As I write this article, it has been less than twenty-four hours since the winter solstice. which occurred at 4:47 on Wednesday, December 21st. The celebration of the new year has been a part of various cultural expressions from "prehistoric" times. That means as long as people have been around leaving any trace of their existence, they have been marking the time when the daylight began to get longer each day. Several ancient religions observed "the birth of the sun" each year. Symbolically, the "shortest" days represent death, and the "lengthening" days as spring approaches represent rebirth, or new life.

Several ancient religions observed the birth of the sun at this time each year. Because they could not easily discern the exact moment of the winter solstice, some cultures celebrated the sun's birth on December 25, which is actually a few days after the solstice. When Christians



began to celebrate the birth of Jesus, it is thought that they substituted it for the sun-birth observances of their neighbors.

Then, when the Julian calendar came into use, and later the Gregorian, the date for the new year became January 1st, about ten days after the solstice. Often I have wondered why the first day of January doesn't coincide with the solstice, but that is another question.

Anyway, here we are at the beginning of another year, 2023 years since Christ was born. As I have gotten older, it seems like time passes more quickly and Christmas and New Year's Day festivities run together a bit. Maybe it is the same for you. It seems like it is always another new year. But no matter, as we look out upon the near future, and we anticipate the coming of another spring and summer and fall, we can be confident that this year will be filled with the same delights and pleasures; vacations, graduations, new jobs, births, retirements, etc., as well as the same kind of troubles as in all the previous years.

The new year offers a good opportunity to be renewed in the hope that God is with us throughout our journey in this life, and of resurrection in the world to come. It is my prayer that your 2023 will be greatly blessed, and filled with promises kept, and our lives together enriched with meaning because they are filled with Christ, which means, with mercy and love.



As January ends and February begins, the lengthening of the days becomes more apparent each passing week. Now and again the sun shines through the dreariness of the season to remind us of spring's approach. The changing of the season between winter and spring makes a natural daily visual aid for the telling of the gospel story. Having begun with Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany, we are able to focus our attention on the life and ministry of Jesus, and as spring arrives around the time of Easter, the world blossoms with new life around us.

As it is, we are heavy into the new year, enough to say that it is no longer new. There is much to look forward to. I am anticipating the time of the liturgical year named after the lengthening of the days. We call it Lent, and it begins on Ash Wednesday, February 22; the following Sundays mark



the approach of the Passion with Good Friday, and Easter, which is April 9th.

With that in mind, the Lenten Bible Study this year will also begin in February. On Sunday the 26th at 5:00 P.M. We will gather each week for five consecutive Sundays ending on March 26th. The title of the study is, "The Patriarchs: Stories in Genesis." With a view toward a better understanding of our faith and theology, we will cover stories involving Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebekah, Jacob and Esau, and Joseph and his brothers.

There is way too much in Genesis to consider in only five weeks, but we will do our best. I hope you will be able to join us. If you are interested in doing a little preparing, read the Book of Genesis between now and then.

As always, I look forward to our time together, and pray that the blessing of God's presence and care will remain with you throughout this winter, as it turns in to spring.


PASTOR ON VACATION


If you would like to read some of Dr. Allison's sermons, they are available on our website. There are currently manuscripts for 2021 and 2022 online. Others will be added soon.

On my journey this past week I traveled east, in part to see the ocean in winter, and in part to go places I had never been, and see sights I have never seen. Among the sights were Independence Hall in Philadelphia and the Liberty Bell; the "Marconi Site" on Cape Cod, where the first successful trans-Atlantic wireless message was sent in 1903; Walden Pond; and Plymouth Rock.

The star of the trip was the ocean, which on the eastern side of Cape Cod was as beautiful and blue as I had ever seen it. The ocean has always served for me as a visual aid to the majesty and power of God. The water was cold, as one might imagine, but I stepped in it enough to collect some of it in a jar so I could bring it home. I have the Atlantic Ocean in my office if anyone wants to see it.

I don't really have a bucket list, except maybe to go to all fifty states before my time is up. I crossed Rhode Island and New Hampshire off the list. There is a vague list somewhere in my brain of historic churches I would like to visit, and I was able to worship in one of them, the First Baptist Church in America, which is in Providence, RI.



The church was founded in 1638 by Roger Williams, who also founded Rhode Island and its capital, Providence, and who many Baptists consider a "father in the faith." The building was completed in




1775. Part of Baptist heritage is an emphasis on religious liberty, the kind Williams did not find in Massachusetts Bay, but made sure to include as a part of the new colony.

All in all, it was a good trip, and I am glad to be home. It is time for the season of Lent. The first Sunday is February 26th; and it lasts throughout March and into April, with Palm Sunday on April 2nd, Maundy Thursday on April 6th, Good Friday on April 7th, and Easter on the 9th. On Sundays throughout March at 5 pm we will share a Bible study about the Patriarchs (and some of the Matriarchs too), stories in Genesis about Abraham and Sarah, Jacob and Esau, and Joseph and his brothers in Egypt. I hope everyone can join us.

Along the way spring will come, once again providing a living visual aid of resurrection right before our eyes. I pray this is a meaningful time of the year for everyone.

The two happiest days of the vear for Christian believers are Christmas, the day of Christ's birth, and Easter, the day of Christ's resurrection. As is the custom, every year in springtime as the grass turns green and the flowers bloom. and as the trees come back to life, we celebrate the joyful news of life's victory.

In between there is winter, which, in spite of its beauty, is characterized by bleakness, cold temperatures, and the shortness of the days. In this brief reflection that comes at the beginning of the month of April, with Easter at hand, it is with the winter of life that I am concerned.

The inhospitality of winter serves as a metaphor of the difficulties of life that we sometimes describe with the same adjectives; cold, dreary, barren, dark. A "bleak midwinter" can describe the weather in February or it can refer to the darkness of war, disease, or sin, the heaviness that sometimes hovers over life and threatens to rob its splendor.

The Christian Faith addresses this heaviness. Its beginning came to a small band of believers whose hopes, and

their understanding of life. were shattered when Jesus died. Skipping over of the troubling end of the life of Jesus, and our own troubles. to travel the distance between Christmas and Easter without the Passion in-between, is to miss the point of the whole drama, and to miss the power of resurrection.

We all know about the hard side of life because we have all experienced hard things. We are called to a mature faith. In a way, believers ought to be the most mature of all people, able to handle the hardships of life, and to help others by following Christ's example of sacrifice and service, and by seeing beyond the darkness of

life's winters to the springtime of life and light that follows.

The Maundy Thursday service on April 6th at 7 pm is a worshipful way to help. Attention to the tragedy of the night of the arrest and the cross on the next day deepens the joy of Easter faith. I pray that for each of you the observances of Holy Week and the celebration of Easter will touch the depths of that joy.


Mission/Outreach News





I have always said that my favorite color is blue, like the sky. As time goes by, however, I am increasingly impressed by the color green. In both high school and college it was part of my school colors, and I always envied other schools with what I considered better colors, reds and blues, orange and black.

One of my favorite green colors is of the newly unfolded leaves at this time of the year. The way they dapple the sunlight is mimicked by the color of some of the stained glass in our sanctuary. I am sure the artist used that color so that on Sundays when believers gathered for worship, it would seem a little like a "sanctuary in the wood in springtime," an outdoor place indoors, of respite from all the buildings that people have made.

As spring conducts its annual assault on winter, and the trees come out with new life and everything



gradually turns green, I think of Easter things. The season of Easter lasts for fifty days until the arrival of Pentecost. This year, Easter came on April 9th, and Pentecost Sunday will coincide with what to us is Memorial Day weekend. That means most of April and May is Easter.

Earthly life is somewhat overwhelming, with its hustle and bustle, its distortions and disputations, its restlessness, its unhappiness. But Easter is the opposite of all that, and stands for the overwhelming presence of God all around, in every place, in every moment. Let it be our prayer through the month of May, as the earth turns green again, that we might see the whole world filled up with God's Spirit. One cannot help but think of the line in the 23rd Psalm, "he makes me lie down in *green* pastures . . . and restores my soul." Think about the presence of God every day when you see the grass and the trees that become the color of our world each spring.

I don't think green has replaced blue as my favorite color, but it can represent the ever-present reality of God's Spirit, at least at this time of the year. May your life be green.

Happy Summer! As promised, we are going to resume the last of the Covid era cancellations, which is the custom of summertime gatherings. This year the focus is stained glass. One of the distinctions among believers nowadays is between traditional and contemporary worship. My suspicion is that what most people think about when they hear those terms, regards style in general, and music in particular.

There are, however, other features, like building architecture and setting. Contemporary worshippers often choose rooms that can be used for multiple purposes and multi-functional; fellowship hall, theatre, gymnasium, and sanctuary all in one.

By contrast, the buildings of more traditional churches will likely be older and have different spaces for different activities. At least there will be a sanctuary used primarily, if not exclusively, for worship. There are more likely to be high ceilings, and on the outside, steeples or towers.

Our church is what I call middle-of-the-20th-century traditional. In addition to the late 19th century building with



a tower and high ceilings, we have a pipe organ and sing hymns. Our liturgy is typical of American Protestantism of the era. We have stained glass.

Stained glass has been a part of church art and architecture for more than one thousand years. Beginning in July, and with the goal of better understanding the meaning of our traditions, we will explore the stained-glass aspect of our building and heritage.

The first meeting will be at 5pm on Sunday, July the 9th. We will also meet on July 30 at the same time. There will be attention given to the symbolism of the images in our sanctuary, their biblical foundation, the way that life has changed since the building was built, and what the changes mean for how we understand ourselves. We will also learn about the history of stained-glass, and participate in an activity designing and putting together stained-glass crosses.

There is no attempt to make judgments regarding different traditions or worship styles, but only to be better acquainted with our own and how that reflects who we are are as a church. I hope and encourage everyone to participate, and invite anyone else who might be interested to join us as well.

In July we have taken a look at the stained glass in the sanctuary and how it is a part of our worship setting. The large window in the rear that depicts Jesus with the Samaritan woman reminds us that worship in "spirit and truth" is not tied to a place or a setting. Even a building in which to worship is not necessary. For the first 300 years or so, believers did not have buildings.

One could also think of the hymnal in the same way. An important part of our worship involves the music. Most of the songs we use come from "Hymns for the Living Church" or "The Faith We Sing." Many churches and denominational groups use different hymnals and sing different songs. Some churches have composers that write original music for use in their services.

The significance of the space in which we meet and the music is also not tied to necessity. They are a gift to be accepted, and for which



to be grateful. When I think of necessary things that give us a helpful pointer in the direction true worship, I am reminded that all we need is God's presence and each other, which is what gives significance to the space we share and all the songs and the other elements of worship.

For some reason a passage of scripture from Paul's Epistle to the Colossians comes to mind. In it he gave instructions to them about who they were as God's chosen people, and how they might worship together. As a way of summing things up, it seems right to leave that text with you here, from Colossians 3:12-17;

"Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity."

Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace, and be thankful. Let the message of Christ dwell among you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom through psalms, hymns, and songs from the Spirit, singing to God with gratitude in your hearts. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

History of Constitution Day and Citizenship Day

In 1939 newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst advocated a day to celebrate US Citizenship. In 1940 the Congress created "I Am an American Dav" to be celebrated in the third Sunday in May. On February 29, 1952, President Harry Truman signed into law "Citizenship Day" replacing I am an American Day. On August 2, 1956, the Congress requested that the president proclaim the week beginning September 17 and ending September 23 of each year as "Constitution Week".

Constitution Day became a national observance in 2004. when the Congress passed a bill designating September 17 as the day for citizens to commemorate the signing of the U.S. Constitution and learn more about our founding document. The chief sponsor, Senator Robert Byrd, Democrat from West Virginia. once said, "Our ideals of freedom, set forth and realized in our Constitution, are our greatest export to the world." He added the Constitution Day clause to his 2004 federal spending bill because he believed that all citizens should know about their rights as outlined in the Constitution. This clause mandates the teaching of the Constitution in schools that receive federal funds, as well as federal agencies.

It is good to be home. For a few days last week, I left the country and went into Canada. This was the first time I had ever been out of the United States, believe it or not. Canada is not too much of an adjustment. Life in Ontario is not that much different than in Ohio, but it is still another country.

Driving around, there were Canadian flags waving and Ontario license plates on all the cars. All the people were nice and polite (I doubt any of them knew I was an American), but I still felt a little different, a little more vulnerable, than when driving anywhere in America, to which I was happy to return after a few days.

Most of America is strange to me, places I have never been, but I still felt differently driving in Canada. It isn't that I wasn't welcome, but that I wasn't *home*. *That* feeling was new to me, and enables me to better relate to those in similar



circumstances. I also thought of the passage in Hebrews 11:13-16, "All these people were still living by faith when they died. They did not receive the things promised; they only saw them and welcomed them from a distance, admitting that they were foreigners and strangers on earth. People who say such things show that they are looking for a country of their own. If they had been thinking of the country they had left, they would have had opportunity to return. Instead, they were longing for a better country -a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them."

Anyway, I am thankful for the time away. It is greatly appreciated.

Now it is fall and October is upon us. Fall is a blessed time of the year with the cooler temperatures and the changing colors. Rally Day happened while I was away, and we are back to regular scheduling, with Sunday School at 9:30 a.m. and worship at 10:45 a.m. I look forward to the Crop Walk, October 1st, at 2 pm at OWU, and also to the emphasis on World Missions throughout the month.

If Frederick Buechner is right when he suggests, "faith is a journey in search of a homeland," then we might think of missions as journeying with others along the way. I thank God for journeys and for coming home again, and for the promise of an eternal home.

Late fall is a good time to think about the meaning of things, to take stock of our lives and of life itself. The psalm of the week is the 90th, and it helps. Presented as a prayer of Moses, a person of God, it begins:

"Lord, you have been our dwelling place throughout all generations."

It speaks of the grandeur of God who is from, "everlasting to everlasting," and who brought forth the whole world. It is a good start.

Sometimes the psalms can be a little blunt. In the lectionary reading, verses 7-12 are left out. I am always interested in what is left out when we read the Bible. In this case, the message in the middle is the blunt part.

"We are consumed by your anger

and terrified by your indignation."



It speaks of God's wrath at human sinfulness; and of mortality, how short life is and how insignificant human beings are in the scheme of things; how quickly the days pass. And then it prays for humility:

"Teach us to number our days,

that we may gain a heart of wisdom."

Most people are not much good at the numbering of days. Rather, the tendency is to live as if the days will last forever. It is interesting that the full acknowledgment of our mortality is associated with wisdom. The implication is that this acknowledgment prepares the ground in us that we might be ready to accept also, in addition to God's judgement, God's compassion and unfailing love, so that the prayer at the end is appropriate.

And it is a beautiful prayer at the end:

"Have compassion on your servants.

Satisfy us in the morning with your unfailing love,

that we may sing for joy and be glad all our days . . .

May the favor of the Lord our God rest on us . . ."

Let this be our prayer as we live out the remainder of this one year. Blessings to all as we enter into the time when we take stock of things, celebrate gratitude, and prepare for Advent.

"The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the One and Only, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth." John 1:14.

Advent begins on December 3rd, which marks the beginning of the Christian liturgical year. After six months in the time after Pentecost, the gospel story is proclaimed anew from the time of anticipation that leads to the birth of Jesus Christ, all the way through the time of Epiphany to Lent, Holy Week and Easter, and the time of the Spirit. It all begins with Advent.

Generally speaking, advent may be defined as the moment just before something happens. It is a time of expectation and hope, and not a little excitement. Sometimes events are completely surprising, but some of the time we are aware of living through that last little bit of waiting before the big thing happens; the last few months before a graduation, a wedding, or the birth of a child.

More specifically, Advent refers to the four weeks before the celebration of Christmas and the birth of Jesus into the



world. It is the observation of the Incarnation, God revealed in humility, as a centered, healthy person in an unhealthy world; a light shining in the darkness, with a mercy that perseveres throughout life, and finally, a majesty that can only be sung by angels. It is in the context of Christ's birth, life, and death that life's meaning is considered, and understood.

As our lives come more and more to be consumed by the technologies the age, by the individual demands of modern life, and the increasingly troubled life of the world, let us take the time to reflect upon



and consider again the, "Word made flesh," the very being of God in human form, and may it produce in us an anxious excitement about the hope and peace, joy, and love that mark the Sundays, and are the goal of the faithful life.
