wise to wait a few more weeks to see the impact of all the recent activities before we make a decision. Please be patient; we want to ensure everyone's safety and the safety of our community. Forgive our caution if you think we are moving too slowly.

Some of you may want to forgive our impatience if you think we are moving too quickly.

I wish I could say all this will be over soon, but it looks like things might drag on for awhile. Let me leave you with a reading from 1 Corinthians. It is the well-known passage about the nature of unselfish love:

"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres."

I pray for each of you that God's presence will bring you peace that surpasses knowledge, joy that knows no bounds, and an enduring hope, until we meet again.

One Great Hour of Sharing

Dear First Baptist Family,

I received the following letter from Lisa Rothenberger-Winter of our American Baptist Home Missions Societies (ABHMS) about the One Great Hour of Sharing which says everything so much better than I can about a great need.

"For Americans, COVID-19 has been an unprecedented disruption to life as we have known it. For many, it is devastatingly life-changing, as loved ones succumb to the deadly virus. Others continue to lose jobs overnight. Like you, I have practiced the mandated social distancing, aware that the ability to distance myself from others is a luxury that many in our country and around the world do not have.

Our evening news is focused almost entirely on differing aspects of the pandemic, and afternoon briefings by state authorities have become the norm. There is one indisputable fact: the need created by COVID-19 surpasses what most of us have seen in our lifetime.

One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) is one of the American Baptist expressions of relief for those who are in need now, and those who will be in need in the future. Some have already experienced the toll that this virus takes while others are social distancing to prevent it from taking root in their community.

We know what this means for Americans. We have watched the news as the figures for unemployment claims have soared to record numbers. We see the lines for the food distributions. In a similar way, all around the world, social distancing means that many are not able to leave the house. That means many are not able to work.

And that means many are not able to feed their families. The cycle is the same whether you are in Indiana or India.

Because American Baptists gave to the OGHS annual offering last year we had the resources to provide immediate relief. Today, gifts received in 2019 are being used around the world to provide personal protective equipment, food relief and economic support.

The ABHMS has issued an appeal for funds to provide relief here in the U.S. and Puerto Rico... International Ministries (IM) has done the same for relief outside the U.S. To date, over \$70,000 has been provided to more than 32 partners in 22 countries around the world. And this is just the beginning...

As your congregation considers receiving the OGHS annual offering this year, I understand that not everyone will be able to give as they have in the past. Some are struggling with an uncertain financial situation from the loss of income. I am very sensitive to this and do not want to encourage you to ask people to give financially beyond their ability during these trying times. If that is the case within your church, thank you for standing with OGHS and continuing to support the offering

with your prayers. For those who can give, encourage them to support the offering as they have in the past, and with any additional offerings they can give, provide for COVID-19 response."

Dear church family, what many of you may not realize is that although the OGHS has provided disaster relief in many areas of the U.S. in the past, it has been to individual states or areas. This is the first time that our entire country has been affected by a national disaster, and the need is very great. I also understand that some of our church fellowship may not be able to support the OGHS as much as they usually do during this crisis. I ask that you all prayerfully consider your support as much as you can. I ask that those who can support this important offering to consider giving a little more than usual if possible. Our goal is \$700. Since we are not gathering in church right now, you will not have a special envelope for this offering. You can include it in your regular offering check and make a note on the memo line that it is for OGHS. You can mail your check to the church or to Randy Turner, or you may take your check to church on any of the mornings that Pastor Allison is in his office.

imposed Security Laws on Hong Kong as part of the Basic Laws that governs the One Country Two Systems operation, and the first municipal recall election in Taiwan's history on this coming Saturday (6/6) against a highprofile mayor, who was the former presidential candidate for the Kuomintang (KMT). On top of them, is the pandemic threaten. Taiwan still is the safest place with the COVID-19. So far, we are safe and well. Due to Emerson needs more doctor appointments for his dental treatment and monitoring his irregular heartbeat problem, we look forward to returning to Hong Kong in July.

The Hong Kong community is still suffering with the inconvenience of quarantine, the limitation of the group gathering, and unemployment caused by the pandemic, the new Security Law provokes thousands of protesters going to the streets and HK police using tear gas to suppress the demonstrations. Please pray for the city and God's sovereignty and mercy over it.

We, now, still can communicate with the partners (churches and friends) in Hong Kong thru email, phone chat & text in the cell phone. No one knows when will the FB and WhatsApp (the most used communication application for cell phone users in HK) be banned by the government after the new Security Law is applied and practiced.

Our term of service should end on February 29, 2022. So, we ought to return to US before August 31, 2021. Therefore, we will have half year (Sep 1, 2021 – February 29, 2022) for the deputation in the States. Those time frame and schedule are ideally planned without any special circumstances. There might have disturbed or turbulent situation for Hong Kong in the near future. We can only trust God's leading and protection to serve until the day we should leave.

More than a month, we had regular Wednesday prayer meeting and Bible study with the staffs of the research center and Professor Lin's small group from her church. (Please see the photos.) Emerson and I have plenty time read the Bible and books. We are digging in reading a series from The Land Between (A Regional Study Guide to The Land of The Bible) by James Monson, also another book written by my Ashland Seminary's professor. Prayerfully, I can finish reading his huge book - page by page.

Please stay safe and stay healthy. You are in our prayers.

Personally, I am tiring of the present situation, as I am sure many of you are. I would very much like to meet together soon. I am sympathetic with all of you who would also like to resume live worship services. I ask for patience.

I wish to thank everyone for faithful giving during this time, and for the expressions of support about the video services. And I am very thankful for all those who have participated in their production. For the time being, we will keep making them.

My prayer is for all those affected by this virus, and by the accompanying economic strain, and by the stress of not knowing. For many, the main affect of this pandemic is being isolated from normal relationships, and I am concerned for everyone presently experiencing this kind of distance. I pray that God's presence will see us through, providing wisdom, strength, and serenity.

with the COVID-19. So far, we are safe and well. Due to Emerson needs more doctor appointments for his dental treatment and monitoring his irregular heartbeat problem, we look forward to returning to Hong Kong in July.

The Hong Kong community is still suffering with the inconvenience of quarantine, the limitation of the group gathering, and unemployment caused by the pandemic, the new Security Law provokes thousands of protesters going to the streets and HK police using tear gas to suppress the demonstrations. Please pray for the city and God's sovereignty and mercy over it.

We, now, still can communicate with the partners (churches and friends) in Hong Kong thru email, phone chat & text in the cell phone. No one knows when will the FB and WhatsApp (the most used communication application for cell phone users in HK) be banned by the government after

the new Security Law is applied and practiced.

Our term of service should end on February 29, 2022. So, we ought to return to US before August 31, 2021. Therefore, we will have half year (Sep 1, 2021 – February 29, 2022) for the deputation in the States. Those time frame and schedule are ideally planned without any special circumstances. There might have disturbed or turbulent situation for Hong Kong in the near future. We can only trust God's leading and protection to serve until the day we should leave.

More than a month, we had regular Wednesday prayer meeting and Bible study with the staffs of the research center and Professor Lin's small group from her church....

Please stay safe and stay healthy. You are in our prayers.

From Jeni Pedzinski

My family is doing alright so far. My sister and my mom are both out of work, but God has provided. I think the next big concern is whether schools will open or not, which will impact both of them. My mom is the better-equipped to teach, but she also really needs to find work. The children are 5, 7, and 9 right now ... so they all need near-constant care in their education.

Here in Thailand, the virus has long been eradicated. There has been no community transmission for over two months. We all still wear masks and have our temperatures taken in public places, though, as a method of

extra precaution. I've never heard a single complaint. Can you imagine? These are times when I really question why people think America is great. Wealth is not the sole measure of greatness.

Despite having no community transmissions, Thai schools chose to begin the year (in May, as is their academic calendar) with online classes. However, they opened the schools up for inperson education on July 1, and there have been no issues. Our residents actually enjoyed doing online education and spending more time together at our residence, which is their home. I think most teens around the world sometimes would prefer no to face the daily pressures of peers and teachers, etc. Even so, they are back at school and thriving. Three of our 17 residents are homeschooled, as they weren't able to attend school growing up and are way behind their age/ grade level. They are still doing great, though. It's a challenge for our housemothers to keep up with teaching three different grade levels though.

I have heard from both our housemothers recently how worn out they are. Theirs is a very difficult, demanding job, providing love, care, discipline, etc. for a diverse group of teen girls whose emotions and hormones are naturally a bit out of whack. Please pray for May and Fai, especially that God would give them renewed passion and energy for their work. Pray that we, as leaders, would also know how to best support them.

Personally, I am doing well. I had a two-week "staycation" in July, and it was the most restful time off I've ever had. I hired a guide to take me and a friend trekking through the mountain jungle one day, but aside from that, I stayed

home, started and finished a cross-stitch project, read, napped, and refueled for the upcoming year. I say "the upcoming year" because (you might remember) I have a home assignment/furlough coming up next July. At that point, I will have been here six years. I'm already really looking forward to spending that furlough period visiting and encouraging the churches all over the country who support me and New Life Center. That is actually a really important part of being a missionary, and it's a part of my job I really enjoy. Just 337 days left.....not that I'm counting?

I pray that you and the church continue to be careful, and that you also are able to use this time to spend extra time with the Lord. I read this morning in Streams in the Desert (a devotional) that obstacles are opportunities for God to show us His love. May we all live lives that dwell on and under this incredible love...standing in faith NO MATTER WHAT.

meet together as much as they have grown accustomed, and in the same ways. Those of you who were there, thank you for coming, and for your patience throughout this time.

If you were not there, we understand. We are thinking of you, and miss you. the worship video of the service came up on Monday. Remember to check that each week if you are unable to attend in person. In the past there was an audio version of the service on the website fbcdelaware.org; now it will be a video.

It is our plan to continue to monitor the Covid-19 numbers in Ohio and in Delaware, and assess our ability to meet safely. It at some point we think it unsafe to meet, we will make the hard decision to go back to online worship. For now, the case numbers are holding steady, although there are some other negative trends that are concerning. As of now, we plan to stay open. For the present there are no plans to

restart Sunday School or regular fellowships. As the circumstances allow we will restart them.

Once again, I want to thank everyone who helped in the making of the videos; those who provided readings, musical pieces and photography. I would be amiss if I did not single out Larry Faulk for the filming and editing, and Mary Lou Lovell for coordinating the music. Without them these videos would not have been possible. I am more than grateful.

October is ahead, be ready for the World Mission offering emphasis, in support of ABC missionaries around the world. As you know, we support Jeni Pedzinski and Emerson and Ivy Wu, and all the missionaries through our missions giving.

God bless you all, and remember, God's Kingdom is very near to us. See you on Sunday.

And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of



the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

In this time of pandemic, when the church is not able to meet as usual, when even the meetings that take place are not routine, it strikes me as helpful simply to hear these words, and see them in print, and take them as a reminder of our precious calling in Christ. Let them remain fresh on our minds.

We have been meeting for about a month now, and things have gone well. I know that wearing masks and not singing is a sacrifice, and we all want very much for normal worship to return along with fellowship meals and Sunday School and game nights. I encourage all of you to remain vigilant about the Covid-19 protocols. One never knows when letting our guard down will allow the virus to spread among

us. I am grateful to everyone for helping so that we can continue to meet in person.

The holiday season begins in November. Because of the pandemic, we are not sure what it will be like this vear. Some of our traditional holiday activities will change a little. In November, be ready for Change for Change on the first Sunday, the Thanksgiving Offering, a new (for us) project, the Shoe Box ministry supporting Samaritan's Purse, and the gift collection for foster children through Jobs and Family Services. The text from Colossians reminds me that the Church is not primarily programs and buildings, doctrines and rituals, nor denominations. It is people in relationship with God and each other through Jesus Christ, who calls us, forgives us, is present with us, as we experience God's love working among us.

There was a time when on the Sunday before or after Thanksgiving, whichever preceded the first Sunday of Advent, I would simply ask a question, and that would be the message for the day. The question was, "What are you thankful for?" After that, people in the congregation would offer thanksgivings until the time ran out.

Family, friends, health, faith, country, work, blessings of all kinds would be offered up in the acknowledgment that all of life is grace and we have been richly blessed. I hope each of you will spend some time thinking about it, maybe even in a more intense way this year.

I am never very good at these kinds of things. My deepest feelings are kept silent for lack of words. Maybe some of you are the same way. I am thankful for God's salvation and for the providential way God has sustained me and my family through the years. A good part of that care is the faithfulness found here in Delaware in our congregation. In these last several months as we have tried to negotiate this crisis together. I greatly

appreciate the support for each other and for me that I have seen and known among you all.

I hope your holy day season is meaningful despite not being able to see family and friends as much, and that soon we will be able to begin meeting again.

God's blessing to everyone. Happy Thanksgiving, and the best of all Christmases.

Human Rights Day

Human Rights Day is observed every year on December 10 the day the United Nations General Assembly adopted, in 1948, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights(UDHR). The UDHR is a milestone document that proclaims the inalienable rights which everyone is entitled to as a human being - regardless of race, colour, religion, sex, language, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. Available in more than 500 languages, it is the most translated document in the world.

2020 Theme: Recover Better - Stand Up for Human Rights

This year's Human Rights Day theme relates to the COVID-19 pandemic and focuses on the need to build back better by ensuring Human Rights are central to recovery efforts. We will reach our common global goals only if we are able to create equal opportunities for all, address the failures exposed and exploited by COVID-19, and apply human rights standards to tackle entrenched, systematic, and intergenerational inequalities. exclusion and discrimination. 10 December is an opportunity to reaffirm the importance of human rights in re-building the world we want, the need for global solidarity as well as our interconnectedness and shared humanity.
