anta Claus brought me a stocking again this year. to make. All of us, of course, plan to eat less, exercise more, worry less, relax more, work less, improve our minds and be kinder to our fellow humans. Unfortunately, New Year's

resolutions usually last for 2 or 3 days and then all of our fabulous intentions go out the front door with the Christmas tree.

But remember, we're not just turning over the calendar from 1997 to 1998, we're also beginning a new church year; a new year in our life of faith. A life of faith, is kind of like a "Tamagotchi" pet. It's alive. It needs our constant care and attention or it will die. It needs, not only to be fed and cared for, but it also needs to be

I'm so proud they worked hard to totally raise the full amount by pie sales and silent auction. Give 'em a pat on the back!






Work is nearing completion on the handicapped accessibility project. Here are some photos taken earlier in the project.





lebruary. The month of two very important holidays. One is a "Hallmark" holiday and one is a "religious" holiday. of Valentine's day, especially the practice of sending flowers (hint, hint), I tend to agree that

Ash Wednesday is slightly more significant. Christmas and Easter are gifts from God. There's nothing we can do accept receive the gift of life that they offer. But, the season of Lent, is the time of year when we take some time to think about and really contemplate our relationship with God and our responsibilities within that relationship. To discover the ways in which our relationship with God has become broken and has fallen short of what it can be,



Throughout America, nearly two million men, women and children express their commitment to Jesus Christ through an affiliation with one of the 6,000 congregations of the American Baptist Churches in the United States and Puerto Rico.

We are one of about 25 Baptist groups in the United States, and we are about

fourth in size among these Baptist groups.



We are delightfully rich in our

variety. Thirty seven percent of us are Black. Three percent of us are Asian, Hispanic, and Native American. Sixty percent of us are White.

We are quite individualistic. We don't believe any pastor or denominational leader has a right to speak for us on matters of faith or conscience. We believe individuals should, with the guidance of the Holy spirit, make up their own minds about what they believe. And we believe all Christians—laity as well as clergy—have special callings to be ministers for Jesus Christ.

Our individualism leads to some disagreements in the political, social and theological positions we hold. Like most Baptists, we enjoy our differences and we enjoy discussing them. Even so, we don't let our diversity slow us down. Most of us agree on the matters we think are really important.



What American Baptist's Believe

We confess Jesus Christ as the Son of the Living God, our Lord and Savior. We are joyously united in our common task of sharing the whole Gospel with the whole world.

We believe in the Bible as the divinely inspired record of God's actions in history, and we believe it is a trustworthy, authoritative, and all-sufficient rule of faith and practice.

We believe that all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and we believe Jesus died to save us from our sins. Those of us who believe this are forgiven by God and enter into a new life. That is what Baptists mean when we say we are born again. Being born again does not make us perfect, of course. It means we know God loves us and God has forgiven us.

We observe two ordinances: We baptize believers by immersion. We regard "believer's baptism" as a symbol of death to the old life, and resurrection to a new life in Christ. We celebrate the Lord's Supper (or Holy Communion) in memory of the sufferings of Christ. Most American Baptists practice "open communion," and invite all believers to participate in its celebration.

Finally, we believe that all American Baptists, laity and clergy, are called together to be a family of disciples; witnessing at home and throughout the world to the saving grace of Jesus Christ, and calling upon all individuals, groups, institutions, and nations to act justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with their God.






Above: A worker puts the finishing touches on the sidewalk.




Above: After the sidewalk was completed, the parking area was paved, parking spaces were indicated with paint and signs, and grass seed was planted.

1 82 degrees and sunny. A nice breeze kept it from getting too hot. We put on our shorts, took a drive with the windows rolled down and let the wind blow through our hair. It was a gorgeous summer day. Only thing was, it wasn't summer. I had to look at the calendar 2 or 3 times that day, but sure enough, it was only March 27.

What happened to Spring?

Maybe we're just going to skip spring this year and get right on with summer. Or perhaps we already had spring back in February and March, with the mild temperatures and dry weather we enjoyed in place of bitter cold and snow storms. Or perhaps this is just a trick of Mother Nature and we'll have a strange spell of cold weather and blizzards in April.

Blame it on El Nino, or global warning if you want to, but I don't know what's causing this unseasonable weather. What I do know, is that 82 degree days in March don't come without a cost.

Don't get me wrong, I'm not complaining, I love a beautiful, warm, sunny day as much as the next person. I've never seen tulips blooming in March. It's astounding. But the realist in me knows that it's still only March, and who knows what kind of weather could be around the next corner.

Besides, from a strictly spiritual point of view, warm weather during Lent is not a good idea. Lent is a season for serious self-examination and repentance. Warm and sunny days aren't conducive to either one of these religious attitudes.

I believe that God, in infinite wisdom, placed Lent in the late winter and Easter in the early spring for a reason. It was part of the divine plan for our little corner of the world. The gift of new life that God gives to us in

Christ, is so wonderfully illustrated in the birth of new life in the world around us. It just makes sense.

I'm not suggesting that during this last week of Lent, especially with it being Holy Week and all, that we should crank up our air conditioners, put on our sweaters and ear muffs and sorrowfully contemplate the sinful nature of our lives. What I am suggesting, is that we not confuse Easter with an early spring. It's still Lent.

Not that I want you to be sad and depressed, that's certainly not the aim of the Lenten season. But warm

weather can be distracting. That's why most people take vacations in the summer. That's why we don't make children go to school during the hottest months of the summer. It's too hard to concentrate. We'd rather be out playing or swimming or tooling around in the garden or laying in the warm sunshine. Enjoying life. That's why God didn't put Lent in the summer.

Easter will come. It's just around the corner. But for now, remember, it's still Lent.

Let us remember together, who we are as God's people. Let us pray for God to move within our lives and within our life together, to form us into a holy people.

discovered some muscles I didn't know I had. This past weekend, Rundy and I, being the kind and generous people that we are, went up to Michigan to help my folks put up a wood deck in the side yard of their house. We put the whole thing in with screws. I'm not bragging, but I believe I must have put over half of those screws in myself. Thank God for the invention of the cordless screwdriver/drill.

The truth is, when it comes to working on my knees, I'm a big wimp. I will go great lengths to avoid having to be in a kneeling position. For instance, I'm a big fan of the long handled floor mop. I'd also make a pretty lousy Catholic.

Believe it or not, the job wasn't that hard on my knees, but my right hand was another story. Have you ever used a power tool for an extended period of time? If so, you know that it can cause your hand muscles to tighten up. This condition is exacerbated if you also happen to have Carpel Tunnel Syndrome in the hand that does all the gripping.

We worked all day Friday and all day Saturday, then drove home so we'd be here for church on Sunday. Well, it was no easy task getting out of bed when my alarm went off at too early of an hour on Sunday morning. Not only did my walk look like I'd been riding a horse for about a week, but I had trouble moving my right hand and arm. I was made keenly aware of the existence of muscles that I hadn't used for quite some time, if ever.

I'm sure that many of you gardeners will have the same experience

when you get out in your yards for the first time this Spring. Then you will learn this most difficult lesson: if you don't use it, you lose it. Muscles don't take very kindly to being neglected and so they aren't very forgiving.

In this regard, muscles have quite a

We lose our muscle tone. The main problem with not having conditioned muscles, is that we have poor endurance; we can't stay in it for the long haul. We could climb up a small hill, but we'd never make it to the top of a mountain.

The same is true of faith. Many of us proclaim our faith on Sunday mornings or when we're pressed to make a proclamation of what we believe, but don't make use of our faith in our day to day living. Because faith is a gift from God, we always have it; it's never taken away. Unfortunately, many of us have an out of shape faith. What I call the "Flabby Faith Syndrome."

Unfortunately, God will give us all the faith in the world, but God won't

make us use it. That's just not the kind of God we have. It's up to us to use and exercise our faith, so that it doesn't get flabby.

Fortunately, we don't have to deal with this problem all by ourselves. We have plenty of company. Just look around you on any Sunday morning. If you're not sure how to properly exercise your faith, God is always available for consultation. That is, if you're knees are up to it.

I'm also certain, that their are others, including myself, who would be more than willing to offer encouragement, prodding, nagging, or whatever kind of assistance you may require. Please feel free to return the favor; that's what we're here for.

May God bless our faith abundantly, so that we will be given the strength to exercise it wisely.



Instead of starting our own family right away, we decided to adopt. We brought him home last Thursday. He's only eight months old. He can already walk, though he doesn't have much to say yet.

He's a good eater, goes to sleep without any trouble, and is almost potty trained.

And did I mention...he's a beagle.

His hair is black, and white with some brown. His signature mark is a big white diamond on the back of his neck and back. His legal name is "Diamond Inthe-Rough." He was part of a litter of 10, and one of 2 puppies that wasn't snatched up at Christmastime. We don't know why no one picked him, but we're glad that he waited around for us.

We decided to get a beagle, because they are lovable, good-natured, don't bark much, and are excellent with children (this isn't an announcement). And so far, he's been true to form, and just a delight to have around. We hope you'll all come by and say welcome and howdy to him.

As you can imagine, we've spent a good part of the last few days getting to know Diamond, and letting him get used to us. Right now, as I sit at my computer writing, he's laying at my feet sound asleep. This is the life.

Diamond was born in Morley, Michigan, a very rural town. He lived for 8 months in a Kennel in the back yard of a house that was out away from other houses. And all in one day, he was dragged away from his mom and dad and little sister, forced to wear a collar, confined by a leash, and dragged in a truck for 5 hours back to a subdivision in Delaware, Ohio. we're finally starting to see his true personality. Let me tell you, he's quite a charmer.

If you think about it, dogs are pretty amazing creatures. They have to learn to be totally dependent on us for their care. And what's even more amazing, is that when they do learn to trust us, they are completely and utterly loyal. What an awesome responsibility.

But ya know, we're not all that different from dogs. Perhaps that's why we relate so well to them and want to have them as pets.

Now, before you get offended, let me explain.

Those of us who find ourselves caught up in the life of the church, believe that we have been adopted by God and are now part of God's family. However, it takes quite a bit of adjusting to learn how to be a child of God. It isn't automatic.

We're taken out of our familiar setting, and away from the people we know, and put into a whole new place, with lots of new and different people and expectations. So, the only way to truly become a child of God and a member of this new family is to trust. Because as part of God's family, we're asked to be totally dependent on God to care for us.

Some of us who've been part of God's family for a many years, still have trouble being dependent on God; it's just so hard for us to completely and utterly trust another.

Well, you'll probably guess what my advice is going to be. When you're having trouble trusting others, and especially God, watch a dog. They're our best teachers. If you don't have one of your own, then you can come learn from Diamond.

May we all be given the gift of trust; so as we learn to be members of God's family, we will come to depend on God's gracious care.

"Ten Key Facts about American Baptists"

Number 4: We are a congregationally structured group.

Organizationally, the early Baptist congregations arose in the context of separatist, congregationally structured groups of English Puritanism, with some secondary influences from the Anabaptist tradition. John Calvin's theology also helped shape our heritage, as did later evangelicals and revivalists.

Number 5: We uphold the autonomy of the local congregation.

We continue to emphasize that the local congregation is the basic manifestation of the church. The words of Jesus in Matthew 18:20 are much treasured among us: "For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them." We believe Christ is the head of each congregation, and we are convinced all members should participate in governing its affairs. In order to be

free to follow the divine leading, the congregation must be self-governing, able to select its own leadership and administer its own affairs. It is recognized as a great gift when the Holy Spirit moves in the midst of a worshiping congregation, or guides the congregation when it carries out Christ's business. This is the gift which opens the way to renewal and mission.

ast year, at the end of September, I stepped on the scales and was horrified to discover that I had finally broke the 200 pound mark. I won't say by how much. I know what you're thinking: "She didn't look like she weighed that much at her wedding, but she's tall and so she can carry her weight well." But, the hard, cold, truth is that I was some 40 pounds overweight. Believe it or not.

So, I bit the bullet, and decided to finally do something about it. It took almost 8 months, but I finally lost 35 pounds, and even exchanged some of my bad eating habits for healthier ones. How did I do it? I joined Weight Watchers. Even though I've never been one for joining groups or clubs, I thought that the discipline of weekly meetings and the support of others would be helpful. And it was. In fact, I had such a positive experience, that every time someone told me they were trying to lose weight, I'd tell them all about Weight Watchers. So far, I've recruited four people, and three of them are from our church. They're still going, and are having a very positive experience so far.

Why did they listen to me? What did I do or say that caused them to want to check out Weight Watchers for themselves? Well, I suppose they saw that it had worked for me; that I'd been changed by the experience. Not only did I lose weight, but I felt better about myself and I was living a healthier life, exercising regularly and eating right. They probably thought to themselves, "Well, if it can work for her, then it can work

for me."

This got me to thinking. Every time I'm excited about a new product I discover, or a new restaurant, or a great store, I always tell people about it. For instance, I'm always telling people how wonderful it is to be able to buy my clothes over the phone using the J C Penney catalogue, especially

since they have along with me to a Weight

a special catalogue for tall chics. I even warn people when I have a negative experience. There's a certain restaurant in town that we've had two bad experiences with, and I'm very bold to tell people not to go there.

You know what this is called? This telling people about things and places that are exciting? There's a religious word for it. It's called evangelism. I looked the word up in my American Heritage Dictionary, and this is what I found. Evangelism. The zealous preaching and dissemination of the gospel, as through missionary work.

Militant zeal for any cause.

When is the last time you went away from Sunday School or Sunday Worship so filled with excitement about your experience that you just had to tell everyone you saw? Last week? Last month? Last year? Never?

People can survive very well without hearing about the latest new weight loss program, and they won't

die if you don't get to tell them about the newest restaurant in town. But, can people survive if they aren't invited to church where they can come and experience God's love and the love of a church family? I don't think so. In fact, I would even go so far as to say that it is a life and death matter. So then, how come we don't treat it like a life and death matter? Why is it that I'm more willing to invite someone to come

Watchers meeting than I am to invite someone to come to church with me? Good question.

Even if I do tell someone about my church and invite them to come with me to Sunday School and worship, what will make them say yes? After all, the reason I don't invite people to church is that I'm afraid they'll be offended and say no. But you know, I believe that this fear of rejection is unfounded. It's just an excuse we use. If we invite someone and they already have a church or don't want to come with us, they'll just tell us.

This is what I think. The real reason we don't tell other people about our church is that we (myself included) are just too lazy. And I don't mean

the laying around doing nothing kind of lazy, but the we're just too busy and we don't have time to get to it kind of lazy. If we wait around until we have the time to do it, then we'll never get around to it. You know how the saying goes, "If it's important to you, then you'll make time for it."

Our church and our church's relationship with God is important to us. It is my prayer that we will become so excited about what God is doing in our lives and in the life of our church, that we will invite everyone we meet to come to our church. The people we invite will look at us and see that we have been transformed by the experience. They will see that God has been moving in our lives and that we have been changed. They will come, because they want to have this same life- changing experience.

What is An American Baptist?

Number 6: Devotion to the Associational Principle.

Very early in Baptist history the emphasis on congregational polity was balanced by devotion to the associational principle. Individual churches recognized that the Holy Spirit

was at work among many congregations, and he felt called to work together in the tasks of evangelism, mission, education, and good works. Soon these gatherings became regularized, confessions were drawn up, and officers were appointed. In time "associations of associations" grew into many Baptist churches, often called conventions. Today there are more than 370 **Baptist** conventions in the world. There are so many because the associational principle operated openly and freely; a given congregation is free to break its

ties and seek others. Yet freedom also has encouraged a surprising level of loyalty and inner cohesion among us, and every congregation knows that it can accomplish more working with others than it can accomplish working alone. At the global level, we associate with the great majority of Baptists in the world through the Baptist World Alliance (founded in 1905.)



hen I was growing up, we had a rule in my family. If you spent the night at your best friends house on Saturday, you had to go to church with her on Sunday morning.

Kim and I met in the third grade, and were joined at the hip until we grew up and both went off to separate colleges. During that time, we spent countless Saturday nights at each other's houses. When I was at her house, we didn't go to an American Baptist church, but to St. Collette's Catholic Church where her family attended. This is where I first learned the songs, prayers and rituals of the Roman Catholic Church, I learned when to sit, kneel and stand and when and how to make the sign of the cross. I'm probably one of the only Baptists who knows both the Apostle's and Nicene Creed. And when it came time to take communion, her family took me up to the altar with them and taught me how to receive the host and drink from the cup.

Last weekend, Rundy and I went up to visit with Kim and her husband Greg and their new daughter Melissa. Then on Sunday morning, according to the rules, we went to church with them at St. Joseph Catholic Church. It has been over 15 years since I've been to a Catholic mass, but I was amazed at how much I still remembered. I'm not sure why this surprised me, after all, the Lehrs had brought me up to be a good Catholic.

After the regular Sunday morning mass, Kim, Greg and Melissa went forward with 11 other groups of parents and infants to take part in the sacrament of Baptism. Then Kim's

brother Peter and I were called forward to stand behind them, along with the other 22 godparents who also stood behind the family that they were supporting.

When Kim first called and asked me to be Melissa's godmother, I was



honored and excited. But as I stood through the long ritual of the baptism, and listened as the officiating Deacon asked us to accept this responsibility and taught us what exactly our responsibility would be, I grew increasingly apprehensive and overwhelmed. The religious and moral future of this small, fragile, innocent child was being placed into the hands

of 4 under-qualified, bumbling adults. What was God thinking?

Then the Deacon read a passage from the 10th chapter of Mark's Gospel. "And they were bringing children to Jesus, that he might touch them; and the disciples rebuked them. But when Jesus saw it he was indignant, and said to them, 'Let the children come to me, do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of God. Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it.' And he took them in his arms and blessed them, laying his hands upon them."

Then he spoke to the adults. I didn't take notes, of course, but I'll give you my version of what he told us.

When Jesus spoke these words, he wasn't meaning that we should act like children. Instead, we should relate to God the way an infant relates to its parents. An infant is completely dependent on her parents. Her life depends on them. Our challenge, to fulfill our duty as parents and godparents, is to relate to God the way Melissa relates to her parents. Putting our life into God's hands. Allowing ourselves to depend completely on God.

Unfortunately, we were taught that real adults shouldn't have to depend on anyone but themselves. We raise people in this society to become self-sufficient and independent. To be dependent on anyone or anything, is to be weak.

I'll be the first to admit that I'm a very independent person and sometimes (or almost always) hate to admit that I need help; that I can't do it all by myself. But I'm also smart enough to know that most of what I

accomplish in life that is truly an accomplishment, is a direct result of God's wisdom, love and power working through my life. I also know that if I am to have any kind of positive impact on little Melissa Ann's life, it will be because she depends on a godmother who depends on God.

We are, above all else, a community of faith called into being by a gracious and mighty God. The only way we can become the people God calls us to become, is by becoming like children, who depend on their parents for everything. Let us strive to become completely dependent on our heavenly parent who is the source of our life.

According to the New York Times, the monks say that when work is complete, "anyone, anywhere on earth, will be able to pray directly and interactively with the monks over the Internet." They will also provide online religious discussion groups, articles, religious artwork, and special programs for children.

"This is a new understanding of community," says Brother Aquinas. "This will shake the organization of the church profoundly."



relcome to November. Time to rake leaves. Time to bake pumpkin pies. Time to eat turkey. Time to talk about money.

I've spent the last week, racking my brain, trying to come up with yet another creative, imaginative, yet inspiring way to talk to you about stewardship.

Now, we all know that the topic of stewardship covers several topics under the heading, "stewardship of..." However, in November, when we talk about stewardship, we mean money.

You will receive this edition of your Newsletter on November 1. A peaceful Sunday morning, when you have come into the beauty of this sanctuary to worship and to gather together with other believers. What you may not know, is that for the past 3 or 4 weeks, the finance committee and the pastor, with the help of the other committees of the church, have been hard at work planning and preparing a budget for this church for the coming year. Then on Wednesday, October 28, they presented this budget to the church at our quarterly business meeting for (limited) discussion and approval. Now that this budget has been approved, members of the finance committee will be talking to you during the "stewardship moment" which will be part of our worship services for the next three Sundays. It is their hope to educate us about the financial needs of our church as we prepare to do another year of ministry as God's church in the world. Then they will do their best to inspire you to make a financial commitment to God's church, the First Baptist Church of Delaware, on Stewardship Sunday, which is Sunday, November 22.

Part of my job, as pastor of this illustrious group of believers, is to preach the discipline of tithing. Tithe means ten. Tithing is the spiritual dis-

ing 10 percent of all you have (usually we mean money) to God. What the finance committee wants you to do is give 10 percent to this church. This isn't such a bad idea, at least from my perspective, since I receive my paycheck from money that is given to the church. Unfortunately, the principle of tithing doesn't specify where the money should go; it only specifies who the money should go to. It should go to God.

If you already tithe, I encourage you to challenge yourself to give over and above your tithe. If you don't tithe, shame on you. Just kidding. Tithing isn't an easy thing to do, and its almost impossible to do all at once. In fact, don't try to do it all at once. Work up to it. Each year, when you prayerfully consider what you're going to give to God, start with what you gave this year and increase it by 1%.

We've established that it's important to give money to God. But, why should we give money to this church? Good question. We promise to make a financial contribution to the ministry of this church, because

we believe it is God's will. We believe that God has called this church to be about the business of ministry within the families of this church, within this community and within the world. We make a pledge to give our contribution each week or each month, because we know that even though we can't always be present to worship with our church family, that

it's ministry needs to be supported each and every day.

As we travel together into this November. As we rake leaves, bake pumpkin pies, eat turkey and even as we talk about money, let us remember that it is the God of all life who has graciously given us all we have; time, talents, money. Let us now return to God a portion of all we have received. Let us give thanks for all the blessings of this life. Amen.

I'm having trouble believing a lot of things this year. I'm have a lot of trouble believing that it's November 30th and it's nearly 70 degrees outside. I'm having trouble believing that in the course of 5 months I've been given a god-daughter, a nephew and a niece. I can hardly imagine that Rundy and I are getting ready to celebrate our 3rd Christmas together, and that we've been married for almost 15 months. I absolutely refuse to believe that Christmas is less than a month away.


The truth is, I know that December is breathing down my neck, but unfortunately I'm still somewhere back in August.

I've been struggling to adjust to the changes in my life and the new demands on my time. Some of this is due to the fact that I was single for 32 years. The rest is due to the fact that I keep running out of time. I need about 5 more hours added onto the end of each day.

In case you're not aware, here are some of the things going on in our life:

- We have a hectic schedule during the week, with Rundy leaving at 4:30 a.m. and coming home at 7:15 p.m, Monday through Thursday.
- I have the strange notion that when a person works 10 hours and drives 4 hours, they should have a meal waiting for them when they get home.
- I went from having 2-3 loads of laundry a week to having about 10 loads of laundry a week.
- I have spent the last 4 months dealing with neck and headache problems.

- I have four step-sons (Chad, Shaun, Jason & Eric) and a granddaughter (Kelsea) who live 80 miles away, and need regular visits from us.
- On top of all this, during the past year, my family in Michigan has had many special needs where my presence was requested &/or needed.

• Let's not even mention housecleaning.

I apologize, that on many occasions I've not handled these demands in the most efficient or professional manner. In fact, I've had days where I've felt so overwhelmed, that I didn't want to get out of bed.

I don't tell you all of this so that you'll feel sorry for me, or so you'll feel guilty for making even more demands upon my time. That is not my purpose. My purpose is to help myself and all of us put things in perspective.

The truth, is that my life, Rundy's life, and our life as a congregation has changed dramatically. I went from being single to being married. Rundy went from being single to being married to a pastor. And all of you went from having a single pastor (for 6 years) to having a married pastor. Let us not underestimate how dramatic these changes have been and still are.

Thanks to the Board of Deacons, I've come to realize and understand that I don't have to struggle with all of this on my own. That I should look to my church family for support and encouragement and even for a swift kick when I need it.

The wedding was easy because it was a celebration. The honeymoon was fun because the situation was new and fresh. But now is when it becomes challenging: in the day-today living out of a life together. I apply this to Rundy and I in our life together, but I also apply it to our church family in our life together. This time of adjusting to a whole new life-style hasn't been easy for any of us. I am not the same person who came to you seven years ago (thank God), and you aren't the same church I came to pastor seven years ago (thanks to God). That's the way life works. We grow and change; new members join our families and others leave our family. And it isn't easy. But that's life.

The good news, is that we've faced changes and growth before, as individuals, as families and as a church family, and we've made it through to

the other side. But, let's be careful not to think that we have to do it all on our own or even that we can do it all on our own. Because we can't.

May this season of advent be a time of preparation for the birth of Christ into our lives. Let us remember that the only way we can face the changes and challenges in our lives is when we recognize that not only do we need each other, but we also need God. Let us take time to sit back, pray, think, relax and make room in our hearts for the many changes that have taken place in our lives and for the many changes that will take place. Let us make room for God.

Helen Barrett Montgomery, whose translation of the New Testament from the original Greek was published, was the first woman to preside over a major denomination when she was elected president of the Northern Baptist

Convention in 1921. Fresh in our memories is the leadership of Martin Luther King, Jr., in the civil rights movement.
